Many would look at a breast cancer diagnosis as a death sentence and that held true for Soror Daphne Hornbuckle. Upon receiving her diagnosis, immediately began writing her last will and testament. "I felt like my life was over and was ready to give up, but Early detection is a major key to survival and this after the fourth opinion, I was determined to fight back." continues to be the best weapon when battling breast She conquered and won her first battle only to find her- cancer. This includes: self fighting once again 12 years later. "During my second bout with cancer I prayed to God and asked Him to see me through this journey, and He was with me every step of the way" says this 27-year survivor.

Trusting and leaning on God's word is what gave our SWR Director, Soror Vahnita Loud, comfort and peace throughout her many years of surgeries, treatment, and adjuvant therapy. "When you have God's favor upon you and you profess those promises as they are written, you know you are going to be victorious" states Soror Loud. 23 years later, she truly is victorious.

Soror Martha Richmond, a 15-year survivor, believes it was an early diagnosis that saved her. She wants others to know that we should not let fear grip us to the point that we do nothing. "It's important that we open up and share what we are going through. Someone else may be able to help you through it, provide referrals, and/or offer good information" says Soror Richmond.



In the U.S., approximately 1 in 8 women will be Many may not realize that breast cancer is the most diagnosed with breast cancer in her lifetime. Psi commonly diagnosed cancer among African-American Chapter knows this all too well, having several breast women. According to the American Cancer Society, an estimated 266,120 new cases of invasive breast cancer are expected to be diagnosed in the U.S., in 2018. New guidelines propose that all women, especially women of color, be evaluated for breast cancer risk no later than age 30 and have your first mammogram by age 40.

Performing routine self-breast exams,

Having annual breast exams performed by your medical doctor,

Scheduling annual mammograms,

Examining any breast changes or issues immediately by your medical doctor

As survivors, we may have endured incredible pain and anguish, but we have since been inducted into a life-long sisterhood, unlike any other. A sisterhood that has allowed us to shed a tear, share our testimonies, and provide support for other survivors following in our footsteps; who are fighting for their lives. Our personal cancer journeys have made us stronger and as a result we are victorious!

Do you ever attend meetings that are time-wasting, unproductive or disorderly?

Chances are you have been subjected to meetings that make you want to not attend another meeting ever again! This is exactly why parliamentary procedure and parliamentarians are needed. Parliamentary procedure is the set of rules that allow an assembly (e.g. an lota local chapter) to efficiently consider and decide on actions to be taken. A parliamentarian assists the presiding officer to manage meetings and advises on parliamentary procedure.

Psi Chapter has a history of effective parliamentarians including those who are currently members of the National Association of Parliamentarians (NAP), an organization whose mission states: "NAP is dedicated to educating leaders throughout the world in effective meeting management through the use of parliamentary procedure."

include: Sorors Dr. Mary Nickson, Psi Chapter Parliamentarian, Daphne Hornbuckle, Joyce Hodges and Nona Fisher, Registered Parliamentarian & Southwestern Region Parliamentarian.

On August 28, 2020 at the National Association of Parliamentarians Virtual 2020 National Training Conference, attended by Sorors Dr. Mary Nickson and Nona Fisher, the 12th Edition of Robert's Rules of Order Newly Revised (RONR) was issued. As the parliamentary authority of lota Phi Lambda Sorority, Inc., this edition should be acquired now for use by all levels of the organization. The 3rd Edition of the Robert's Rules of Order Newly Revised In Brief was also issued.

NAP has developed a Body of Knowledge that outlines what every member and leader of any organization should know about parliamentary procedure and what they should be able to do. In future monthly issues of Psi Pearls, parliamentary tips will be provided to increase your knowledge and skills.

How Is Pandemic Flu Different from Seasonal Flu?

Seasonal Flu vs. Pandemic Flu

How often does it happen? Seasonal Flu: Happens annually and usually peaks between December and February Pandemic Flu: Rarely happens (three times in 20th century)

Will most people be immune?

Seasonal Flu: Usually some immunity from previous exposures and influenza vaccination Pandemic Flu: Most people have little or no immunity because they have no previous exposure to the virus or similar viruses

Who is at risk for complications?

Seasonal Flu: Certain people are at high-risk for serious complications (infants, elderly, pregnant women, extreme obesity and persons with certain chronic medical conditions)

Pandemic Flu: Healthy people also may be at high risk for serious complications

Where can I get medical care?

Seasonal Flu: Health care providers and hospitals can usually meet public and patient needs Pandemic Flu: Health care providers and hospitals may be overwhelmed Alternate care sites may be available to meet public and patient needs

Will a vaccine be available?

Seasonal Flu: Vaccine available for annual flu season

Usually, one dose of vaccine is needed for most people

Pandemic Flu: Although the US government maintains a limited stockpile of pandemic vaccine, vaccine may not be available in the early stages of a pandemic Two doses of vaccine may be needed

I wo doses of vaccine may be needed

Will antivirals be available?

Seasonal Flu: Adequate supplies of antivirals are usually available Pandemic Flu: Antiviral supply may not be adequate to meet demand

National Breast Cancer Foundation Dense Breasts Q&A Guide



Do you know if you have dense breasts? According to the National Cancer Institute, nearly 50% of all women age 40 and older have dense breasts. Knowing whether you have dense breasts is important because women with dense breasts have a higher risk of developing breast cancer, and often need supplemental screenings to a mammogram.

What are dense breasts? - Broadly, breast tissue may be referred to as non-dense (more fatty) and dense (less fatty with more fibroglandular tissue). **Dense breast** tissue simply means there is more fibroglandular tissue, which appears white on a mammogram. When a patient has dense breasts, a mammogram will show that a greater amount of the breast is filled with dense breast tissue than fatty tissue.

• How do women know if they have dense breasts? Having a mammogram is the best way to find out if dense breast tissue is present

• **How common are dense breasts**? According to National Cancer Institute, nearly half of all women age 40 and older undergoing mammograms have dense breast.

• What contributes to having dense breast tissue? Genetics, Low Body Mass Index, Hormonal Therapy.


• **Do dense breasts feel different when performing a breast self-exam?** Only a mammogram can show if women have dense breast.

• **Does having dense breasts increase the likelihood of developing breast cancer?** Breast density can have a masking effect on detection of underlying cancer on a mammogram. Breast density is an independent risk factor for breast cancer.

Is additional screening needed if a patient has dense breasts? If you have dense breast, please review your breast cancer risk factors with your doctor & consider options for supplemental screenings.





Evelyn D. Wilkey National Essay - essays are to be postmarked by December 30, 2020 sent to the National President Elect.

Fredda Witherspoon National Scholarship - scholarships are to be postmarked by January 31, 2021 sent to the National President Elect.

National FIL Scholarship applications are due postmarked by February 28, 2021 sent to the National President Elect.

Dorethea N. Hornbuckle Scholarship applications are due postmarked by **March 15, 2021** sent to the National President Elect.

Alice P. Allen Scholarship applications are due postmarked by April 1, 2021 sent to the National President Elect.

<u>ALL</u> essay and scholarship applications <u>MUST</u> be submitted with documentation, recommendations and sponsorships from an active chapter in lota Phi Lambda Sorority to the National President Elect with the designated postmark dates for each essay or scholarship with official postal marking dates.

Please make sure that your chapter and regional websites indicate those scholarships that are specifically awarded by them and not National Scholarships. There is no reason that scholarship applications should be sent from around the country if the information is posted with clear directions. Again, no National essay and/or scholarship applications are accepted without chapter endorsement and submission.

National President Message~ Loss of Supreme Court Justice Ruth Bader

We Mourn the Loss of Supreme Court Justice Ruth Bader Ginsburg



We, the National Executive Board of Iota Phi Lambda Sorority, Incorporation and our membership offer our sincere condolences to the family and friends of Justice Ruth Bader Ginsburg, a champion of women's rights and gender equality.

Ruth Bader Ginsburg, an associate justice of the Supreme Court of the United States was nominated by President Bill Clinton and confirmed in 1993. As the high court's second female justice, she was known as a fierce fighter for equal justice for all, especially for women.

Justice Ginsburg changed the lives of many, as she championed the rights of women, beginning with her job as the first director of the A.C.L.U.'s Women's Rights Project in 1972. For many years, even before being named to the Supreme Court, she led the fight in the courts for gender equality. By the time she was named to the bench, she had worked to change many state and federal laws that restricted the rights of women, including a woman's right to choose. One quote from her on equality, "I said on the equality side of it, that it is essential to a woman's equality with man that she be the decision-maker, that her choice be controlling.", acknowledged that a woman has the right to govern her own body and not have it legislated by laws. She was also instrumental in the passing of the Ledbetter Act in 2009, after writing the dissenting opinion in the Ledbetter v. Goodyear employment discrimination case in 2007. According to Linda Greenhouse, writer for The Times, "Justice Ruth Bader Ginsburg, the Supreme Court's feminist icon, also known as "Notorious RBG", not only changed the law, she also transformed the roles of men and women in society".

We honor her memory and her contributions to the cause of social justice and equality.
