### CAN MILWAUKEE'S HIGH-TECH ECONOMY BE REVIVED? - Linda Brown

In the first half of the 20<sup>th</sup> century, Milwaukee was a city of engineers that was a world leader in some of the most important advances of the time such as combustion engines, resistors and other electronic devices, pneumatic temperature control systems, new forging techniques, portable power tools and more. But as digital and other new technologies ascended, the city lost its edge. While some remnants of Milwaukee's high tech past remain, it is no longer a global center for technological innovation. We'll discuss what we can do to grow a new high tech, higher margin economy.

Kathleen Gallagher was a business reporter at the Milwaukee Journal Sentinel and the Milwaukee Sentinel for 23 years. She was one of two reporters on the team that won a 2011 Pulitzer Prize for the One in a Billion Series. Gallagher is now executive director of 5 Lakes Institute, a nonprofit working to grow the Great Lakes region's high technology entrepreneurial economy and culture. She will lead off our discussion on how Milwaukee can become a leader in the next economy.

### MILWAUKEE HAS A PORT? - Bernadette Asiatidis

Our January 9<sup>th</sup> afternoon speaker will be Jackie Q. Carter who is the first woman to serve as Director Port Milwaukee. Her responsibilities include directing commercial and recreational operations from cargo to cruise ships. As Port Director she oversees a staff of twenty people, and she administers Foreign Trade Zone No. 41 whose goal it is to facilitate and expedite US participation in international trade. Ms. Carter's responsibilities are awesome as Port Milwaukee is a regional transportation center serving Illinois, Minnesota, North and South Dakota, Nebraska, Missouri, and Indiana as well as the Provinces of Alberta, Saskatchewan and Manitoba in addition to Wisconsin.

# **EDUCATION UPDATE - Bernadette Asiatidis**

The Department of Education is a federal cabinet-level agency founded in 1980. Prior to that it was part of the Department of Health, Education, and Welfare. Although education is primarily a local and state responsibility, the Department of Education provides funds on the K-12 level through its Title I program and its partial funding of special education programs. It collects and reports data on K-12 performance nationwide. There are two programs which support college students. One is the Pell Grant program which provides a maximum of \$7,395 in 2024 -2025 for students who qualify and the other is the federal student loan program which provides more generous loan terms than private sector loans.

# **LEGISLATIVE UPDATE - Diane Mee**

On December 2<sup>nd</sup>, a Dane County judge overturned Act 10, the thirteen-year-old law enacted by then-Governor Scott Walker, that effectively eliminated collective bargaining for teachers and other public employees. Efforts to overturn Act 10 recently began again in November 2023 when several unions that represented public employees filed a lawsuit saying that parts of the act were unconstitutional because they separated public employees into two distinct classes: "general" and "public safety." Public safety employees (police, firefighters, etc.) were exempt from Act 10 while teachers and other employees were not.

A proud member of the General Federation of Women's Clubs founded in 1890 during the Progressive Movement, is a federation of approximately 2,300 Women's Clubs throughout the United States which promotes civic improvements through volunteer service. Community Service Projects are organized by local clubs for the benefit of their communities. GFWC maintains nearly 60,000 members throughout the United States and Internationally. GFWC is one of the world's largest and oldest nonpartisan, nondenominational, women's volunteer service organizations.

Our largest and most successful fundraiser is the Scholarship Salad Luncheon whose proceeds are used for scholarships for West Allis and West Milwaukee graduating students.

WAWC also partners with the West Allis Police Department's W.I.S.H. Program, a support, empowerment and education group for women who are in or have been in an abusive relationship.

Operation Smile is a global, nonprofit organization providing children with life-saving surgery and care for cleft lip and palate. Club members sew hospital gowns, armbands and blankets for children having surgery.
