Ninety-one years later their legacy lives on with over 900 members who collectively celebrated Founders Day.

How to Protect Your Health at Work During COVID-19

The coronavirus health crisis has made it critical for all workers to take steps to reduce the risk of spreading COVID-19 to themselves and others. But for many — especially workers whose jobs never required the sanitary procedures that are standard in healthcare — this is a first.

Employers are taking necessary precautions to protect their people, but a little personal preparation can go a long way. These tips can help you protect your health, boost your overall wellbeing and help you return to work or continue to work safely during the COVID-19 situation.

Follow Best Practices

Your employer is likely aware of current best practices that should help all employees reduce their risk of infection on the job. It's important for you to know them too. Reach out to your manager and ask for a complete list of safety procedures and workplace guidelines if you don't have them handy. If they don't have something they can send you, refer to the World Health Organization's (WHO's) guidelines for COVID-19 preparations in the workplace. Other verified sources, like the Center for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC), can help you stay informed as new information comes out.

Even if you take all necessary precautions, you might come into contact with someone who has COVID-19. It's important to know what to do if you think you've been exposed to the virus. Read the CDC's guide for what to do if you've been exposed to COVID-19, and if it happens, follow best practices and get in touch with your manager or employer right away.


The 2020 Census counts every person living in the 50 states, District of Columbia, and five U.S. territories.

IMPORTANT DATES

- March 12 20: Household will begin receiving official Census Bureau mail with detailed information on how to respond to the 2020 Census online, by phone, or by mail.
 - March 30 April 1: The Census Bureau will count people who are experiencing homelessness over these three days. As part of this process, the Census Bureau counts people in shelters, at soup kitchens and mobile food vans, on the streets, and at non-sheltered, outdoor locations such as tent encampments.
- April 1: Census Day is observed nationwide. Once the invitation arrives, you should respond for your home in one of three ways: online, by phone, or by mail. When you respond to the census, you'll tell the Census Bureau where you live as of April 1, 2020.

- April: Census takers will begin visiting college students who live on campus, people living in senior centers, and others who live among large groups of people. Census takers will also begin following up with households that have not yet responded in areas that include off-campus housing, where residents are not counted in groups.
- May July: Census takers will begin visiting homes that haven't responded to the 2020 Census to help make sure everyone is counted
- December: The Census Bureau will deliver apportionment counts to the President and Congress as required by law.

We have been turned around and upside down since the pandemic of COVID19 virus began. Iota is reinstating the lota Relief Fund, established in 1937, to help small businesses in our communities. As a member of the national board, we are asking you for your support in funding this initiative.

Also don't forget to register for the LMPF Webinar Series #BeyondCovid19 every Wednesday at 6pm Central time via zoom. We have reinvented ourselves, been made new and gotten creative. In the words of our 23 National President, Soror Dorothy White, we wonder if we will ever be able to get back to normal or will there be a new normal and what will it look like.

As an organization, the pandemic has affected our ability to meet, to plan and to present the programs of lota. But together, we have faced these obstacles and found ways to continue to offer the programs of lota through different venues, such as social media, teleconferencing and virtual meetings. Like our founder, Mrs. Lola M. Parker, you saw a need to adapt to the present situation, to make changes to improve the delivery of our message. So, you have embraced the new norm of Webinars, Facebook Live and YouTube presentations. Sorors, Let's be mindful as we continue our travel and embrace our new normal.

When you select your regional and chapter leadership, be sure that you elect persons who exemplify the ability needed to represent and elevate your region and your chapters. Technology, media, and resources will play a prominent role in all future communication, presentations and execution of your region and chapter's visibility and dominance. A good leader will possess these vital skills or will not be so intimidated and so insecure that they do not surround themselves with other persons who have them. Choose wisely. The best choice should not necessarily be based on friendship or likeability but professionalism, character, connections and credentials.

We were unable to hold the 73rd SWR Conference in Spring, TX this year because of the pandemic. However, we had registered 168 attendees (Sorors, Pelati, FIL, MOI, and guests) for a total of \$29,616.98. An additional \$1,198.00 was collected for Ads and \$400 for Vendors.

The SWR Executive Committee voted to refund all money previously collected. We were able to make that decision based on the fact that no deposit had been paid to the hotel, no books had been printed, no conference bags were purchased and no awards had been ordered. Subsequently, Refunds totaling the amount of \$31, 211.98 have been made to all chapters for registrations, vendors and ads.

Founder's Day Message

Sorors, today is Founder's Day and I would like to tell you a story. This is the story of a young woman named Lola. Lola was born in the early 1900s in Arkansas, later she moved to Kansas City, MO and in 1919 she, along with her parents moved to Chicago. Instead of becoming a nurse or a teacher, as was the norm during that time, she aspired to become a businesswoman. So, after high school, she chose to attend business college. During that time women who chose to enter the business field,

were belittled and thought to be less than. The implication was that these women had less education and ability, because few of them went beyond high school business classes. While working as a secretary, Lola experienced the lack of respect for women in her field and she decided to do something about it. With encouragement from her employer, Dr. L. K. Williams, President of the National Baptist Convention and others, Lola called to together six of her best friends to put in place her vision of raising the status of businesswomen and to increase their prestige and influence among women in other professions and in the arts.

So, she along with her six friends discussed the formation of an organization that would inspire higher education, business specializations, and give assistance to young women engaged in business. Thus, on June 1, 1929, Alpha Chapter of lota Phi Lambda Sorority, Inc. was formed. Because Soror Parker saw what could be, she created this organization, that continues to offer encouragement to other young women to upgrade their skills so they will be ready to accept opportunities when they come. Lola served as a role model for these young women by continuing her education, taking courses in business administration, business psychology, etc. As she increased her knowledge, Lola's positions also rose in prestige and influence. In other words, she practiced what she preached.

Today, we are also confronted with many obstacles due to the Covid-19 Pandemic and a changing world. Our professional and personal lives have been turned upside down by the effects of this very serious virus. We are working from home and we are separated from family members and friends. We are dealing with death and emotional stress due to the inability to share emotions and offer comfort to each other. We are worried that we may or may not

As we write those chapters, it gives us an opportunity to revisit the events of that year, to reflect on our programs and project and to become reinvigorated as we look toward the future. We will continue to make a difference in our communities and stay rooted in the aims and ideals of lota Phi Lambda Sorority, Inc., even in difficult times.
