EXHIBITORS, PARTICIPANTS & VISITORS GENERAL INFORMATION

ENTRY FORMS & TAGS

Those wishing to obtain additional entry forms may visit the web site for a downloadable version which can be printed

Entry tags may be picked up at the Fair office during the week of the Fair between the following times when the office will be open:

TUESDAY: 9:30 am to 1:00 pm; WEDNESDAY: 9:30 am to 2:00 pm; THURSDAY: 9:30 am to 2:00 pm.

Tags may also be obtained at the times when Exhibits will be received at the North door of the main building: THURSDAY from 6:00 pm to 8:00 pm, and FRIDAY from 8:00 am until 12 Noon.

Entry tags may also be picked up in advance after July 1st by visiting "Barn & Bunkie", located at 41 Lindsay Street in Fenelon Falls, during their regular business hours.

OPERATION: The Fenelon Agricultural Society (Fenelon Fair) operates under the auspice of the "Agricultural and Horticultural Organizations Act" in the province of Ontario, which is administered by the Ontario Ministry of Agriculture, Food, and Rural Affairs.

Under the rules of the above named Act, the Fenelon Agricultural Society has the right to prohibit any theatrical, circus or other acrobatic performance; and the sale of goods and produce on the exhibition grounds operated by the Society, or within 275 metres thereof on the days of an exhibition or event organized by the Society.

DRAW TICKETS: No draw tickets are to be sold on the premises during the Fair unless the proceeds are given to the Society to be dispersed as prize money at their discretion.

VENDING/SELLING: The vending or selling of goods or distribution of promotional material is to be conducted from authorized booths only.

ALCOHOL: Alcohol is prohibited other than in a licensed facility on the grounds sanctioned by the Agricultural Society if one should exist.

DOGS: Dogs are allowed only if on a short leash, with one animal per adult handler. Handlers are expected to be in complete control of their animals at all times. Cleanup bags are a must.

ADMISSION: Admission to the Fair shall be as follows:

Adults - \$12.00; Seniors - \$10.00; Students 14 to 18 - \$10.00; Elementary & Pre-School - FREE; Parking \$5.00, Weekend Passes: \$24.00 for Adults, \$20.00 for Seniors and Teens.

CAMPING: A limited number of camp sites will be available from Friday until Sunday. Sites include washroom access. No electrical hookup is provided. Cost is \$40.00 per site plus regular admission to the Fair for the weekend. Contact the Secretary for further information.

ANNUAL MEETING: It is the intent of the Society to hold the 2026 Annual Meeting of the Fenelon Agricultural Society on Saturday, November 21, 2026 – location to be announced. Contact the Secretary or check the web site & facebook page for further information and date/time verification.

RULES AND REGULATIONS FOR EXHIBITORS

- 1 – RULES:** All Exhibitors participating at the Fenelon Fair are governed by the “General Rules for Exhibitors” listed in this prize list, as well as specific rules that may be listed within any division or section. It is the responsibility of every exhibitor to be familiar with these rules and abide by same.
- 2 – MEMBERSHIP:** All exhibitors will be charged a membership fee of \$10.00, which shall be paid at the time of making entries. Membership is not required for those participating only in “Junior” classes. Any Junior wishing to enter in a Senior class that is open to adults must pay the membership fee.
- 3 – ADMISSION:** Those paying a membership fee will be allowed one free admission to the grounds during the Fair by using the appropriate stub from their membership card.
- 4 – OWNERSHIP –** All exhibits must be the bona fide property of the exhibitor.
- 5 – JUDGE’S DECISION:** - In all cases the Judge’s decision shall be final.
- 6 – NUMBER OF ANIMALS:** An exhibitor may not show more than two animals in any one section, except group entries where only one entry is allowed per exhibitor, unless otherwise noted in their specific division.
- 7 – NUMBER OF ENTRIES:** Exhibitors are allowed a maximum of one entry in each section unless otherwise noted in the rules for that particular division.
- 8 – ENTRY FEES:** Unless otherwise noted for their division, 10% will be deducted from the winnings of \$10.00 and over in lieu of entry fees.
- 9 – PRIZE MONEY:** Prize Money for Junior Arts and Crafts will be paid to exhibitors in cash, and may be picked up starting Saturday afternoon from the Fair Office. Prize money for Homecraft and Agricultural Products will be paid by cheque, and cheques will be made available to the exhibitors when they pick up their exhibits after on Sunday. Prize money for all other divisions will be paid by cheque and will be mailed out as soon as possible following the Fair, with the exception of some sections or events which may be paid at ringside. All cheques must be cashed no later than December 31st of the current year.
- 10 – WORTHINESS OF EXHIBITS:** No animal or article deemed unworthy shall be awarded a prize. No prize shall be withheld merely because there is no other competition but the Judge shall award the grade of premium according to the merits of the animal or article.
- 11 – SOCIETY LOSS:** In the event of the Society being unable to pay the prize money in full due to bad weather or any other cause over which the Society has no control, a reduction may be made on prize money. This rule will not be enforced unless absolutely necessary.
- 12 – PROTESTS:** Protests must be made in writing and signed, and filed with the Secretary together with a deposit of \$75.00 on the day of the Fair. Deposit will be forfeited if protest is not sustained.
- 13 – SAFETY OF EXHIBITS:** The Society will use every precaution to ensure the safety of exhibits entrusted in its care. The Society, it’s Directors, Volunteers and Stakeholders however, will not be responsible for lost, damaged, or stolen items in the buildings or on the grounds.
- 14 – RISK:** Those attending or participating in the competitions, activities or attractions sanctioned by the Fenelon Agricultural Society do so at their own risk, and shall not hold The Society, it’s Directors, Members, contractors, partners or stakeholders responsible for any accident, loss or damage.

15 – INTERPRETATION: The right to alter, interpret, amend, add or cancel any of these rules or grant relaxation from them in individual cases is limited to the Board of Directors of the Fenelon Agricultural Society.

RULES:

- 1 – Each adult exhibitor must become a member of the Fenelon Agricultural Society by paying the annual membership fee of \$10.00 to be paid at the time of making entries.
- 2 – Exhibitors may make entries on show day or send entry form in advance accompanied by the required fees. Please make entries no later than 9:30 AM on the day of the show.
- 3 – All horses are to be well mannered and under control at all times.
- 4 – Exhibitors must be ready to enter the ring promptly when classes are called
- 5 – The Judge's decision is final in all aspects of this show. The Judge or Committee chairman may at any time excuse an entry from the ring and/or show.
- 6 – This is not a recognized show. The rules and guidelines for this show are provided in this prize list.
- 7 – All exhibitors must have Off Farm Liability Insurance. Please provide policy number on entry form.
- 8 – The General Rules of the Fenelon Agricultural Society apply to this division unless otherwise noted.
- 9 – Walk-Trot/Jog exhibitors can show in Open Halter, Youth / Open Showmanship, Walk-Trot English Equitation, Walk-Jog Western Horsemanship, Jack Benny – Walk, Jog/Trot (must be 40 years or older) and Mystery Class. Exhibitors can not show in Open classes.
- 10 – Exhibitors who show in Open classes can not cross enter into Walk-Trot/Jog Classes.

Open / Mini Halter Judged on the confirmation of the horse. All horses will walk in the ring individually, set up at the first cone, once acknowledged by the Judge, walk to the Judge. As the horse approaches, the Judge will step to the side to allow the horse to trot away and into line (Judges' discretion - either tails to the rail or nose to tail) for individual inspection.

Youth / Open / Mini Showmanship Judged on the exhibitors showmanship and presentation. A pattern will be posted prior to the class. Each exhibitor will execute the pattern one participant at a time and trot into line.

Lead Line Exhibitors 6 years and under. Open to English & Western riders. Horses must be led by an adult (16 years or older) with a bridle along with a halter and shank overtop of the bridle. A spotter for young riders is encouraged. Exhibitor will be asked to walk, halt and back up. Line up as directed by the judge or ring steward. Exhibitors entering in this class can not enter in any other class except Costume Class.

Walk, Jog/Trot Exhibitors 10 years and under - for beginners who have not loped/cantered. Open to English & Western riders. Exhibitors must ride the horse and not be led. Exhibitors will be asked to walk, jog/trot and back up both directions of the ring and will be judged on the way of going of the horse. The horse should be a pleasure to ride. Western riders may ride with both hands.

Walk-Trot English Equitation Judged on the rider's seat, hands, suitability of horse and rider and performance. To be shown at the walk and trot. Judge may also ask for an extended or collected trot and back up. Exhibitors showing in this class can not show in the Open classes.

Open English Equitation Judged on the rider's seat, hands, suitability of horse and rider and performance. To be shown at the walk, trot and canter. Judge may also ask for an extended or collected trot and extended or collected canter and back up.

Open English Pleasure Judged on the way of going of the horse. The horse should be a pleasure to ride with light-maintained rein contact at all gaits. To be shown at the walk, trot and canter.

Walk-Jog Western Horsemanship Judged on the rider's seat, hands, suitability of horse and rider and performance. To be shown at the walk and jog. Judge may also ask for an extended jog and back up. Exhibitors showing in this class can not show in the Open classes.

Open Western Equitation Judged on the rider's seat, hands, suitability of horse and rider and performance. To be shown at the walk, jog and lope. Judge may also ask for an extended jog and lope and back up.

Open Western Pleasure Judged on the way of going of the horse. The horse should be a pleasure to ride with a loose rein. To be shown at the walk, jog and lope.

Jack Benny - Walk, Jog/Trot Exhibitors 40 years and older. Open to English & Western riders. Exhibitors must ride the horse and not be led. Exhibitors will be asked to walk and jog/trot both directions of the ring and will be judged on the way of going of the horse. The horse should be a pleasure to ride.

Open Command Open to English & Western riders. Commands will be announced; last rider(s) to perform the command will be called into the middle of the ring. Commands will be called until there is one rider left. Last rider is the winner of the class. Judge may ask for (but not limited to) walk, jog/trot, lope/canter, counter canter/lope, hand gallop, back up, halt, change rein/reverse, dismount, mount and side pass.

Mini Trail Open to English & Western riders but must be shown with appropriate attire (example: no English rider with Western saddle, no Western boots on English riders and no short sleeves). Pattern will be posted prior to class. Exhibitors will be asked to complete different obstacles in a pattern at a walk, jog/trot. Judged on performance, way of going and manners. 60 seconds or two attempts will be given per obstacle, then the exhibitor must move onto the next obstacle. Natural obstacles may include, but not limited to: bridge, gate, mailbox, poles, side pass and back up. This is NOT a timed event.

Open Trail Open to English & Western riders but must be shown with appropriate attire (example: no English rider with Western saddle, no Western boots on English riders and no short sleeves). Pattern will be posted prior to class. Exhibitors will be asked to complete different obstacles in a pattern at a walk, jog/trot, lope/canter on a loose rein (English riders must use two hands, except at the gate). All riders may not change hands on reins other than at the gate. Judged on performance, way of going and manners. 60 seconds or two attempts will be given per obstacle, then the exhibitor must move onto the next obstacle. Natural obstacles may include, but not limited to: bridge, gate, mailbox jog/trot/lope/canter poles, side pass and back up. This is NOT a timed event.

Mystery Class Open to Mini, Walk-Trot/Jog, Open English & Western riders. Walk, jog/trot. This class is a fun class and will be announced the day of the show. Class could be Boot Race, Egg & Spoon, Musical Buckets etc.

Open Flag Race Open to English & Western riders. Timed Event. Run down either side of barrel 'A', grab the flag. Continue to run and around barrel 'B'. Deposit flag back in barrel 'A'. Cross the finish line. If the flag misses the barrel a 5 second penalty will be added.

Open Pole Bending Open to English & Western riders. Timed Event. Run down the ring, either to the right or left of the poles. Serpentine your way down and then back up the poles then run down the opposite side over the finish line. A knocked over pole is a 5 second penalty.

Open Barrel Race Open to English & Western riders. Timed Event. Cloverleaf pattern to be performed either to the left or the right. A knocked over barrel is a 5 second penalty.

Walk-Trot Barrel Race Open to English & Western riders. Timed Event. Cloverleaf pattern to be performed either to the left or the right at a walk or trot. A knocked over barrel is a 5 second penalty.

Open & Mini Costume Open to all riders, both young and young at heart. Costumes to be made prior to the show and should fit the horse and rider. There is no theme. Be creative, but safe and have FUN!

- 5 – Calves from sections 9 and 10 will not be allowed to be shown singularly except as part of the Breeders Herd and Get of Sire.
- 6 – All exhibitors must have Off Farm Liability Insurance. Please provide Policy number on entry form.
- 7 – Pedigrees for animals may be requested.
- 8 – CCIA Tag numbers need to be included on your entry form.
- 9 – No cattle may be removed from the grounds before 4 PM. In the event of extreme heat cattle may be released early at the discretion of the Committee Chairman.
- 10 – The Premises ID # for the Fenelon Fairgrounds is ON212874. Exhibitors please list the premises ID number on your entry form that pertains to your herd.

- 1 – This division open to all members in the Fenelon 4-H Beef Club.
- 2 – There will be no entry fee.
- 3 – All calves must be on the grounds and stabled before 9:30 am Saturday.
- 4 – The 4-H motto is “Learn To Do By Doing”. This means that a 4-H Member learns skills by actually doing the activities related to those skills. Therefore we hope that all adults who are interested in 4-H members, be they be 4-H Leaders, parents, extension staff or other interested people, will support the philosophy of the 4-H motto and will refrain from interfering with the members opportunities to develop skills related to this project.
- 5 – In all classes the group system of placing will be followed. Classes may be combined classes.
