Wiltshire bobbies 'On the Beat'



Wiltshire Police have launched their 'On the Beat' campaign to highlight local policing in the county. The month-long campaign, which will be focused primarily on social media, aims to educate and inform the public about what their local police service looks like by introducing people to their local police officers, featuring the important work they do and raising awareness of the demands facing modern-day policing.

Throughout April, Wiltshire Police will be shining a spotlight on the county's six Community Policing Teams, showing the public what day to day life is like for those on the front line in our communities.

Local councillor's CAZ update

Our local councillor, **Johnny Kidney**, has sent an update on Bath's Clean Air Zone (CAZ) proposals, following B&NES Council's decision last month to amend the original zone boundary.

"I submitted a consultation response expressing concern about the impact of the [original] proposals on Limpley Stoke, Winsley, Westwood and Wingfield, in terms of access for residents to the RUH and the potential for traffic to divert via our communities to bypass the charging zone. I also joined Wiltshire Council colleagues from across the wider Bradford-on-Avon Community Area in submitting a joint representation, which reiterated my concerns for our area. Wiltshire Council too submitted a robust response to the consultation.

B&NES Council has now decided to proceed with an amended plan for a Class C CAZ, which excludes all private cars from the proposed charging schedule. This alleviates some of the concern about access to the RUH. However, higher emission private hire vehicles, taxis, buses, vans and heavy goods vehicles will be charged to enter an expanded Clean Air Zone.

There remains a risk that these vehicles will seek alternative routes to avoid the charging zone, which could exacerbate rat-running through our communities. While the potential number of vehicles doing so is reduced from the original proposal, with private cars being exempt from the charge, it remains cause for concern. There is also a potential issue with cars which would not be charged to enter the CAZ still being diverted through our communities if their Sat Nav systems are set to 'avoid tolls'.

B&NES intends to introduce the scheme in late 2020 but has stated that there will be an opportunity for the public to have a further say as the process moves forward. In the meantime, I will continue to work with Wiltshire Council colleagues and officers on this issue to ensure that any measures introduced by B&NES to tackle air pollution in Bath do not simply displace the problem across the Wiltshire border by causing the most polluting traffic to rat-run through our communities. I will continue to provide updates on this as the process moves forward."

Dusk Memory Walk

The **Dusk Memory Walk on Saturday, April 13** at Dorothy House Hospice in Winsley is a 5km sponsored family walk, starting at 7pm and ending at the hospice as daylight begins to fade.

The address given on his business leaflet turned out to belong to a completely different company, which had no knowledge of him. There may be a simple explanation, but better to be on the safe side.

Salisbury clean-up work completed at last

The completion of clean-up work, following the Novichok nerve agent attack last year, marks a significant milestone in South Wiltshire's return to normality, reports Wiltshire Council. Defra announced last month that the final site of decontamination in Salisbury is now safe.

During the past 11 months, around 190 military personnel from the Royal Air Force and Army, supported by specialist contractors, have undertaken highly specialised decontamination work as part of a precautionary approach to the clean-up across the 12 sites identified in Salisbury and Amesbury.

While decontamination may be complete, government support for the region will not end. As Salisbury gets back to business, the Government is working with local leaders to deliver an ambitious local Industrial strategy for the area.

Wiltshire Council has committed more than £13m since March 2018 to support businesses, boost tourism and meet unexpected costs of the incidents, £9.6m of which is special grant police funding.

Children's charity seeks help

Wiltshire Treehouse is a Swindon-based charity providing support for bereaved children. The charity, which is marking its fifth anniversary by expanding further into the county, is looking for support from businesses and the local community.

With limited specialist bereavement support available for families in the county, the charity wants to set up a hub in Wiltshire where support programmes for primary and secondary-age children can be delivered.
