

Celebrating Black History Month

February is Black History Month! The Epsilon Chi Chapter wishes to pay homage two African American women who have paved the way for Black Women business owners and career professionals.

First African American Woman Business Owner



Madam C. J. Walker was the first black woman business owner as well as the first self-made black woman millionaire in the United States of America! Ms. Walker started a black haircare line of products that specialized in treating hair loss. Ms. Walker's inspiration of her haircare line was due to the loss of her hair, seeking to understand the cause of her hair loss she developed ointments to treat baldness and dandruff. Madam C. J. worked as a cook for a chemist, while there she learned the basics of chemistry. She took this knowledge and work to perfect her hair ointments. Ms. Walker's product line eventually expanded to 20 hair and skin items; and she employed over 3000 workers. She built a factory so that her products could be mass produced and she eventually established a beauty school to teach her sales associates the "Walker System" of haircare and beauty.

Courage, perseverance and tenacity are all lessons we can learn from Madam C.J. Walker. She established herself as not only a black business owner but a successful black business woman during a time where the majority of jobs available to for women of color were maids and housekeepers.

We honor and salute Madam C. J. Walker for setting the stages for many African American Women to follow.

First African American Woman CEO

Black Business Woman Ursula Burns was the first African American woman to be named CEO of a fortune 500 company. Ms. Burns serve in the role of CEO of the Xerox Corporation from 2009 -2016. She also served as the Chairman of Board of the international document -management and business services arm of this same organization from 2010 -2017. Coming from meager means, as a child Ms. Burns excelled in mathematics, she earned a bachelors degree in Mechanical Engineering from New York University.

Ms. Burns immediately started her working on a Master's in Mechanical Engineering and begin working at the Xerox Corporation that summer as an intern in their machinal engineering program for minorities. After graduation, Ms. Burns was offered a full-time position in the product development department. As Ms. Burns climbed the ladder of success and her career progressed she served in many management and leadership positions. In 2000, she was appointed senior vice president of strategic services and in 2009 she was named the company's CEO.

Lessons we can learn from Ms. Burns are determination, patience, and a willingness to learn new things By trade she was a mechanical engineer, but she took on roles that would broaden her experience in daily operations, leadership and management.

We honor and salute Ursula Burns for breaking the glass ceiling and paving the way for those of us who seek to follow in her footsteps in serving in executive level roles.

Business Corner

You Can't Afford NOT To Have An Estate Plan By: Carol Y. Guess, Esq.



You know that aggravating feeling that you get riding in a car with someone who says they know the way to that party or movie theater, or to that out of town event but you get lost? You may find yourself going in circles, or worse, never arrive, because that person did not plan ahead to determine how to get to the desired location. Have you considered what may happen if you are no longer in the position to operate in any of these roles? Anything can happen in the blink of an eye- a car accident, the onset of sickness that quickly progresses—one can never tell. After the initial shock of losing you to incapacity or death, those who care about you and depend on you, without the presence of a plan for such events, are often in a tailspin. Here's how you can help your friends, family, and business associates better navigate your incapacity or passing.

Let Them Know You Are Creating An Estate Plan

Once you decide to create an estate plan, let key people in your family and business know, and tell them where your estate planning documents are located. Not being able to locate the documents is just like not having them.

See An Attorney

Estate Planning is state specific. You can try to draft documents on your own, but if you use canned documents, they may not reflect the most recent changes in the law of your state, and lack the drafting nuances that may be important to your specific situation. Your focus should be to have documents created that have the best chance of standing up in court should they ever be challenged. Further, an attorney can help you design a plan that fits your family and business needs and desires. For these reasons, obtaining legal advice and guidance from an attorney who focuses on estate law can be of great help in drafting a plan.

The Documents

Basic estate planning documents may include powers of attorney, medical directives, a HIPPA Authorization, a will, and possibly a trust. There are additional documents that could also be included in your estate plan, and these can be determined once you visit with your attorney. Powers of attorney will let third parties know whom you have chosen to make decisions in your stead regarding everything in your life. A statutory durable power of attorney covers most life events, such as managing your bank account, paying bills, and defending lawsuits. A medical power of attorney with HIPAA (Health Insurance Portability and Accountability Act) Authorization handles medical decisions short of end-of-life decisions, which medical directives address. In connection to each of these documents, you should choose someone you trust implicitly as they each involve the handling of sensitive information and important decision making. With respect to business interests, the governing documents of your business should address how your ownership interest would be affected or transferred by your passing or incapacity. Concerning business planning, please seek the services of an attorney and a certified public accountant.

What Happens If I Don't Plan?

We have already discussed that you will send your family and business associates into a tailspin if you do not plan. But also, you leave the door open for governmental entities to determine what happens regarding your assets and physical care. For example, if you become incapacitated and cannot make decisions regarding your daily and self-care activities, your state or county may seek guardianship of your person and/or estate (everything you own). Also, as in the State of Texas, the law will determine who will get your assets, including business interests, if no will is in place or is admitted to probate. For these reasons, it is important to at least consider an estate plan.

Estate planning can put you at ease and help family, friends and business associates during a rough time. Please get started with your plan today.


