

Kristy and I also celebrated our seventh wedding anniversary by taking a cruise on the Rhine River. Castles, wine vineyards every turn of the river. Very scenic and relaxing.

But July wasn't all good. My Grandmother Perry died in my hometown, but I wasn't able to make it home in time for the funeral. Luckily, we spent time with her in March while we were in Oklahoma.
