





<u>Old Savanah Tours</u>; it's a hop on hop off service. It includes a guide. It's a good way to see the city. \$38 per adult fee allows all day travel.


There are historical actors who board and play roll. They range from Rosie the Riveter to Jackie Robertson.



This is the 14 stops for the bus which are not advertised online. It's pretty complete and I would say it's worthwhile to take the bus if you don't want to walk.



The stops are shown. Time to walk from point 3 to 6 is only 3 minutes. The area is very small.



The stops are frequent and there is not always room to board. It may be that you may need to wait for the next bus. In fact this happened early on the day and often. Do not start the tour other than at the company main bus stop. They will now allow you to board and you must wait for their shuttle van to take you to stop 1. Some riders were upset about this.



In fact, if I had to do over again, I would only use the service in two ways. One would be to be aware of what the stops were upfront and that get off at each one look at the area and then get back on and continue to the next stop. The other Way would be to just pay a lower price which is almost half the total for hop on hop off and ride at the entire route one time which takes 90 minutes and use it as a general tour of the historic area. It's not a good form of transportation as I thought, and as was advertised by a reviewer of the service. You cannot just ride it around to the next stop you are interested in because it's a full hour and a half circuit.

Also, this tour service ends at 4:30 in the afternoon. That is really early and leaves a lot of the day available for tourist activities without transportation services. Add to this the fact that they don't start until almost 10 as it takes them 40 to 45 minutes to organize the trips and double and triple check the tickets before they begin their tour.

In summary, if you are in good health, and can walk, you should walk the historic district and forget about this bus circuit. In fact, we paid for hop on hop off and ended up walking all the way back to our car in any event. If you're not in good health, use it just to go around once once to see what's interesting and pick up any historical tidbits from the driver. Otherwise make other arrangements.

<u>Historic Savanah;</u> Located in Franklin Square is a monument to the first colored regimen that ever fought for the United States. They fight in the revolutionary war. This is unknown history and not generally well-known.

We got off the tour at the stop 14 which is city market. City market it's really not one building but an open area between two squares with shops, and a beautiful walk path. **City Market**



City market is really well done. It's really clean, Tony and upscale. It's a beautiful open area with lots of shops. You really should come here if you like shopping, crafts and snacks.




The Riverwalk is also a wonderful opportunity to stroll along the savanna river. If you go to stop number 14, you can walk 1 mile back to stop number 11. There are plenty of restaurants, bars, and specialty shops along the way. You also pass the Jorge A Queen. Monument World War II, Riverwalk



The Riverwalk had cotton brokers and also houses the factors row. The last Cotton broker office was closed in 1953. The Riverwalk area was not rehabilitated until 1977.



The factors would walk back and forth from the shoreline, which is on the 40 foot Bluff, where Savannah was established, to the cotton offices, where they work. Factoring means being paid upfront in cash for your cotton crop. This allows the factor to take charge and be responsible for the shipment to its final destination and provides the farmer immediate cash. The farmer does not have to wait for the final sale or be responsible for the cotton in its shipment. The factor would then get the rest of the value of the Cotton plus any markup that he could get at the final sale. But the factor took the risk during the voyage. Factoring is still done today in commerce.



The American disabilities act or ADA, has not caught up with the stairs and handrails in old Savannah. Refreshing to see people actually use a stair at their own risk.I





Just a great place to stroll. And highly recommended in October. Temperatures 68 to 70° and the skies are clear. It's crisp and cold and dry. You can't beat it.



The biggest pumpkin I've ever seen in my life. It is real and measures 3 1/2 feet across. Lord knows what it weighs. Can you imagine carving this? You would have to have a lantern inside to light it.

This is a Family favorite, artillery punch. We have never seen anywhere else. Of course, the recipe could be different from what the family would prepare, but who knows.



Wright Square is where justice was rendered in the colonial days of early Savannah. The gallows was here as well as the first cemetery, which has long been removed. The CVS store located at an adjacent corner was at that time the jail. **Gordon Monument**



This is Oglethorpe Square and where Forrest Gump's bench was located. The walkway that Nancy is standing on, was grassed over, and the bench was at its base. The bench has been taken away and is a national historical artifact, because the movie was so popular.

Unusual for its time in the deep south is a Catholic church that was built by French immigrants early in the colonial time. Recently restored in 2000 and rebuilt after a fire at the turn of the century 1900. The

church is open for visitors at 4 PM in the afternoon.



Beautiful French style naive. The atar has no crucifix, it's off to one side. It was nice to see the church for tourists. Everyone was respectful and quiet and it was a nice time for meditation.

John The Baptist Catholic Church



The largest stations of the cross I have ever seen. These pieces of art were easily 4 to 6 feet tall and a full three or 3 1/2 feet wide. They are traditional representations for Catholics of the final stages of Jesus'

Cathedral In Savanah



Again, usual for the days in colonial America, a Jewish synagogue was also allowed to be established. This is a testament to the people who landed here and to their attitude. They were in a New World and wanted to start in a new way. They obviously did not want to continue the patterns of the old world and allowed different peoples to practice their faith openly. Sadly, this would not extend to the worldwide practice of slavery, which is a separate story. Jewish synagogue



George Washington himself wrote the synagogue a letter in support of their official establishment. It was followed by official recognition of the state of Georgia for the synagogue.

Read the history of these wandering Jews. Amazing. We were told by the Tour Guide that when they approached the harbor, there was yellow fever rampant within the young colony. They were warned that there were no doctors available and to stay on ship or go elsewhere. When the Jewish passengers told them that they had doctors with them they were promptly allowed to settle and permanently became part of the community. **Mickve Israel**



One of the many shops for arts and crafts, you'll find in the area. Sometimes the contents seem to blend together, but this one had artifacts and crafts from Mexico. We recognize a lot of them from our personal collection and past travel.

We were surprised to see a taste of Italy as well. This massive residence is a beautiful classical example of Italian northern renaissance architecture. Completely made of marble it's an imposing building.



Statuary at the Armstrong Kessler mansion on Bull Street. This is a spectacular recreation of an Italian Mediterranean house. It is set on a beautiful lot adjacent to Forsyth Park. This mansion occupies nearly an entire block.




This is definitely not a fixer-upper. They always say if you have to ask how much something cost you can't afford it. I don't even want to know on this one.
