2023 Response Totals

Major Projects-Opportunities

Third Station

As you may recall, we've been eagerly working towards our vision of establishing a third station in the area of Sulphur Springs Rd and Black Oak Rd. This initiative aims to enhance emergency response times and ultimately improve safety for everyone in our community.

We're incredibly grateful for the generous donation of property in the 800 block of Sulphur Springs Rd, which was a significant step towards realizing this vision. However, after careful examination, it has become apparent that the donated land may not be suitable for constructing the new station due to size limitations.

But here's where you can help! We're reaching out in search of alternative options for land in the vicinity that could accommodate the construction of our third fire station. If you or anyone you know owns land in the area and would be willing to consider donating or selling it for this vital community project, we would love to hear from you.

Fire Truck Out of Service

We're facing a critical situation as one of our primary pumpers suffered an engine failure this year, leaving us without the truck as it had to be taken out of service. With only two tanker/pumpers operational, we are more limited in some of the operational abilities than we would like to be. Repair options for the 17-year-old truck (which is beyond the normal service life of a fire truck) appear to be costly, high-risk, and not feasible. We're actively seeking solutions to secure another pumper, including obtaining a new one estimated at \$500,000-\$600,000; however, our current budget and income levels are not sufficient to purchase one outright or finance it at \$45,000/year for 15 years. All options are being studied. During this period, we are especially grateful for mutual aid provided by neighboring departments when needed.

Smoke Detectors

Our goal is to ensure that every home is equipped with working smoke detectors to help protect families like yours.
