# Remembering Our Charter Member...

Mamie Stewart Love Wallace

December 5, 1921 - April 21, 2018

Mamie Wallace, a strong civil rights activist was the 11<sup>th</sup> of 12 children born to the Late Rev. Robert and Lula Stewart in the Calvary Community on Seven Pines Road in Benton, Louisiana. After graduating from Bossier Training School in Benton, Louisiana, she moved to Shreveport where she worked as a Cosmetologist. Mamie along with her good friend Ann Brewster (a civil rights activist) opened and co-owned Modern Beauty Shop. Bernice Smith, a good friend and cosmetologist also worked in the beauty shop. These three women were instrumental in changing the course of black Americans civil rights in Shreveport, Louisiana.

Mamie was a faithful member of Sunrise Baptist Church until her health failed. Mamie joined the NAACP and worked vigorously to help fulfill the organization's mission. In 1962, she met Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. and Dr. Ralph Abernathy in New Orleans, Louisiana. This meeting was the beginning of a long-term friendship with Dr. King. She often had tea with Dr. King and Ann Brewster whenever he and Dr. Abernathy visited Shreveport. It was during their first visit that she asked if they would come to Shreveport to speak and motivate the people to take a stand against the injustices and unfair practices in the city. Dr. King came to Shreveport and spoke at Galilee Baptist Church where Mamie's brother, Rev. Jessie Stewart was Pastor. Following the services, every car that was parked outside of the church was ticketed with a large fine.

Mamie was troubled that African Americans could not dine at most restaurants, drink at certain water fountains, or try on clothing in department stores. She was not only disturbed but took action. She picketed Stan's Record Shop, sat in the bus station when the "Freedom Riders" came through and provided food and drinks for them. She also participated in a march down Milam Street to protest the 1963 church bombing in Birmingham, Alabama.

Having no biological children of her own, Mamie reared three children, Anne Stewart, Natonya Cooper, and Gwendolyn Barnes. Gwen, Mamie's daughter expresses her admiration to Mamie for taking the time out of her busy schedule to raise a neighborhood child. She was a strong role model, mentor, and mother to her, and a grandmother to her children. Gwendolyn was responsible for Mamie's travel to

Washington D.C. to President Barack Obama's Inauguration. Gwen expressed that she felt grateful to have the opportunity to assist or aide in such a momentous occasion. This was a dream come true for Ms. Wallace. Mamie stated she knew having a Black President would come to pass; she just did not believe she would live to see the day. Gwen states, "There is no gift she could give and there are no monetary measures she could make to express her appreciation" She could only say, "To God be the Glory, for the things she has done."

Mamie was married to Clemmie Love in 1942 in Dallas, TX until he was called to his eternal home. She later married Jack Rucker Wallace December 3, 1976 until his demise on March 16, 1983.

She leaves to cherish her memory one sister: Hilyard Banks, her children: Gwendolyn (Jimmy) Barnes Sr., Anne Stewart and Natonya ( known as Cherri) Cooper, who lived with Mamie and nourished, loved and cared for her until Mamie's final rest; three grandchildren: Jimmy (Crystal) Barnes, Jr., Jimmeka (Jeffrey) Batiste Sr., Jimanique Barnes, sevem great grandchildren; sister-in-law Vernon McKenzie of Dallas, Texas; other daughter Mary Autrey and a hosts of nieces and nephews.
