Honorary Soror Lydia Jackson



Lydia P. Jackson Vice President, CRA Business Development Officer

Lydia P. Jackson is a Vice President and CRA Business Development Officer for Capital One Bank. She works primarily in the bank's South Central Region which includes markets in Louisiana and Texas.

Ms. Jackson is responsible for initiating partnerships with community-based organizations, government agencies and other groups to facilitate opportunities for the expansion of bank products and services and the production and rehabilitation of affordable housing. She also coordinates the bank's development activities in rural communities across the nation. Additionally, she manages the operations of the Capital One CDC, a nonprofit bank subsidiary that provides construction financing for affordable, single family development projects in LA and TX.

With over 25 years of experience in public policy, community advocacy, and planning, Ms. Jackson served on the Washington staff of former U.S. Sen. J. Bennett Johnston where she handled legislative matters related to education, health, commerce, and labor.

She has served as a board member and committee chair for a host of civic activities. Lydia is a board member of the Southern University Community Development Corporation and serves as an advisor to Hope for the Homeless. In addition, she is a member of the Board of Directors of Rural LISC, Shreveport's Downtown Development Authority and Chair of the Shreveport Home Mortgage Authority. She has recently joined the Board of Directors for Providence Community Housing.

Ms. Jackson was named as one of the "Outstanding Young Women in America" and has twice been selected as a "Rising Young Community Leader" by the Shreveport Chamber of Commerce. In November 1999, she became the first African-American woman to be elected to represent House District Two in the Louisiana Legislature. She concentrated in Government at Harvard-Radcliffe University.

As a State Representative, Ms. Jackson served as a member of the House Committees on Health and Welfare, Joint Capital Outlay and Ways and Means. In November 2003, she was elected by the people of Senate District 39 to represent them in the Louisiana Senate. There, she chaired a citizen Task Force that initiated major reforms in Louisiana's Indigent Defense System. Ms. Jackson is a strong advocate for families and children and in 2007 she authored legislation authorizing a State Earned Income Tax Credit providing more than \$40 million in tax relief to Louisiana's working families. Ms. Jackson was proud to represent the citizens of Senate District 39 for eight years from 2004 to 2011.


Ms. Jackson has been a strong supporter of Iota – Beta Psi Chapter for several years. She was instrumental in securing a \$5000 grant to support Beta Psi's Toys U Can't Return program and is willing sponsor Beta Psi events. She has been recognized as Beta Psi' Outstanding Business Woman and has now joined the ranks of Iota as an Honorary Member. Ms. Jackson was inducted into Beta Psi Chapter Shreveport at Iota's 90th National Convention in Shreveport, Louisiana by President Stephanie Dilworth.

Healthy Eats:

Recipe for: Easy Lasagna

From the Kitchen of: Faithful Families



Servings: 6

Ingredients:

Non-stick cooking spray

- 1/2 lb lean ground beef or ground turkey
- 1 (14.5 ounce) can unsalted diced tomatoes, not drained
- 1 1/4 cup water
- 1/2 teaspoon parsley
- 1/2 teaspoon oregano
- 1/2 tablesppon Italian seasoning
- 8 ounces whole wheat egg noodles, uncooked
- 12 ounces fat-free cottage cheese
- 2 cups reduced-fat mozzarella cheese, shredded and divided

Directions:

-Spray skillet with non-stick cooking spray.

-Brown ground meat. Drain and return to skillet.

-Stir in diced tomatoes, water, parsley, oregano, and Italian seasoning. Bring to a boil.

-Add uncooked pasta. Cover and cook on

medium heat for 15 minutes.

-Stir in cottage cheese. Cover and cook for 5 minutes.

-Stir in 1 1/2 cups of mozzarella cheese. Sprinkle the remaining cheese on top.

-Cover and remove from heat. Let stand for 5 minutes to melt cheese. Be sure to use a thermometer to check that the temperature has-reached 160 degrees for ground beef and 165 degrees for ground turkey.
