Comment on clean air zone update

ath & North East Somerset Council wants local people to have their say on its updated Clean Air Zone (CAZ) proposals before the plans are finalised and submitted to the Government in December. Weekly events are being held across the city, where staff will be on hand to answer questions.

In a bid to reduce the city's harmful levels of nitrogen dioxide – a pollution linked to asthma, heart disease, dementia and reduced lung development in children – the centre of Bath will become a CAZ from the end of 2020, with most higher emission vehicles, except private cars and motorbikes, being charged to drive in the zone.

Wiltshire Air Ambulance grounded by CAA delay

Wiltshire Air Ambulance (WAA) has been grounded temporarily due to a delay by the Civil Aviation Authority (CAA) in issuing an Air Operator Certificate (AOC) following tests on its helicopter. The charity's Bell 429 air ambulance passed the CAA's inspection in August.

WAA spokeswoman, Jill Crooks, said: "We are waiting for the CAA to issue the Air Operator Certificate for our Bell 429 helicopter in order for this to return to work.

We took the decision to let the MD 902 [a back-up helicopter] go at the start of August, given the impending inspection of our flight operations by the CAA, which was successful, and were told the issuance of our own Air Operator Certificate would be imminent

"In addition, the owners of the MD 902 wanted it for another contract and we had already spent £314,000 on the contingency arrangement. We are of course extremely frustrated with this situation but continue to respond to medical incidents in our Rapid Response Vehicles."

Ms Crooks added: "We remain operational, providing critical care in Wiltshire and surrounding counties up to 19 hours a day." Paramedics are attending emergencies using two Rapid Response Vehicles, which are equipped with the same specialist medical equipment as that carried by the helicopter.

WAA has reciprocal arrangements with neighbouring air ambulances to respond to emergency incidents.

Free training courses for dementia carers

Family carers of people living with dementia will be able to find information, tips and support at free training courses in Trowbridge this autumn.

The weekly sessions run by Alzheimer's Support will help people understand what is happening to their relative or friend as different types of dementia develop and focus on what they can do to support them. There are also sessions on the practical aspects of caring, including financial and legal issues.

Alzheimer's Support community services co-ordinator Kate Sharpe said: "We run these courses twice a year. People pick up invaluable tips for how to support their loved ones and how to look after themselves. Just meeting others in a similar situation can be helpful and carers who come often continue to get together informally after the course has ended."

The courses, funded by Wiltshire Council, are held on Monday mornings at Trowbridge United Church in Stallard Street and are free to family carers. The sessions run until November.

Wiltshire sets standard for litter-free roads

\(\lambda\) / iltshire Council has been asked for advice on how it keeps its roadsides predominantly litter-free on the strategic road network, so that other authorities can learn from its experience, following an independent national road cleanliness survey.

The survey – which was undertaken independently by Keep Britain Tidy after the organisation was commissioned by Defra – aims to understand the current litter situation and the issues affecting local authorities and other land managers that have responsibility for keeping these highways clean, as



part of the Defra Litter Strategy for England, which sets out its determination to tackle roadside litter.

Six different areas of roadside in Wiltshire were analysed for the survey, with each section being visited and assessed twice to give 12 ratings in total. The county's roadsides achieved one grade of B+, six B grades and five B- grades. Achieving a 'B' grade rating means "predominantly litter- free, with some minor instances of the issue".

Bridget Wayman, Wiltshire Council cabinet member for highways, transport and waste, said: "We welcome this rating from Defra and Keep Britain Tidy. However, we recognise that there is much more to do, which is why we have recently launched several anti-litter campaigns such as 'Don't be a Tosser', 'Bin the Butt' and 'CleanUpWilts', with much more to come. Wiltshire is a beautiful county and we are committed to keeping it that way."

Wiltshire spends £2.8m each year cleaning up litter, money which could be better spent on other services, for example, paying for 87,500 potholes to be filled, or providing 70 additional placements for older people.

To keep its highways as clean as possible, Wiltshire Council undertakes regular inspections for early detection of litter problems, schedules proactive litterpicking, and responds to residents' reports.

Round Britain adventure

ath Sailing Club will be hosting a talk on **Monday, October 14** by Will Hodshon on his record-breaking, non-stop circumnavigation of Great Britain. Will and his life-long friend, Rich Mitchel, sailed the 60-year-old, 16-foot, open Wayfarer sailing dinghy, *Nipegegi*, unaided for the 1,390-

nautical mile (2,237km) journey, completing in 15 days and 4 hours. They finished where they started, in Salcombe, Devon, on July 1 this year, in what was a remarkable feat of endurance and seamanship. The previous equivalent record for the fastest open-dinghy sailing around mainland Britain was 32 days, set in 2014.

The talk has added interest as Will Hodshon lives and works locally. You can listen to him describe the challenges of this amazing adventure at **The Village Club**, 58 High Street, **Bathford**, BA1 7SN, starting at **7.45pm.** Non-members welcome.

The expedition's aim was to raise funds for the Water Smart Foundation



which is, in turn, presenting the funds to two ocean-minded charities (RNLI and Surfers Against Sewage). Bath Sailing Club will be donating and non-members are encouraged to do the same on the night.
