
## 240324 BRA Sunken Gardens St Petersburg Florida Hidden Gem




Sunken gardens was built inside of a pond which occupied a sinkhole. It was drained by an entrepreneur back in the day when you could do such things. He decided that the rich soil was good for planting, and started to import many exotic, fruits, palms, and flowering plants.



You don't really notice it but you walk 15 feet below the street level and that is the base of what used to be the pond. Inside of it now is a wonderful garden well worth

your time which occupies one entire city block.



Ralph Turner was his name. There is a plaque dedicated to him in 1979. He was the visionary that created this attraction. The city purchased the attraction once it fell into disrepair and with public funding helped restore it.



The attraction today was a plant festival. But there was always a good reason to visit the park. As you can see, the interest was very high.



As you walk around the park, the winding path takes you by many streams and the pond. As you can imagine they all drain down to the low point mentioned above. It provides for lots of opportunities to make beautiful waterfalls.



The plant festival was very small. In fact, for such a famous attraction, it was underwhelming. I wonder why? If I were anyone selling plants, I would've jumped at the opportunity to have showcase them here. Who knows but the park regardless was well worth the visit.

Inside the park is the original entrance to Turner sunken Gardens. At one point not too long ago in the 70s, it had the largest gift shop in the United States. Yes, you read that right.



The old gift shop is a wonderful, compact, informative museum. It really does take you back in time and show you how this park developed. Much of this history I remember now being age 69 as most of it I saw growing up.
