Are you making your voice heard?

Act locally: call, email, ask to meet with, or come to a board meeting for City Council, Board of Education, or county Board of Supervisors.

Act at the state level: call, email, sign legislative petitions, or request to meet with your state Assemblyperson or state Senator.

Act federally/globally: call, email, sign legislative petitions, make public comments through portals, or request to meet with your Congressperson or Senator.

Ventura County--See the attached Ventura County Covid-19 After Action Report. Based on what we know now, decide if you believe their recommended actions will save lives during the next pandemic emergency and submit a public comment, if you opposed these actions.

As soon as May 27, 2024, the **United States could sign a Global Pandemic Treaty** that voids our national sovereignty and personal bodily autonomy in declared emergencies or potential emergencies by allowing the Director of the WHO to unilaterally dictate emergency response to member nations. Obviously, this is not getting any state mainstream media attention.

Should the United States sign the Treaty as proposed, Americans as individuals won't have a choice in which medications we can take for the next "Virus X" or whether we must be "vaccinated" to travel, work, and recreate. What if General Tedros declares a climate emergency? Could he dictate travel and resource allocation? Could he enact when we can turn on the lights or how much meat we can consume?

Every Republican US Senator has signed a letter to Pres. Biden demanding he NOT sign the proposed treaty as treaties require 2/3 consent of the Senate. Biden is getting around this "technicality" by calling it an agreement rather than a treaty, but it is binding nonetheless, see attached.

Daughters of the American Revolution

The Daughters of the American Revolution (DAR) is an organization of women who are descendants of soldiers and other prominent figures from the Revolutionary period. It was founded in 1890 and chartered by Congress in 1896. The group now boasts over 1,000,000 members.

The goal of DAR is not only to honor their heritage but contribute to society as well. They have a threefold program to stress the study of US history and Americanization training. They also focus on supporting education for underprivileged youth.

The four founders were Mary S. Lockwood, Ellen Walworth, Mary Desha, and Eugenia Washington. The women had tried to join the Sons of the American Revolution but were denied. Lockwood published a story about Hannah White Arnett and her great grandson offered to help the women form their own group. Ellen Hardin Walworth was the daughter of John J. Hardin, a US Representative and militia general from Illinois. She was an American author, lawyer, and activist passionate about

history and preservation. She was one of few who proposed the creation of the U.S. National Archives. She was a victim of domestic abuse and studied law to overturn the conviction against her son who killed her husband while defending her.

Mary Desha was the granddaughter of Joseph Desha, a US Representative and ninth governor of Kentucky. She worked in the public school system until she took a job as a clerk in Washington D.C. She later took a teaching job in Alaska. She convinced the government to investigate the poor living conditions of the Alaskan natives. She returned to Washington and worked for the Office of Indian Affairs about the same time she served as Assistant Director of DAR.

Mary S. Lockwood was the granddaughter of Isaac Smith, who owned a mill that the town was named after. In addition to her service for DAR, she was part of the Woman's Suffrage Club, the

Travel Club, Women's Press Club. She authored several books including a book titled, "Story of the Records and of the D.A.R."

Eugenia Washington was the daughter of William Temple Washington and Margaret Calhoun Fletcher, a great niece of Senator John C. Calhoun of South Carolina. She was caring for her disabled, single father about the time Battle of Fredicksburg was beginning. She was unable to get her father out and they were caught on the battlefield. They witnessed the entire battle while trapped in some shelter she had found. She was inspired that day to help women preserve their heritage from both the North and the South.
