Top of the cops

iltshire Police Force is the best in the country for dealing with priorities highlighted by the community, according to a national survey which measures the types of crime experienced by the public. The Force could only manage 29th place in last year's national rankings. Wiltshire came second in the country for confidence in the police (up from 20th in the same category last year), and third for residents' satisfaction that police do a 'good or excellent job', compared to 12th place in 2017.

The survey, conducted by the Office for National Statistics, asked members of the public about their experiences of crime over the past 12 months, recording all types of crime experienced, including unreported incidents.

Police and Crime Commissioner for Wiltshire and Swindon, Angus Macpherson, said: "It's really positive to see such a significant increase in how the Force deals with priorities as outlined by the community from last year and is clearly testament to the hard work going on within the Force to forge better links with those who live and work here. For the Force to come second nationally for public confidence in the police is great news and I'm glad that the public believe in our Force as much as I do."

Chief Constable, Kier Pritchard, added: "Since the introduction of Community Policing Teams (CPTs) in 2016, officers have tried to put a real emphasis on building strong and sustainable relationships in the communities where they live and work, and placing first in the country shows that the public feel those links to the police have improved.

Thieves target village again

ore incidents to add to Limpley Stoke's recent catalogue of petty crime. A rowing boat belonging to the late Miles Kington which had sat on the river's edge at Limpley Stoke for more than a decade and had provided, every summer, a depository for swimmers' towels, a place to sit, and a familiar sight for walkers, was stolen some time on Friday, July 27.

The boat, securely fastened with a padlock and chain, disappeared

after thieves cut through the chain with a boltcutter. The boat is cumbersome and was fairly waterlogged, which would have made it very heavy to lift. Miles's widow, Caroline, is obviously upset by the theft and cannot understand why anyone would want to steal it.

Miles Kington (pictured) was a renowned writer, broadcaster and musician who was well-known for his columns in The Times and The Independent and is fondly

remembered by his many friends in the village and beyond.

In another boat-related theft, a large outboard motor was stolen recently from a boat stored in a padlocked field in Sharpstone and evidently carried some distance away.

Back in Limpley Stoke, a sculpture of Brunel on the outside wall of Alan Dun's studio disappeared early in August. The thieves, who no doubt believed the sculpture to be bronze, will be disappointed to discover it is, in fact, made from resin.

£10m Novichok bill

Wiltshire Police operational costs for the Novichok nerve agent incidents in Salisbury and Amesbury, which left one person dead and three others fighting for their lives, are expected to reach more than £10 million. It is projected that more than £7 million of the total bill will cover the cost of calling in mutual-aid support from countrywide forces to meet the extraordinary demand placed on Wiltshire after two major incidents in the space of four months.

Police and Crime Commissioner for Wiltshire and Swindon, Angus Macpherson, says he fully expects all costs associated with the operation to be met centrally by the Government.

Alan Titchmarsh at American Museum

The American Museum at Claverton has launched its £2m new garden, which will be officially opened by Alan Titchmarsh on Saturday, September 15. Between 10.00am and 5.00pm, visitors can meet the head gardener, enjoy music by the Park Lane Big Band, and step back in time to the 18th century, with a little help from The Natural Theatre Company.

The new American garden contains 10,000 native trees, plants and shrubs, as well as an American rose collection.

Admission to the museum and gardens is free on the day. On-site parking may be limited but the museum's shuttle bus will be operating (for details visit americanmuseum.org).

Crisis averted at local food bank

A Bradford on Avon charity which provides vital help for low-income families and homeless people in the town and surrounding area issued an urgent plea at the start of the school holidays for donations to its food bank. The Hub @ BA15, which also runs a local debt counselling service, was fast running out of supplies and had reached crisis point.

"In the three years that we have been running, I have never seen empty shelves in the food bank", said manager, Avril Clarke.

People were quick to respond to the appeal and their generosity meant that The Hub was able to provide not only more than 50 boxes of food to help families over the school holidays, but also to restore stocks to normal levels.

Each week the food bank issues around 10 food parcels through procedures stipulated by the Trussell Trust, which regulates operation of the food bank.

Last year, more than 700 local adults and over 350 children were helped by the food bank. Demand has increased due to difficulties in applying for Universal Credit and the delay in receiving benefits.


