Grammar: "The Least You Should Know" Phrases and Clauses, Sentences and their Punctuation, Fragments and Splices

Phrase: a group of words that does not contain a subject and a verb:

- getting up in the morning
- around the lunch table

Clause: a group of words that contains a subject and a verb:

<u>Independent Clause (IC)</u>: a clause that can stand alone as a simple sentence:

- Maria plays tennis.
- John likes to read.

<u>Dependent Clause (DC)</u>: a clause which cannot stand as a sentence because it begins with a SUBORDINATOR

- whenever I go to the store
- as long as you finish your homework

A **<u>simple sentence</u>** is made up one independent clause:

- Emily runs.
- Emily runs in the park on Friday afternoons.

Subordinators

- After
- although
- as
- as if
- because
- before
- even though
- if
- since
- so that
- until
- when
- whenever
- wherever
- while ...

Transitional Expressions

A <u>compound sentence</u> is made up of two (or more) independent clauses joined by a semicolon or by a coordinator preceded by a comma:

- The movie was long; it lasted three hours.
- The movie was long, but I enjoyed every minute of it.

A **complex sentence** is made up of one independent clause and one dependent clause.

- ✓ **Punctuation**: if the sentence begins with the dependent clause, follow that clause with a comma. If it begins with the independent clause, no internal punctuation is necessary.
- Although she had a crush on the new boy, she didn't tell her friends.
- She didn't tell her friends even though she had a crush on the new boy.

Fragment: Incomplete sentence consisting of either a PHRASE or a DEPENDENT CLAUSE.

Comma Splice:

Coordinators

An incorrectly punctuated compound sentence:

• The soccer game was over, their team had lost again.

Correct

• The soccer game was over, and their team had lost. (Coordination)

Conjunctive Adverbe

- The soccer game was over **because** their team had lost. (Subordination)
- The soccer game was over; their team had lost. (Punctuation)
