What is a barrier reef?

According to the Merriam Webster Dictionary, a coral reef is a reef composed of a large colony of corals including the stony skeletons of both living and dead corals. Coral reefs are made from thousands of individual animals called polyps, which form colonies.

How many barrier reefs are there?

Thousands of coral reefs exist around the world including:

- The Great Barrier Reef in the Coral Sea off the coast of Queensland, Australia
- The Red Sea Coral Reef in the Red Sea near Egypt and Israel
- The Florida Reef in the Gulf of Mexico right here off the coast of Florida

A few fun facts about the Great Barrier Reef in Australia:

- It is the biggest reef system in the world
 - Contains over 2,900 individual reefs
- Has more than 900 islands across 1,600 miles
- Is the only living thing can be viewed from outer space
 - Is about half the size of Texas
- Is home to dolphins, porpoises, and more than 30 species of whales
 - Is where 6 species of sea turtles go to start their families
 - 17 species of sea snakes live on the reef
 - There are more than 1,500 different species of fish
 - 10% of the fish in the world live there
 - Is thought to be 20 million years old
- Has over 400 different types of coral, 350 of which are hard corals
