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BREAST CANCER FACTS

RISK FACTORS ON BREAST CANCER



- Gender
- Age
- Heredity/Genetic Factors
- Long menstrual history
- Never having children
- Hormones
- Personal history of breast or ovarian cancer
- Environmental factors
- Early Menopause

*Over 74% of breast cancers are diagnosed in women with no identifiable risk factors.



What are the warning signs?

- · Lump, hard knot or thickening in the breast
- Swelling, redness or increased warmth in the breast
- Change in the size or shape of the breast
- Itchy, sore or scaling area on the nipple/areola
- Nipple discharge (particularly if bloody) that starts suddenly
- Pulling in of the nipple (inverted nipple) or nipple change direction (retracted nipple)
- Dimpling or puckering of the skin on the breast
- Unusual pain in an area of the breast



What are the recommended steps for early detection?

The best defense against breast cancer starts with you! Sisters Network® Inc. recommends these steps for early detection:

Monthly breast self-exam (BSE) starting at age 20*

Clinical breast examination by a trained medical professional every 2-3 years beginning at age 20, and annually after age 40

Mammography screening every one to two years for women ages 35-40 (If your mother or sister has had breast cancer, you may need to get mammogram earlier and more frequently)

Annual mammography screening for women age 40+**





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*BSE should be done just as your period ends or for post-menopausal women, the same day each month. Most women discover breast masses during monthly breast self-examination. This simple and easy to <u>follow</u> examination allows a woman to become more familiar with her breast, making the detection of subtle changes or abnormities easier.

**Women receiving annual mammography screening are 30% less likely to die from breast cancer compared to unscreened women.

***Breast ultrasound is frequently useful in evaluating breast and mammographic abnormalities, especially in young women.

What are the factors that place a woman at increased risk for breast cancer?

Every woman has some risk for developing breast cancer during her lifetime, and that risk increases as she ages. However, the risk of developing breast cancer is not the same for all women. The following are some factors known to increase a woman's chance of developing this disease:

Personal History: Women who have had breast cancer are more likely to develop a second breast cancer. Family History: The risk of getting breast cancer increases for a woman whose mother, sister, or daughter has had the disease; or who has two or more close relatives, such as cousins or aunts, with a history of breast cancer (especially if diagnosed before age 40). About 5 percent of women with breast cancer have a hereditary form of this disease.

Genetic Alterations: Specific alterations in certain genes, such as those in the breast cancer genes BRCA1 or BRCA2, make women more susceptible to breast cancer.

Abnormal Biopsy: Women with certain abnormal breast conditions, such as atypical hyperplasia or LCIS (lobular carcinoma in situ), are at increased risk.

Other conditions associated with an increased risk of breast cancer: Having children at a later age or never having children at all, early onset of menses, taking hormones over an extended period of time, and exposure to environmental hazards.

What is the best method of detecting breast cancer as early as possible?

A high-quality mammogram, with a clinical breast exam, is the most effective way to detect breast cancer early. Using a mammogram, it is possible to detect breast cancer that cannot be felt. However, like any test, mammograms have both benefits and limitations.



By having care bags handy, sorors will be able to assist a homeless individual immediately. Thanks to Soror Jackie Guillory for this excellent idea and for spearheading this generous effort.

5 THINGS A HOMELESS PERSON COULD USE

f you've ever been approached by a homeless man or woman, you may have felt uncomfortable about how to respond when asked for money. Make Care Kits as an alternative, since giving money isn't the best option.

The following items can be placed in gallon-size Zip-Lock bags.

HOW TO PACK A CARE KIT

 SOCKS Homeless mer and women spend a lot of time on their feet trying to get to resources and appointments. A fresh pair of clean, dry socks can feel like heaven on tired, soggy feet. Throw in some band-aids



Add anti-bacterial lotion for when soap and water ar en't available. Include smal soaps and shampoo from your hotel stays. Consider lij balm, toothpaste, toothbrush washcloth, comb, brush, razor, shaving cream and de odorant. Avoid items such as mouthwash or hand sanitize



4. RESOURCE GUIDE Portland has a wide variety of services available to homeless men and women that they may not know about. You can get copies through the "Rose City Resource Guide" (www.RoseCityResource.org) to hand out with your Care Kits.

5. ENCOURAGEMENT

All the items listed previously are helpful, but the most meaningful part of a Care Kit is the opportunity for a conversation and friendship. Your smile and offer of help could be the encouragement a homeless man or women needs to make it through another day. Take time to learn their name, listen to their story, and offer to pray with them.



CARE KIT TIPS

Have a Care Kit party! Gather family, friends, co-workers or your community group to purchase supplies and assemble Care Kits together

Include seasonal items. In summer, include sunblock or frozen bottles of water. In winter, include gloves, hats or heatpacks.

Offer resources. Ask if the person knows about Portland Rescue Mission. Be sure they know about meals, shelter, restrooms and other emergency services available. Our Guest Relations staff can often help guide a person to other social services they may not know about.





