

2022 INTERNATIONAL CONFERENCE OF NGOs

UNESCO Headquarters (Room II), 14-16 December 2022

Summary Report

I. Introduction

The 2022 International Conference of NGOs in Official Partnership with UNESCO took place from December 14-16 at UNESCO Headquarters at UNESCO Headquarters in Paris, France, and online (on Zoom and webcast), on the theme "Breaking barriers — What role for civil society organizations towards a sustainable future".

130 NGOs in official partnership with UNESCO attended the Conference (see the List in Annex I)

This Summary Report aims at providing an overview of the Conference and information on the elections held on this occasion. For more detail, please consider the Annex documents, and the full video recordings hosted on the Liasion Committee website.

II. Opening of the Conference

Ms. Sabina Colombo, Head of the UNESCO Unit for Civil Society Partnerships introduced Mr Firmin Matoko, Assistant Director-General for Priority Africa and External Relations, Representative of the Director-General of UNESCO on this occasion, and Mr Davide Grosso, Chairperson of the International Conference of NGOs, who opened the session (see their addresses in Annex III).

III. Adoption of the Agenda

In accordance with its Rules of Procedure, the Conference adopted the Agenda of the meeting (see in Annex IV), and constituted the Bureau of the Conference (ensured by the Liaison Committee), as well as the Commission of Elections (see Section XII of this Report)

The Conference also constituted the **Drafting Group for the Recommendations** as follows: Mr Patrick Gallaud (AFAL), Ms Laura Regouby (Rotary International), Ms Catherinz Thiounn (WFB), Ms Yu Qi Zhou and Ms Yifan Zhou (IPSF).

The Secretariat provided a presentation on the election procedures, outlining the rules applying and the modalitities of voting (detailed information are available in the relevant documents provided to all NGOs prior to the Conference – see on the Liason Committee website).

Before moving to the next item, Ms Vicky Lovelock, Vice-Chairperson of the Liaison Comittee expressed condolences on behalf of the Comittee for the loss of Mr Thierry Brault and shared the following in his memory: "We recently learned of the passing of a dear college, Mr Thierry Brault, representative of the Catholic International Education Office (OIEC), former member of the NGO-UNESCO Liaison Committee, with whom I had the pleasure to work in my first mandates. Having just arrived to my position as Director of CCIVS in 2013 and being elected to the Committee in 2014, I was finding my way in the realms of UNESCO and the work of the Committee. I had to prove myself being (at that time) a young and inexperienced member of the team. I hold fond memories of our travel to China for the Forum "Rapprochement of Cultures: One Humanity beyond Diversity" -, the Fifth International Forum of NGOs in 2015, sitting together on the bus and sharing stories. Thierry was warm and friendly, funny and very supportive. I was thinking of him recently and was looking forward to meeting him again during this Conference, instead, I have the honour of respecting his memory and thanking him on behalf of the Committee for all of his work and dedication."



IV. Approval of the Activity Report and Financial Report of the NGO-UNESCO Liaison Committee

In accordance with the Agenda, Ms Teresa Kennedy (International Council of Associations for Science Education - ICASE), Secretary of the NGO-UNESCO Liaison Committee, presented the activity report. Members of the LC shared sections of the report. The NGO International Movement of Students (PAX ROM) requested formatting changes to facilitate comprehension of the report and this was agreed. Questions/comments were addressed.

Mr. Philippe Beaussant (International Council of Organizations for Folklore Festivals and Folk Art - CIOFF), Treasurer of the NGO-UNESCO Liaison Committee, prepared the financial report which was presented by Jean Pascal Mariot, CIOFF Alternate Representative. Particular concern was expressed by delegates that a low number of NGOs had made the voluntrary contributions, and all NGOs in Official Partnership were encouraged to prioritise this in the new mandate, and the incoming Liaison Committee urged to consider the financial strategy to ensure the strength of its position. All other questions and comments were addressed.

The morning session was closed with the viewing of a video prepared by the group of NGOs working on the International Day of Peace and showcasing these NGO's efforts in celebrating the International Day.

V. Thematic session – "Multistakeholder approaches to achieve the SDGs: Opportunities and challenges for NGOs."

Moderated by Mr. Julien Pellaux, Director of the Division for Partnerships, Bureau of Strategic Planning, UNESCO, this session featured presentations by the following speakers:

- Ms. Lopa Banerjee, Executive Coordinator, Generation Equality & Director of the Civil Society Division, UN Women;
- Mr. Abdelbasset Ben Hassen, President of the Arab Institute for Human Rights (AIHR), Tunisia;
- Ms. Célie Denez, Youth Representative Education and Life Skills, World Organization of the Scout Movement (WOSM);
- Ms. Racha Omeyri, Intercultural Research Officer, Anna Lindh Foundation; and
- Ms. Simona Costanzo Sow, Learning Portfolio Manager, United Nations System Staff College (UNSSC).

Specific suggestions to NGOs included ensuring activities are actionable and when assessing impact, not only measure national efforts but also seek data on international efforts to give credit to international programmes and their reach; Investing in leadership; Sharing knowledge from local organizations; Empowering youth; Reaching out to policy makers; Encouraging work and dialogue among peers to share experiences; Addressing language barriers; Ensuring gender equity; and Involving civil society at every point along the way to ensure relevancy.

VI. Survey on the implementation of the Directives concerning UNESCO's partnership with NGOs: Presentation of the results.

Ms Vicky Lovelock summarized the survey undertaken by the Liaison Committee, and encouraged all NGOs that had not yet responded to the survey to please do so. A recommendation was made from the floor to create a working committee to make recommendations for member states based on results received.

VII. Brainstorming on the work programme for 2023-2024.

This was a detailed discussion with lively input from many NGOs. Please see the final recommendations included in Annex VI of this document, and posted on the Liaison Committee website.

VIII. "NGOs Open Space"

As customary, the traditional **"NGO Open Space"** (stands and presentations of activities) was organized on **15 December** from 2:00 to 3:30 pm in the "Salle des Pas Perdus" (Fontenoy building, ground floor). NGOs registered for this occasion (see in annex II) were able to present their activities and interact with participants. All participating NGOs were thanked for their efforts in creating a rich and vibrant space for collaboration.



IX. Thematic session — "The evolving role and future of civil society organizations (CSOs) and partnerships in the global movement for the transformation of education in a fast changing and challenging world."

Moderated by Ms. Marie-Claude Machon-Honoré (BPW International), NGO-UNESCO Liaison Committee representative to the CCNGO-Education2030, this session featured presentations by the following representatives:

- Mr. Refaat Sabbah, President of the Global Campaign for Education, Secretary General of the Arab Campaign for Education;
- Mr. Vernor Muñoz, Former United Nations Special Rapporteur for the Right to Education, Advocacy and Campaigns Coordinator of the Global Campaign for Education;
- Ms. Anne-Marie Chavanon, International Federation for Housing and Planning (IFHP), Chair of the Committee on Environmental and Health Crisis: Governance and Solidarity, Conference of INGOs of the Council of Europe;
- Ms. Nelsy Lizarazo, General Coordinator of the Latin American Campaign for the Right to Education (CLADE);
- Ms. Marie-Françoise Chavanne, Past World President of the International Society for Education through Art (INSEA); and
- Ms. Helen Dabu, Secretary-General of the Asia South Pacific Association for Basic and Adult Education (ASPBAE).

Conclusions were presented by Ms. Giovanna Modé, Policy Coordinator, Latin American Campaign for the Right to Education (CLADE).

At a time when the world is facing multiple crises and challenges, never has our partnership with the CCNGO- Ed2030 through cross-sectoral engagement been so critical to advocate for the human right to Education. Mr Sabat addressed Education at Risk, exploring the crisis in education with enduring challenges i.e gender equality, justice or democracies, claiming education is not only about academic outcomes but social ones for peace. Mr Vernoz spoke on Education and Emotional Learning, questioning the differentiation between soft/ hard skills, south/north, science/culture, technique/ art, emotion /reason. "Learning is a vital activity built on the interactive language of people with the world".

Ms Chavanne demonstrated through practice how Education through Arts can foster creativity, self esteem, altruism, and critical thinking, calling for less competition, more space for time and reflection for learners to discover the world, themselves and otherness. Ms Chavanon addressed CSOs, UNESCO, the Council of Europe in the face of climate change and the pandemic. She praised NGOs for being cocreators of solutions across sectors, recalling Education from an early age, in a lifelong perspective can change mindsets and bridge the ethic gap for solidarity and humanity sake. Ms Lizaro talked on the right to education and digitalisation, access to open resources, warning against violation of rights and privacy, generation of profits and more inequalities. In the LA region, digitalisation can be seen as a potential lever to transform the conditions of injustice and inequity only with digital literacy, access to quality and affordable connectivity for human development, with and for everyone. Ms Dabu representing CCNGO in HLSC Sherpa Group praised CSOs' significant contributions to the Transforming Education Summit, affirming education as a human right, preserving the full SDG4 and strengthening the global coordination body-HLSC as a critical global space for SDG4. UN-TES elevated education at the top of the global political agenda with youth as actors- a call for commitment to action to achieve SDG4 targets including, inter alia, functional literacy, ECCE, ALE, women and girls education, support for teachers, GCE and ESD- a Call to Action on Educational Financing.

Ms Giovanna Modé concluded learning was a vital process and our challenge to realise the transformation of education by changing mindsets, rethinking the whole system in an intersecting dialogue for the power of inclusive education to bring about profound change for social justice and peace.



X. Presentation of the Position Paper on Youth

Ms. Célie Denez, Youth Representative, World Organization of the Scout Movement (WOSM), provided a summary of the work completed and the recommendations made, which included the previously developed Youth Advocacy Guidelines. See the Position Paper included in Annex V.

XI. Thematic session – "Stronger together: Working with National Commissions"

Moderated by Mr. Patrick McCann (World Committee for Lifelong Learning - CMA) and Mr. Nick Newland (Associated Country Women of the World - ACWW), members of the NGO-UNESCO Liaison Committee, this session featured presentations by the following representatives:

- Ms. Claire Rozier, Clowns without Borders International;
- Ms. Olga Legacka, International Association for the Exchange of Students for Technical Experience (IAESTE);
- Dr. Mr N'golo Aboudou Soro, Secretary General of the Côte d'Ivoire National Commission for UNESCO;
- Mr. James Bridge, Secretary General of the United Kingdom National Commission for UNESCO;
 and
- Mr. David Schimpky, Director of Secretariat of the Canadian Commission for UNESCO.

Recommendations made included continuing the efforts of the Working Group on Strengthening Cooperation with the National Commissions, providing resources such as those produced by the French National Commission and the new series of brochures that will be produced by the German National Commission; and inviting National Commissions in all countries where NGOs are working to take part in meetings. We note with gratitude the participation of Mr Jacques Rao of the French National Commission in ths session, as well as the representatives from Côte d'Ivoire, Canada, and the UK who joined via Zoom.

XII. Elections of the Chairperson of the International Conference of NGOs and of the NGO-UNESCO Liaison Committee

The elections of the Chairperon of the International Conference as well as of the members of the NGO-UNESCO Liaison Committee took place online, in accordance with the 2020 ICNGO Recommendations, on the independent platform "ElectionBuddy" in accordance with the procedure and timetable detailed in the Information Note on the elections, made available to NGOs in official partnership prior to the Conference and also on the website of the Conference. At its first plenary meeting on Wednesday 14 December 2022, the Conference constituted the Elections Committee to oversee the voting procedure, assisted by the Secretariat, appointing the following four (4) tellers from among the organizations not candidates for the elections: Ms Marcia Alvarez Melo (AIED); Ms. Célie Denez (WOSM), Ms Vicky Lovelock (CCIVS), and Ms Béatrice Naegeli (CISV International).

Election of the Chairperson of the International Conference

The election of the Chairperson was held in a single secret ballot on 14 December 2022. Two (2) persons, members of organizations in official partnership, were candidates for this election where one (1) seat was to be filled. In accordance with the Rules of Procedure, the candidate having obtained more than half of the valid votes cast (not counting abstentions) was declared elected: **Mr Nick Newland**, presented by the Associated Country women in the World (ACWW) (details on the results of the ballot can be found on the Liaison Committee website). Election of the members of the NGO-UNESCO Liaison Committee

The election of the members of the NGO-UNESCO Liaison Committee was held in two secret ballots. Twenty-six (26) organizations were candidates for this election where ten (10) seats were to be filled.

The first ballot, based on geographical distribution, took place on 14 December 2022, allowing the election of organizations having its headquarters in one of the regions as defined by UNESCO. Since only one nomination per region was submitted for four (4) regions: Africa, Arab States, Asia and the



Pacific, and Latin America and the Caribbean, the NGO candidates for these regions were declared elected without the need to hold a ballot in accordance with the Rules of Procedure (Article I.2 of the Annex).

NGOs nominated for the two (2) remaining regions, Eastern Europe and Western Europe and others, were included on the ballot. The following two organizations were declared elected:

- SOZOPOL Foundation, NGO with consultative status based in Eastern Europe; and
- International Association for Exchange of Students for Technical Experience (IAESTE), NGO with consultative status based in Western Europe.

The second ballot took place on 15 December 2022, allowing election of the remaining seats per partnership status (associate and consultative). In accordance with the Rules of Procedure of the Conference (Article I.2 of the Annex), as there were four (4) seats to be filled for the associate status and a total of four (4) candidates with associate status, the representation for this group was declared fulfilled and a ballot was not necessary for the partnership status of associate.

The second ballot therefore conducted for the remaining <u>seat to be filled</u> by one of the remaining fifteen (15) candidate NGOs with consultative status. The following NGO was declared elected: **International Council for Associations of Science Education (ICASE).**

Thanks were given to all members of the 2020-22 Liaison Committee and a presentation of the newly-elected Chairperson, Mr. Nick Newland, and all members of the 2022-2024 NGO-UNESCO Liaison Committee was made. If I ask you, right now, what the biggest challenge in today's world I am pretty sure that there will be many different answers: education, climate change, peace...

And although all these topics are indeed very important, we should for one moment think about the huge diversity that is represented here today, online and offline, and how we can transform this diversity in the driving force for the future.

How can we demonstrate better to our partners that we are not a threat, we are allies.

Annex V: Youth Position Paper

Building towards a Sustainable Future using Synergies with, and among, Youth

Vision

Young people have potential and an increasingly important role to play through advocacy and intervention for achieving meaningful change and progress in educational, scientific, social and cultural avenues, as change-makers and leaders of tomorrow, as there is an urgent need to create more space and opportunities for them to contribute to decision-making through non-tokenistic leadership roles and global youth mobilization, within NGOs and beyond.

Background

The United Nations adopted the Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs) in 2015 to call for ending poverty, protecting the planet, and ensuring that people across the world enjoy peace and prosperity by 2030 [1-6]. To achieve these goals, young people not only have the right to a voice but also disparate platforms to advocate for causes they believe in and network with individuals they relate to [7-10]. The world in its present circumstances faces new challenges that are emerging, even as we find that old ones are changing in their forms, to thereby present difficulties over and above any mitigation strategies utilized against them. These challenges vary from climate change, resource depletion, poverty, and malnutrition to illiteracy, deculturalization, conflict, changing disease patterns, as well as gender, racial and ethnical inequalities.

Non-governmental organizations have played a pivotal role in not only supplementing the governmental responses to these challenges, but in also taking the initiative in eradicating these challenges based on their capacities and involvement at the grassroots [11-13]. Within such organizations, youth participation has become imperative to initiate policies and programs for sustainable change. However, there is still a lot to be done to encourage and increase youth mobilization and involvement in the work and decision-making of NGOs and social movements for positive change in the world. The United Nations defines 'youth' as individuals aged between 15 and 24, although this definition is flexible. 'Youth' is a rather fluid category, with the experience of being young varying substantially across the world, between regions and nations, and therefore, context is always an important element in one's definition of youth. This contextual approach to engaging with, and encouraging, youth participation and mobilization is important.

In the past, access to opportunities and leadership positions and experiences for the youth in various non-governmental organizations and social movements have been limited. Young leaders can help in building on their individual and organizational values and processes, and establish effective modes of contributing to the operations of their organization(s). Furthermore, it is commonly seen that toptier leaderships are not always connected with the youth members in the organization in a regular and systematic manner. It is pertinent to address this communication gap, and facilitate intergenerational dialogue, mentoring and capacity building exercises in order to facilitate youth contribution to activities and decision-making within the organization in an informed and comprehensive way. Addressing the needs and interests of the youth, which constitutes a community in itself and must be regarded as such, requires us to realize that ours is a world that is increasingly recognizing and respecting the diversity of individuals, within and across generations.

When young people are given the opportunity to stand for what they believe in and understand that their voices can foster positive change in the world, especially when equipped with knowledge, opportunities, and tools to undertake proactive initiatives to address challenges faced by our world, they can stand for their beliefs and causes with courage, pride and ability. Youth have the ingenuity, the potential, and the capacity to make meaningful change happen – for themselves, for their communities, and for the world at large. We believe that we must encourage engagement of youth



in NGOs' actions from design and strategy to implementation and follow-up, with the creation of spaces for youth within organizations, in their communities by scaling up youth-led initiatives, by promoting partnerships and in policies by integrating youth concerns, issues and interests.

Recommendations

General Recommendations

As youth-representatives associated with a myriad of NGOs and movements around the world, we posit and propose points of interest and relevance to promote youth participation and leadership for meaningful change in educational, scientific, social, and cultural directions. We believe that:

- young people are best placed to determine the interests of youth and should be given ample space, opportunity, and support to pursue their issues of interest.
- it is essential to create spaces for youth within NGOs and beyond, wherein youth-members can proactively discuss and initiate actions to contribute towards the aim of their respective organization.
- young people must be recognized as both individuals and members of a community with distinct interests, objectives and tendencies, which have to be harnessed, in synergy with the thinking and functioning of the senior members and leadership.
- it is of utmost importance to facilitate non-tokenistic leadership opportunities for youthmembers, particularly at the very highest levels of the organizational structure.
- specific responsibilities, clear communication channels and prioritizing awareness-building
 exercises relating to various deliberations and policy-steps (especially of and by the
 organizational leadership) can be helpful in enabling the youth to make informed and
 proactive contributions to the organization.
- modularity and a decentralized engagement process of the organizational leadership with the youth-members will encourage their involvement and participation.
- youth-participation in NGOs can be encouraged and promoted with comprehensive mentoring and capacity-building of the youth-members within the organization that facilitate value-addition and increase in knowledge and competence of youth-members, thereby equipping them with the requisite resources to contribute to the work and decision-making processes of the organization.
- a 'bottom-up' structure within organizations helps feed information on activism and advocacy undertaken by young people at the grassroots to the top tiers of the organization and recommend a collaborative spirit within the organization and beyond, among the youth-members and between the youth-members and other stakeholders, particularly the organizational leadership.
- inclusivity and diversity must be encouraged by organizations in their youth membership and leadership. We believe that intersectionality must be considered in the formulation of ways to engage with, and encourage the participation of, youth with diverse identities, in the work and decision making of the organization.
- there needs to be independence of assessment by organizations based on distinct conditions in various countries of origin and/or operation to ascertain the strategies for encouraging youth advocacy as well as the basis for greater inclusivity and diversity in their organization.

Specific Recommendations

- effective and regular dialogue and engagement with and among youth members can be undertaken with the creation of intra-organizational and widely representative youth modules that can conduct regular discussion groups and propose policy/program suggestions to the organizational leadership.
- non-tokenistic leadership positions and specific roles for youth-members can be facilitated by ensuring young people have chances to have ownership and leadership over processes,



regularly incorporating suggestions and points by the youth leaders in minutes of meetings, policy, and position papers, as well as strategy plans for the organization.

- simulation exercises (particularly with case-studies) can be used to build empathy and give youth an experience taking difficult action-steps in real time, while reflection activities can help the youth to personally engage with the organization's work and think more critically and deeply on what they are engaging with.
- a central hub of information and resources, relating to the work and decision-making of the
 organization, that is easily accessible to all youth members (online and/or offline) should be
 created.
- opportunities within organizations should be created for capacity building and value addition
 of youth-members, with both 'hard skills' (such as organizational management and modes of
 outreach) and 'soft skills' (such as communication skills and management of interpersonal
 conflict).
- opportunities for youth-members and leaders to interact with senior members and leaders in organizations could be in the form of shadowing schemes, mentoring programs or buddy schemes (especially for mentors-mentees who do not have a big difference in age).
- there must be an emphasis on creating opportunities to provide more exposure to young leaders, helping them network and find new and innovative opportunities to express themselves.
- the existing youth-leaders within organizations can be encouraged to reach out to their communities through outreach programs to inspire and motivate more young people to join the organization and cause.
- a variety of technologies can also be utilized to spread the word about the work of the organization and engage with the youth beyond the organizational membership.
- the prioritization of collaborations between different cross-sections of the membership is recommended, particularly with and among youth-members, as well as collaborations with external bodies and organizations such as grassroot youth-movements.
- inclusivity and diversity within an organization can be promoted by ensuring that young people of varying backgrounds and identities are given equal and equitable chances at assuming leadership roles.
- organizations must promote greater inclusivity for young persons with disabilities and other
 under-represented identities or intersection of identities in the work and decision-making of
 the organization(s). Promotion of inclusivity should be followed by annual intersectionality
 reviews and associated reports to ensure accountability.
- paid internship programs and international voluntary service for the youth will provide a
 good opportunity to youth non-members to get acquainted with the fundamentals of the
 functioning, work and decision-making of the organization. We consider that student
 exchange programs are also beneficial in this regard.

Conclusion

After discussing the contemporary realities of youth involvement in advocating for disparate social causes, we believe the above recommendations will facilitate the promotion of youth participation and creation of more space for youth leaders in non-governmental organizations and beyond. In this, clarity of roles, access to information and opportunities, inclusivity in approach, capacity-building, and mentorship, as well as inter-generational dialogues and a collaborative spirit for functioning within the organization are seen to be primary. We hope that these policy-suggestions will be considered and implemented by the organizations and our position can help build a sustainable tomorrow using synergies with, and among, young people.



Annex VI: Final Recommendations of the ICNGO 2022

Recommendations of the International Conference of NGOs 2022 (ICNGO 2022)



The International Conference of NGOs met at UNESCO Headquarters and online from 14 to 16 December 2022 on the theme of "Breaking barriers – What role for civil society organisations towards a sustainable future?".

Gathered as a group with shared ideals, the International Conference of NGOs,

Bearing in mind UNESCO's Constitution and mission that "As a specialised agency of the United Nations, UNESCO (...) contributes to the building of peace, the eradication of poverty, and sustainable development and intercultural dialogue through education, the sciences, culture, communication and information"; Ref. (41C/4)

Recalling the UNESCO Medium-Term Strategy for 2022-2029 (41C/4);

Reaffirming the commitment to the 2030 Agenda for Sustainable Development;

Further reaffirming the essential role of NGOs, as actors of civil society, in the development and implementation of UNESCO's programmes in its five fields of competence (Education, Natural Sciences, Social and Human Sciences, Culture, Communication and Information) and in supporting individuals and communities at risk of marginalisation and ensuring the inclusion of the diverse NGOs voices.

Recognising the historically unprecedented global context created by climate change, including disaster and forced migration, and the health crisis affecting all populations;

Expressing concern over wars, conflicts, and violence in many parts of the world, which threaten peace and sustainable development of all countries and peoples, and which exacerbates the existential threat to the world's most vulnerable;

Noting the rising political polarisation and the urgent need to act collectively in the face of worsening inequalities and poverty to build a more inclusive, equal, and informed global community;

Thanking the outgoing members of the NGO-UNESCO Liaison Committee, under the Chairpersonship of Mr Davide Grosso, for their tireless work and the success of a multitude of activities and initiatives;

Restating the high regard of all NGOs in official partnership for the Director-General, Mrs Audrey Azoulay, for her achievements and the continuous support of the NGO-UNESCO Liaison Committee; and

Recognising that the NGO-UNESCO Liaison Committee plays a fostering role in the cooperation with UNESCO through the network of NGOs in Official Partnership and acts as a catalyst for collective cooperation;

Recommends to the Liaison Committee:

 To continue the work undertaken by the Liaison Committee in the 2020-2022 mandate on strengthening partnership with the National Commissions for UNESCO and on broadening the participation of civil society in the International Decade for Indigenous Languages and the Ocean Decade, as well as the implementation of the Directives.



- To establish a stronger, more effective, and more meaningful engagement of youth representation from NGOs in the activities led by the Liaison Committee, as well as fostering their closer engagement in UNESCO activities, including considering the reservation of a seat for youth-led participation in the Liaison Committee
- To maintain and strengthen the relationship with the Collective Consultation of NGOs on Education 2030 (CCNGO-Education 2030), recognising the unique opportunities provided by the ex officio seat held by the Liaison Committee
- To consider the following themes (in alphabetical order), as well as the programmatic
 priorities of UNESCO in line with the Director General's indication to this effect, when
 organising international forums as requested by the Directives:
 - o Art, Science, and Technology in Africa
 - Artificial Intelligence and Youth
 - Climate
 - Culture as a pillar of the Sustainable Development Goals
 - o Education (including relating to Sustainable Development, Protection and Education
 - o for Early Childhood, the Right to Education, and Gender) o Peace and Development
 - o Peace, Nonviolence, and Human Rights Education
 - Women and Girls
 - o Youth in Agriculture in Africa

With regards to the functioning of the Committee;

- To continue to define clear, timely, and relevant processes for advancing the agenda of the community of NGOs and the Liaison Committee, including, where appropriate, activities, working groups and other mechanisms for engagement;
- To consider, in cooperation with the Secretariat, reflecting on improving the Rules of Procedure, including the possible use of an online platform for the elections and the number of candidates standing for election from different regions;
- To implement a financial strategy to secure the financial standing of the Committee better and provide for additional activities;
- To consider methods of communication for more effective coordination of NGOs and more timely communication regarding events and opportunities for NGO participation;
- To encourage the participation of Member States and National Commissions in Liaison Committee activities; and
- To consider the full and formal adoption of digital voting processes in the Rules of Procedure

With regards to the facilitation of NGOs in Official Partnership

- To consider carrying out a thematic mapping of NGOs in official partnership, in consultation and cooperation with the Secretariat;
- To consider making available to NGOs relevant information concerning the functioning of UNESCO and the Liaison Committee, strengthening what currently exists on the Committee's website;
- To facilitate access to a meeting room in Paris to allow, where appropriate, group meetings of NGOs;
- To support, as appropriate, projects for the celebration of International Days prepared and implemented by groups of NGOs (include, for example, International Day of the Girl Child, International Day of Peace, International Day of Education, Global Day of Parents etc.), while ensuring a pluralism of engagement and participation;
- To consider the proposal for an event on the subject of intercultural and interreligious dialogue through education; and



• To further consider action related to the Science, Technology, and Innovation webinar held in 2022.

Recalling that the Liaison Committee does not replace the advocacy and actions of NGOs, but offers a space for synergy and a spokesperson for collective action, the International Conference of NGOs calls on NGOs in Official Partnership:

- To ensure a voluntary financial contribution is made per the requests of the Liaison Committee, to ensure the ability to carry out its work; and
- To undertake, in the case of the establishment of a communication mechanism such as a newsletter or blog, to supply the content in terms of information on their NGO's activities, actions, and projects

We have a broad spectrum of specialism in terms of the NGOs represented, and indeed in the individuals on the new Committee – amongst our team are scientists, engineers, linguists, experts in cultural heritage, gender, and human rights, 2 musicians, educational specialists, teachers and academics, entrepreneurs, and professional administrators - all representing the most diverse and geographically broad committee yet elected. This is your Committee, your Conference, and your community.

With the recommendations presented today, and all the feedback of the past three days, there is a clear mandate to continue and strengthen our work in education, youth, and many other fields related to the competencies of UNESCO. This is an exciting challenge in a world emerging from the shadow of Covid-19 but still suffering so many lingering inequalities. I would like to have heard more this week about challenging these inequalities alongside our thematic work – racism, misogyny, gender-based violence, and conflict all inhibit our ability to mainstream education, the natural, social and human sciences, communication and information, culture, art, and music – though they are so often our pathway to realising our dreams for a better, safer, more just and equal world – the very mission of UNESCO.



I would like to extend my thanks to all of the NGO representatives who have joined us in person in Paris, and online this week. To that, I would add my thanks to the panellists and contributors who have participated, and enriched our deliberations. I would also like to pay tribute to Jean-Yves Le Saux, who has been extremely vocal in his support of the Liaison Committee and the NGOs in Official Partnership, and know that we all wish you well in your future endeavours. I had the pleasure to meet Jullien in your first two weeks at UNESCO, and know well your work at UN Women, and I look forward to collaborating for the next two years.

Events such as these do not happen without preparation, commitment, and extremely long hours of focused work. I would like to express, on behalf of all of us, our thanks to the Interpreters, the technical team, security, and other staff who have facilitated our International Conference.

Of course, our greatest collaborators and supports within I'Maison de UNESCO are the Unit for Civil Society Partnership. The Unit's chief, Ms Sabina Colombo, is tirelessly committed to the successful participation of all NGOs in Official Partnership – and is joined by a team of merry and inexhaustible colleagues, Armin, Ilona, and Luis-Alberto; we thank them all for their hard work.

My colleagues on the outgoing Liaison Committee have been a pleasure to work with for the past 2 years, and we have enjoyed spirited debates, successful collaboration, and many moments of joy. I look forward to forging similar relationships with my incoming companions, and indeed the whole of the NGO community at UNESCO.

To our outgoing President – I can offer only the greatest salute to your hard work, your enthusiasm, commitment to action, and indeed your friendship. It will be a pleasure to have you on the Committee moving forward, and I, and our whole community will benefit from your experience and input.

Thank for you the honour of serving you for the next 2 years, and on behalf of the new Liaison Committee I thank you all for this mandate, and opportunity.
