
## 231110 BRA DeLand Florida Hidden Gem



Located on US Route 92 between Daytona Beach and Orlando, Florida, DeLand host, many unique institutions, and attractions worthy of your attention.

Whatever you do, don't go in that store. You're gonna regret it.




The assortment of chocolates is just amazing. They have an Oreo cookie eyeballs which is a must buy especially during Halloween.

You can easily walk to historic area and parking is free. There are no meters here so if you could find a spot on the side of the road, just pull up and enjoy the day.




The historic district is spread along several city blocks. It's easy to walk and very compact. There are the classical, typical municipal parks that are scattered throughout. These are wonderful to visit if you just want to sit, feed the birds, or pass some time.



The downtown area is basically captured in time. This is what it would've look like at

the turn of the century in the early 1900s. Most of the buildings are original. The problem is if you want to shop here stores open at 10 or even 11 AM. Time goes slowly here so don't be in a hurry.



Mr Bills Donuts. These are donuts made the old-fashioned way, frying. All of the donuts that you buy, especially from the national chains, are baked. There's a difference in taste between a fried and a baked doughnut. Nancy argued with me, because there was no grease, but if the oil is hot enough, the donuts float in our instantly cooked with one flip, and they're out. These are really good donuts and they have that authentic, fried taste.



Once again, pricing is interesting in these parts of Florida. You can get a dozen donuts and a nice T-shirt for \$29.99. Typically in most tourist areas a T-shirt alone would cost that so the donuts are almost free.



Utility box wrap. I've seen these Used effectively in Daytona Beach Florida and nowhere else. These are vinyl wraps. They are printed with different scenes and then they can be applied to any metal surface. This is a standard transformer box. That's been completely changed into a nice artful display by just wrapping it with vinyl. it would be good to have these used more often elsewhere



Wonder how they get away with putting these wraps on these utility boxes without the required OSHA warning stickers. Everyone is aware of those telling people the obvious which is don't open the boxes and don't stick your hands inside. It's nice that they didn't junk them up with these



Municipal parks. Sunflower Park Founders of any city, is early as the antiquities, appreciated community and open space. Nothing makes a city, more livable, more civilized than clean, well-maintained parks. We found this little one a treasure took the way at the edge of Stetson University. It has a functioning fountain, it's clean and well-maintained, it has picnic tables and a gazebo. it's great to see small places like this that are still available to the common person that are in such good shape.



For breakfast, we had yogurt with

pomegranate and granola, which we bought at Publix, fresh, seedless, California, green grapes and organic coconut smoothies. A very light and healthy breakfast to get the day started.



We were able to sit alone in a public park with an absolutely gorgeous, beautiful fountain operating 5 feet from us. Where else but in small town America.



Don't feed the birds? Will try to tell this man. He seems to be enjoying it about as much as the birds do. We asked him what was he feeding the birds and he said cat food! We said, what?

Well he feeds the cats cat food and then has to go sit on a bench 30 feet away and feed the same cat food to the birds so keep them away from the food that he wants to cats to eat. Hope that makes sense. So he goes around town to different places feeding feral cats. Has made sure that the cats are neutered so they are not

reproducing which is good.



Buttercup bakeries. Scanner all over town will find these little places that cater to students from Stetson University. The gentleman that was feeding the birds confirmed that Stetson is the main source of employment and income for the land. It shows they have obviously a very steady source of revenue to keep all these stores open.


The DeLand opera house circa 1910.



First National Bank of Deland. Wow, and that's considered a skyscraper no less. Impressive for its day. But it looks like this site has been jinxed. One event after another has conspired to close every business and activity that was deemed to fit for its purpose.



You know, things were simple back in the day when a human fly actor would climb this building for attention. Today sadly most onlookers would yell, "Jump!"



The classic coffee shop. you can't get any

cuter than that. This town is peppered with these places. Just absolutely beautiful. Quaint little spots to stop and have dessert or a coffee.



Step inside, and you'll find a place completely jampacked. Fresh made baked goods, cappuccinos of every variety, and a complete sandwich and soup menu awaits.



There's a good saying, that says, if locals pack the place it's probably good. Again, you would not think that it's that frequented but once you step inside and you see that it's completely full of locals,

you know it's a good place to eat.



Pick your poison. Believe it or not, these coffee drinks come hot, colder, or iced. With whipped cream. What more could you ask for.



We got a nutty, Irish lady hot, a Boston caramel mocha, cold, and a coconut cake dessert. The total came to \$17.52 again showing that this part of Florida is very economical. And this is for lunch. What a country.



Blue Spring State Park. Located minutes outside of Deland going west toward I four along route 92 is a beautiful state park. Is four dollars for one person or six dollars for a carload.



It is home to manatee during the colder parts of the year. There are two hour river cruises available as well as kayaks which can be rented. The springs are constant 72° year-round and about is crystal clears. Water can be.



Maintenance. They really maintain the state parks and things in general are well-maintained.



I know this looks silly me taking pictures of yellow caution, tape tied around these banisters. But they take this seriously here. As you walk along, there are yellow caution tape segments tied around different sections of the banister which need to be replaced. And someone will actually come by and replace these sections. Americans take this type of maintenance for granted. It doesn't happen in many other countries and things just fall apart and are never repaired or restored.



The fish, of course are very happy in these springs. It's been darn near 100 years since anyone can fish for them. So there are plenty of these specimens and they are quite large, easily seen in the springs. It just really wants to make you go get a fishing pole and some bait, but you would get kicked out of the park before you caught anything.



The sign really says it all. Sadly, when you go to municipal spaces, people will just throw their trash on the ground and leave. You always wonder if someone finds a nice picnic area, or park without litter why

would they choose to leave it other than the way they found it. Drives you crazy. But if you follow the precepts of this sign, you can't go wrong no matter where you are.



Manatees are very friendly. They're just a friendly image and they're used a lot with children's books. What better wait to represent one than in a beautiful tile mosaic. Today there were no manatees present at the park. The water temperature is still above 66°F which is the lowest that they can stand. Once it drops to that level or near it, then they'll seek shelter in the state park.



And of course there's the gift shop. Nancy can't help it. For her a gift shop is just like a black hole out in the universe. If we get anywhere near it, we just get sucked inside.

But a good thing about gift shops, which is different from black holes is, that if you spend money you can get back out. We've never been trapped in one yet.



What gift shop would be complete without every Christmas decoration you could possibly ever think you needed, was ever invented or is available.



\$6 dollars for one hour, and \$4 dollars for each additional hour. A two hour drift down the spring from the boil would be a great way to spend any hot afternoon.

One thing to note is that the park is closed to all water activities yearly between November 15 and March 14. This has been done since 2007. The reason is that this park fills with manatees. It is a main shelter area for manatees during the cold time of the year.



The boardwalk takes you from the gift shop out to the boil. You can then jump in there and float back down to the gift shop or float back down to the entrance and then walk all the way back and do it again. It's a 10 minute walk and the Boardwalk is excellent for a quick stroll and a little bit of exercise. A good way to settle lunch.



The natural walkways are beautifully done, and they fit these through the forest. Here when a tree is in the way, they just build around it. It really is natures priority over man's access on display.



The boil is 140 feet deep. The divers are not supposed to go any deeper than 60. The water is a constant 72°F year-round.



Blue Springs is a First Magnitude natural spring. These are the largest artesian springs by type. 100,000,000 gallons a day flow out of this single spring. It makes it one of the largest natural spring, in the United States.



To put this in the scale, the Panama Canal requires 28,000,000 gallons to float one ship through the canal from one end to the other. This means that the spring provides for enough water to float 3 ships through the Panama Canal. The Panama Canal can only handle about 18 ships a day so if this spring provides for 3 this would represent 17 to 20% of the water that the Panama Canal uses in one day. This is simply astounding.



Shortcut bypass Orlando. We have been introduced to another road that we did not know existed, which is Florida route 429. This is a toll road that you can take that completely bypasses Orlando to the north and connects interstate 4 on each side. The toll road on the eastern side will start around Sanford, and on the western side near Celebration Florida.



Apple Maps took us this route completely bypassing interstate 4 through downtown Orlando. Many times I 4 has been called the worlds longest parking lot and that's not funny when you have to experience it (see above the traffic going into Orlando starting around Celebration Florida). Consider this road if you come this way.

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
