

O'Halloran Medical Centre Privacy Policy

Current as of: **1.12.2025 – to be reviewed June 2026**

The objective of this document is to provide you, our patient, with clear information on how your personal information is collected and used within the practice. Occasionally we also need to share your personal information to involve others in your healthcare and this policy outlines when, how, and why we share your information.

1. Who can I contact about this policy?

2. When and why is your consent necessary?

When you register as a patient of this practice, you provide consent for the GPs and practice staff to access and use your personal information to facilitate the delivery of healthcare. Access to your personal information is restricted to practice team members who require it for your care. If we ever use your personal information for purposes other than outlined in this document, we will obtain additional consent from you.

It is important to us that as our patient, you understand why we collect and use your personal information.

By acknowledging this Privacy Policy you consent to us collecting, holding, using, retaining and disclosing your personal information in the manners described below.

3. Why do we collect, use, store, and share your personal information?

The practice collects, uses, stores, and shares your personal information primarily to manage your health safely and effectively. This includes providing healthcare services, managing medical records, and ensuring accurate billing and payments. Additionally, we may utilise your information for internal quality and safety improvement processes such as practice audits, accreditation purposes, and staff training to maintain high-quality service standards.

Our practice staff carry out intensive privacy training annually through OAIC, to ensure they understand their legal obligation to keep your personal information secure at all times.

4. What personal information is collected?

The information we will collect about you includes your:

- names, date of birth, addresses, contact details
- medical information including medical history, medicines, allergies, and adverse reactions immunisations, social history, family history and risk factors. Social and family history are collected to ensure we are keeping up to date with your preventative healthcare.
- Medicare number (where available) for identification and claiming purposes
- MyMedicare registration and healthcare identifier numbers
- Concession details

5. Can you deal with us anonymously?

You can deal with us anonymously or under a pseudonym unless it is impracticable for us to do so or unless we are required or authorised by law to only deal with identified individuals.

6. How is personal information collected?

The practice may collect your personal information in several different ways:

When you make your first appointment, the practice team will collect your personal and demographic information via your registration.

We may also collect your personal information when you visit our website, send us an email or SMS, telephone us or make an online appointment,

In some circumstances, personal information may also be collected from other sources, including:

- Your guardian or responsible person.
- Other healthcare providers, such as specialists, allied health professionals, hospitals, community health services, and pathology and diagnostic imaging services.
- Your health fund, Medicare, or the Department of Veterans' Affairs (if relevant).
- While providing medical services, further personal information may be collected via:
 - electronic prescribing
 - My Health Record
 - online appointments.

Various types of images may be collected and used, including:

- **CCTV footage:** Collected from our premises for security and safety purpose. CCTV footage will never be released to the public unless when required by legal professionals in the event of an incident.
- **Photos and medical images:** These can be taken using personal devices for medical purposes, following the guidelines outlined in our guide on using personal devices for medical images. The guidelines on using personal devices for medical images align with Australian privacy obligations, particularly the Australian Privacy Principles (APPs) under the Privacy Act 1988 (Cth). The RACGP resource [Using personal mobile devices for clinical photos](#) provides further information on the considerations required when taking clinical photos on a personal mobile device that belongs to a clinician and is used outside of the workplace.

7. When, why and with whom do we share your personal information?

We sometimes share your personal information:

- with third parties for business purposes, such as accreditation agencies or information technology providers – these third parties are required to comply with APPs and this policy
- with other healthcare providers (e.g. In referral letters)
- when it is required or authorised by law (e.g. court subpoenas)
- when it is necessary to lessen or prevent a serious threat to a patient's life, health or safety or public health or safety, or it is impractical to obtain the patient's consent
- to assist in locating a missing person
- to establish, exercise or defend an equitable claim
- for the purpose of confidential dispute resolution process
- When it is a statutory requirement to share certain personal information (e.g. some diseases require mandatory notification)
- When it is provision of medical services, through electronic prescribing, My Health Record (e.g. via Shared Health Summary, Event Summary). Only people who need to access your personal information will be able to do so. Other than providing medical services or as otherwise described in this policy, the practice will not share personal information with any third party without your consent.

We do not share your personal information with anyone outside Australia (unless under exceptional circumstances that are permitted by law) without your consent.

8. Will your information be used for marketing purposes?

The practice will not use your personal information for marketing any goods or services directly to you without your express consent. If you do consent, you may opt out of direct marketing at any time by notifying the practice in writing.

9. How is your information used to improve services?

The practice may use your personal information to improve the quality of the services offered to patients through research, analysis of patient data for quality improvement and for training activities with the practice team

We may provide de-identified data to other organisations to improve population health outcomes. If we provide this information to other organisations patients cannot be identified from the information we share, the information is secure and is stored within Australia. You can let reception staff know if you do not want your de-identified information included.

At times, general practices are approached by research teams to recruit eligible patients into specific studies which require access to identifiable information. You may be approached by a member of our practice team to participate in research. Researchers will not approach you directly without your express consent having been provided to the practice. If you provide consent, you would then receive specific information on the research project and how your personal health information will be used, at which point you can decide to participate or not participate in the research project.

10. How are document automation technologies used?

Document automation is where systems use existing data to generate electronic documents relating to medical conditions and healthcare.

The practice uses document automation technologies to create documents such as referrals, which are sent to other healthcare providers. These documents contain only your relevant medical information.

These document automation technologies are used through secure medical software such as Best Practice, HealthLink Secure Messaging system and Medical Objects.

All users of the medical software have their own unique user credentials and password and can only access information that is relevant to their role in the practice team.

The practice complies with the Australian privacy legislation and APPs to protect your information.

All data, both electronic and paper are stored and managed in accordance with the Royal Australian College of General Practitioners [Privacy and managing health information guidance](#).

11. How are Artificial Intelligence (AI) Scribes used?

The practice uses an AI scribe tool to support GPs take notes during their consultations with you. The AI scribe uses an audio recording of your consultation to generate a clinical note for your health record. The practice AI scribe service is Heidi Health. Consult notes are not stored outside of our practice.

Heidi Health

- does/does not share information outside of Australia
- destroys/stores the audio file once the transcription is complete.
- removes/retains sensitive, personal identifying information as part of the transcription

The practice will only use data from our digital scribe service to provide healthcare to you. Our digital scribe will not record any identifiable information, such as name and address, outside of our secure clinical program and is not accessible outside of our practice.

12. How is your personal information stored and protected?

Your personal information may be stored in various forms.

Specify the ways in which the practice stores information, such as paper records, electronic records, visual records (e.g., X-rays, CT scans, videos, and photos), and audio recordings.

The practice stores all personal information securely.

Our electronic records are protected and backed up and only accessed by authorized staff members with individual passwords. All members of our clinic, including those who do or do not have access to patients and their care, including IT staff and cleaning staff sign privacy and confidentiality forms before being contracted to our clinic.

Our CCTV that operated inside and outside of our building is used for the sole purpose of keeping clinic staff and patients safe. This system has limited storage and is accessible only via our practice Director – Carolyn and will only be accessed via legal request for the purpose of pending prosecution of patient safety.

These systems do not, at any stage, operated inside any of the consultation rooms.

13. How can you access and correct your personal information at the practice?

You have the right to request access to, and correction of, your personal information.

The practice acknowledges patients may request access to their medical records, which should be done in writing via our request form. These request forms are available from our reception staff.

The practice will respond to any requests to access or correct your personal information within 14 days working days, depending of the GP availability.

The practice will take reasonable steps to correct your personal information where the information is not accurate or up to date. Sometimes, we will ask you to verify your personal information held by the practice is correct and current. You may request we correct or update your information. To do this please arrange an appointment to see your GP.

14. How can you lodge a privacy-related complaint, and how will the complaint be handled at the practice?

We take complaints and concerns regarding privacy seriously. If in the event, we have recognised a privacy breach regarding your personal information, we will immediately inform you of such and advise you of the steps we have taken to resolve the matter.

You should express any privacy concerns you may have with the Practice Manager. We will then attempt to resolve it in accordance with the resolution procedure.

If you do not feel we have resolved your issue You may also contact the Office of the Australian Information Commissioner. The Office of the Australian Information Commissioner will require you to give them time to respond before they investigate. 15. How is privacy on the website maintained?

At O'Halloran Medical Centre, any personal information you share with us through website and social media, is handled securely and confidentially. This practice uses analytics and cookies.
