

"Inauguration Day"

Inauguration Day takes place on January 20th due to the 20th Amendment to the Constitution in 1933. This was done to ensure a speedy transition of power. It was determined that it will occur on January 20th no matter what, unless it is a Sunday. If it is a Sunday, the President will proceed with the oath of office, but the other festivities will take place on Monday.

The festivities include many activities, and it is a long day for the newly elected President, especially Donald Trump, who went right to work on camera for all to see. Although this year it was done inside the Capitol Rotunda due to inclement weather, it is typically done outside on the grounds of the U.S. Capital Building. It was held on the East Portico until 1981 when Ronald Reagan moved it to other side to accommodate more onlookers.

After an invocation, the Vice President will take the oath just prior to the President, and he/she can choose a justice of the Supreme Court, the Chief Justice will swear-in the President. Swearing on the bible has occurred since George Washington. Many have chosen to use their family bible or the bible of a predecessor. The speech is next and sets the tone for the administration, including the priorities and goals.

The first Inauguration to be televised was Harry S. Truman's in 1949. Technology has continued to increase transparency and allow people to witness these events.

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Our new President-elect signed orders for all to see and informed the public what each one was. He televised signing additional orders and pardons in the oval office while taking all the questions from reporters for all to see. It will be interesting to see if this type of transparency continues with future administrations.

The parade is next and varies from president to president. Many walked along the parade route and greeted onlookers. This may be too difficult to manage security for these days. The parades typically feature top marching bands and our military groups.

Lastly, the Inaugural Ball has become a time-honored tradition since 1809 when Dolly Madison threw one for her husband James. It was held at a hotel near Capitol Hill. As the guest lists became larger and larger, and hotels or other venues could not accommodate the number of attendees, Presidents began to host several throughout the city. President Ronald Reagan attended eight balls of the evening of his Inauguration.

President Trump gave another excellent speech and was a gentleman as always with those he interacted with. My favorite part of the night was Melania's big smile as they wrapped up a long day and continued their legacy.

"On Friday Gov. Newsom's office detailed its initial <u>state budget proposal for 2025-26</u>, kicking off negotiations with the governor and legislative leaders that will last through June when he and lawmakers must agree to a final budget deal.

As CalMatters' <u>Mikhail Zinshteyn</u> and Stella explain, some of the takeaways of the \$322 billion spending proposal include:

• **New state agencies:** Newsom wants to create two new agencies focused on <u>consumer</u> <u>protections</u> and <u>homelessness and housing</u> <u>policies</u>. So far, details are scant: The administration did not propose new spending on homelessness, nor did it provide details on

how existing departments would be reorganized.

• **Funding for ballot measures:** After voters approved a handful of ballot measures last year, Newsom plans to allocate \$2.7 billion in new climate spending from Proposition 4; \$8.5 billion for school facilities from Prop. 2; and \$6.4 billion for mental health housing from Prop. 1.

Spending cuts: The governor proposed to cut prison and corrections spending by \$400 million. He also seeks to slash state support to the University of California and California State University by a combined total of \$772 million in keeping with a deal he agreed to with lawmakers last year."
