

Action brings results

ork is due to start on **Monday**, **July 1** on construction of a footpath at the rear of the lay-by area adjacent to Winsley Hill canal bridge. The path, which will connect with the existing footpath, will make it safer for people walking to and from the canal. To accommodate it, the lay-by will be reduced in width, the carriageway area resurfaced and road-side vegetation on the bridge removed. Field access will remain.

Work is expected to take three weeks to complete. For operational and safety reasons, the lay-by will be closed and parking will be temporarily unavailable. Traffic movement will be controlled

Winsley Hill Traffic Action Group (WHTAG) was instrumental in bringing about the new footpath. The group was set up in 2016 to address concerns about traffic near the canal entrance on the busy B3108. One of its main issues was the lack of footpaths over the canal bridge and between the canal and river bridges.

WHTAG chairperson Dr Trisha Waters said: "The idea for improving pedestrian safety on the Limpley Stoke side of the canal came entirely from WHTAG. The group attended Winsley Parish Council meetings, where I spoke on the matter, and WPC were very supportive. We were involved with them in the negotiations when the plans were being drawn up by Wiltshire Highways."

The highway improvements are being funded by Wiltshire Council, Bradford on Avon Community Area Transport Group, Winsley Parish Council and Limpley Stoke Parish Council, which has contributed £2,500 towards costs.

Pick up your plastic waste



The Canal & River Trust (CRT) is asking people to help keep towpaths and riverbanks clear of plastic waste by taking their rubbish home. The charity, which looks after 2,000 miles of canals and rivers, including the Kennet & Avon Canal, has published detailed analysis of plastics and litter found in its waterways, including in Wiltshire.

It costs the CRT more than $\pounds 1$ million to clear up over 24 million pieces of litter a year. Around 80 per cent of the plastic in our oceans comes from litter dropped inland. CRT research shows that 1,562 items of plastic leave one of our canals or rivers and head to the sea every day. That's more than 500,000 items each year.

Peter Birch, the Trust's national environmental policy adviser, says: "If everyone who visited one of our canals or rivers picked up just one piece of plastic, they would be clear within a year."

Say no to plastic

Bradford on Avon has been awarded Plastic-Free Community

Status by marine conserv ation charity, Surfers Against Sewage, in

recognition of the work it has done to start reducing the impact of single-use plastic on the environment.

To qualify for recognition, seven local businesses had to prove they had made concerted efforts to implement change and, having done so, have earned the status – the first in Wiltshire – for the community. The seven plastic-free heroes of Bradford on Avon at the time of assessment were: Christine's Sustainable Supermarket; Swan Hotel; Brown's Hardware Shop; Woolley Grange Hotel; Georgian Lodge; Iford Manor; and The Cheese Shop.

Climate change task group

Wiltshire Council has set up a climate change task group, with the aim of making the county carbon neutral by 2030. Councillors from all parties got together for the first time in June to address ways to make Wiltshire more environmentally friendly, following a UN report that said urgent changes are needed in the next 12 years.

Meanwhile, Air Quality Management Areas (AQMAs) have been put in place in towns across Wiltshire where poor air quality has been measured, due to high levels of nitrogen dioxide being pumped out from vehicle exhausts. Town officials have called for urgent action from Wiltshire Council to improve the county's air quality. According to the Wiltshire Times, Bradford on Avon, where Market Street and Masons Lane are among the county's most polluted roads, was declared an AQMA as long ago as 2001.

Woods Hill closure

Part of Woods Hill will be closed temporarily to all traffic on **Wednesday, August 14** from property No 9 for approximately 100 metres in a southerly direction to enable Wessex Water to carry out a supply separation.

The work should take one day to complete, depending on weather conditions. Access will be maintained for residents and businesses where possible, although delays are likely. Further information: Brian Freegard (Wessex Water) on 03456004600.

Attempted break-in

An attempted burglary at a Freshford property last month was foiled by good security measures and the response of neighbours.

The owners, who were away from home at the time, were alerted by a phone call from a family member several miles away informing them that their house was under attack, after an exterior camera with a mobile phone link had activated an alert. Live pictures showed three would-be burglars attempting to force open the garage doors, followed by the sound of the burglar alarm siren. Police arrived within 25 minutes and carried out a detailed search of the house and immediate surroundings. The doors were found to be secure and did not fail under the initial attack.

Police advice to everyone, particularly to anyone going on holiday, is to make sure your house is securely locked while you are away and to leave some lights on; tell your neighbours your 'away' dates; and consider investing in a burglar or CCTV system. Costeffective security installations can relay 'live' alert details to your mobile or tablet.
