What Does Robert Say? The Parliamentarians of Psi



P.R.N. - Parliamentary Rules Noted

As members of lota Phi Lambda Sorority, Inc., Psi Chapter, we are called to make decisions democratically at meetings. The rules governing this process are often associated with the organization and its stated purpose, as well as procedures members are required to follow.

According to Robert's Rules of Order Newly Revised (RONR) and Newly Revised Robert's Rules in Brief,3rd edition (NRRIB), the rules governing the group or assembly in ranking order from highest to lowest in authority are as follows:

- 1. Law: rules prescribed by state and federal laws
- Corporate Charter: rules of incorporation
- 3. Bylaws or Constitution: basis rules relating to lota Phi Lambda Sorority, Inc.
- 4. Rule of order: written parliamentary procedure
 Special rules of order: specific to lota Phi Lambda Sorority, Inc. Psi Chapter
 Parliamentary authority: Robert's Rules of Order, Newly Revised Ed. (as stated in the lota Phi Lambda Sorority, Inc. Bylaws)
- 5. Standing rules: administrative details (found in the local rules)
- 6. **Custom** (how the group has typically done things)

World AIDS Day Awareness Month By Soror Ross



DECEMBER 1ST - WORLD AIDS DAY BLACK AMERICANS AND HIV/AIDS: THE BASICS

Key Facts

Black Americans have been disproportionately affected by HIV/AIDS since the epidemic has begun, and that disparity has deepened over time. Although they represent only 12% of the U.S. population, Blacks account for a much larger share of HIV diagnoses (43%), people estimated to be living with HIV disease (42%), and deaths among people with HIV (44%) than any other racial/ethnic group in the U.S.

Among Black Americans, Black women, youth, and gay and bisexual men have been especially hard hit. ⁶A number of challenges contribute to the epidemic among Blacks, including poverty, lack of access to health care, higher rates of some sexually transmitted infections, smaller sexual networks, lack of awareness of HIV status, and stigma.

Despite this impact, recent data indicate some encouraging trends, including declining new HIV diagnoses among Blacks overall, especially among women, and a leveling off of new diagnoses among Black gay and bisexual men.^{8,9} However, given the epidemic's continued and disproportionate impact among Blacks, a continued focus is critical to addressing HIV in the United States.

Overview

Today, there are more than 1.1 million people living with HIV/AIDS in the U.S., including 476,100 who are Black. Although Black Americans represent only 12% of the U.S. population, they accounted for 43% of new HIV diagnoses in 2018 and an estimated 42% of people living with HIV. The rate of new HIV diagnoses per 100,000 among Black adults/adolescents (47.5) was 8 times that of whites (5.6) and more than twice that of Latinos (20.9) in 2018 (see Figure 2). The rate for Black men (74.8) was the highest of any group, twice that of Latino men (36.4), the second highest group. Black women (23.1) had the highest rate among women.

COVID-19 VACCINE RACE

HEALTH CARE WORKERS WILL BE FIRST IN LINE FOR A COVID-19 VACCINE?

Hospital-based nurses, doctors, custodians are among the state's "first tier" of vaccine recipients once the U.S. Food and Drug Administration approves one or more for the public. Health care workers will be the first people in Texas to receive a COVID-19 vaccine once one receives emergency approval from the U.S. government, and on Monday a state panel of vaccine experts and politicians revealed which workers in the health field will receive top priority.

The "first tier" recipients, according to the panel's new guidelines, include:

- Hospital-based nurses, doctors, custodians and other workers who have direct contact with patients
- Staff of nursing homes or other long-term care facilities who work directly with residents
- Emergency medical services providers such as paramedics and ambulance drivers
 Home health aides who manage "vulnerable and high-risk" patients

No COVID-19 vaccine candidate has received an endorsement from the U.S. Food and Drug Administration, though several pharmaceutical companies have said they intend to seek approval for vaccines that showed promising results in widespread clinical trials. State officials anticipate that a vaccine could be approved before year's end but say that supplies will be severely limited for at least a few months.

In their Monday announcement, state officials described an initial phase of distribution, known as phase 1A, that will focus on the health care workforce. If there are enough doses to go around, a "second tier" of health care workers will also be eligible to be vaccinated, including:

- Nurses, doctors, custodians and other workers who interact with patients in outpatient settings such as doctors'
 offices.
- Workers in freestanding emergency rooms and urgent care clinics
- Community pharmacy workers
- Public health workers who administer COVID-19 tests
- Mortuary workers such as medical examiners and embalmers School nurses

Early estimates from the Texas Department of State Health Services found there are more than 5 million people who are vulnerable or work in front-line jobs that increase their exposure risk. That includes more than 3.9 million people who are 65 or older, more than 638,000 health care personnel, more than 327,000 acute care hospital employees, more than 137,000 nursing home residents and more than 66,000 emergency medical workers.

The state's adult population also includes more than 9.4 million Texans with underlying medical conditions that could increase their risk for severe illness associated with COVID-19. "Protecting health care workers is essential to keeping the health care system intact and able to care for COVID-19 and other patients, so phase 1A of vaccine distribution, when the vaccine supply is most limited, will focus on making vaccine available to health care workers," the expert panel wrote.

Goy. Greg Abbott said in a news release that the state will not mandate that Texans receive a coronavirus vaccine, and that the state's <u>distribution effort</u> will be data-driven to reflect the state's geographic diversity. "This foundation for the allocation process will help us mitigate the spread of COVID-19 in our communities, protect the most vulnerable Texans, and safeguard crucial state resources," Abbott said. The governor said the state's expert panel would later make additional recommendations about how and when to roll out a vaccine to other "critical groups."

In most other respects, the distribution process is being dictated and paid for by the federal government, which has said the vaccine will be free to vulnerable people who can't afford it and that providers will be able to bill health insurers for immunizing covered patients. The Trump administration has partnered with pharmacies like CVS and Walgreens to offer the vaccine to nursing home residents and workers and, later, the general public, once supplies become more available.



Fredda Witherspoon National Scholarship - scholarships are to be postmarked by January 31, 2021 sent to the National President Elect.

National FIL Scholarship applications are due postmarked by **February 28, 2021** sent to the National President Elect.

Dorethea N. Hornbuckle Scholarship applications are due postmarked by **March 15**, **2021** sent to the National President Elect.

Alice P. Allen Scholarship applications are due postmarked by April 1, 2021 sent to the National President Elect.

<u>ALL</u> essay and scholarship applications <u>MUST</u> be submitted with documentation, recommendations and sponsorships from an active chapter in lota Phi Lambda Sorority to the National President Elect with the designated postmark dates for each essay or scholarship with official postal marking dates.

Please make sure that your chapter and regional websites indicate those scholarships that are specifically awarded by them and not National Scholarships. There is no reason that scholarship applications should be sent from around the country if the information is posted with clear directions. **Again, no National essay and/or scholarship applications are accepted without chapter endorsement and submission.**





CHAPTER GUIDELINES DURING THE COVID-19 PANDEMIC



Sorors.

I want to thank you for your support during this pandemic. It is very frustrating to many of us as we struggle to adjust to this new way of life, but it is also true that several of our sorors, their families, and friends have been impacted by the Coronavirus pandemic. We are dealing with an invisible enemy that affects every element of life, personally, financially, and professionally. That is why it is so very important that we keep ourselves and our families as safe as possible.

Sorors, we have set guidelines in place that limits the amount of person-to-person contact because we care and we wish to protect you, your families, and lota. We do not want to unknowingly put anyone in danger of contracting the virus at any lota event, meeting, or social gathering while wearing lota gear. It has been awesome to see so many of you working to conduct lota programs while operating within the stated National guidelines.

Remember, in addition to our national Bylaws and standing rules, all sorority members are expected to abide by any guidelines/regulations developed by the National Board for the safety of our members. Those guidelines are:

- 1. No in-person chapter meetings for sorors or auxiliaries.
- 2. No in-person group gatherings involving sorors or auxiliaries, this includes social gatherings that show members wearing lota gear.
- 3. No in-person events that require groups of sorors to gather in one location. *Sorors may individually drop off or pick up items, supplies, etc.
- 4. No in-person membership recruitment, virtual-only!
