



Margaret Tudor

I am Margaret Tudor and I have been married to David Tollefson for almost 49 years. As a Ph.D. in Environmental Science Education (U. Wisconsin) I worked as an environmental educator at the Washington Department of Fish and Wildlife for 20 years. Then until retirement I served for 10 years as Executive Director of the Pacific Education Institute (PEI). PEI brings environmental studies into K-12 science through teacher workshops focusing on taking students outdoors for Field Investigations.

I grew up in Australia, and married David at 24. I have mostly a UK heritage, but my DNA composition is 30% Scandinavian. So, I gather the Vikings historical UK adventures have left a Scandinavian imprint on my otherwise English genes.

As a graduate assistant at the University of Hawaii I worked for AID on water and solid waste programs for rural Indonesia.

I play the piano, and I am now learning to play the drums. I like to bird/animal watch and appreciate immersing myself in all environments.

I appreciate the friendship the Lodge members offer, and learning about the Norwegian heritage. I love the Norwegian events, and look forward to learning more about the Norwegian foods. The Lodge members worked wonders to keep us together during COVID by having outdoor gatherings.

A person with a Scandinavian background can appreciate learning more about their heritage and culture as a member of the Lodge. Scandinavian food is also a draw!



Ancient Accessories

Jewelry played a big role in Viking life, serving as decoration, status symbols and even currency. Both men and women wore brooches, arm rings, pendants and beads. Brooches especially were useful, as they kept cloaks and other fabrics together. Some were simple, while others featured elaborate metalwork, often in the shape of animals, gods or mythological symbols. It was especially fashionable at the time to have



a brooch with designs inspired by patterns devised in the British Isles, where the Norwegian Vikings often traded. Thor's hammer pendants were especially popular, worn as symbols of protection and devotion to the Norse gods. Other pieces of jewelry, often made with walrus teeth, featured runes or animal designs which were believed to o er spiritual strength or good fortune. Beads made of glass or amber were strung into necklaces and woven into hair as a sign of status.

Arm rings, often made of silver or gold, weren't just accessories—they were used as a form of payment. Silver was one of the primary forms of currency during the Viking Age, so having this material on hand was important when traveling across the world.

Warriors were sometimes rewarded with arm rings as a mark of loyalty and honor. These rings could be broken into pieces for trade, making them both beautiful and functional.
