### **Excellence in Adult Immunization**

### <u>Foundation Medical Partners</u> <u>Southern New Hampshire Health</u>

In 2013, Southern New Hampshire Health's Foundation Medical Partners identified adult Pneumococcal vaccination rates as a quality initiative. They observed that gaps in clinical staff knowledge of increasingly complex adult immunization recommendations served as barriers to immunization opportunities.

To help close these gaps, they created evidence-based standing orders, and decision support tools to improve clinical staff knowledge of current Pneumococcal vaccine recommendations.

Since 2013, implementation of standing orders, screening tools, and point-of-care references for Pneumococcal vaccines removed barriers to adult immunization opportunities. By creating these tools and resources, they gave clinical staff the autonomy to make vaccine decisions. In turn, this has empowered clinical staff and optimized team-based care.

Southern New Hampshire Health is comprised of Southern New Hampshire Medical Center, and Foundation Medical Partners, and is Massachusetts General Hospital's only clinical affiliate in the region. Through this affiliation, patients have easy access to advanced clinical expertise in areas including stroke, cancer, trauma and pediatric specialties. Ambulatory Care at Southern New Hampshire Health is made up of more than 300 providers in more than 70 practices across southern New Hampshire and northern Massachusetts. They serve thousands of patients in primary care, pediatric care, internal medicine, and medical and surgical specialties.

### Karen Donoghue, BS, RN, Adult Immunization Coordinator, NH Immunization Program

Karen Donoghue has been the Adult Immunization Coordinator for the NH Immunization Program since 2006.

Karen Donoghue has served on the Executive Committee of the National Adult Immunization Coordinator's Partnership (NAICP) both as Chair and Co-Chair for many years. In this capacity, she has been in a highly visible position to affect policy change both at a State and National level.

Karen was a contributing member of the committee that created the Standards for Adult Immunization Practices, a tool for health care providers to help ensure their adult patients are fully immunized, adopted by the National Vaccine Advisory Committee in 2013.

In 2013, her ambition and passion for raising awareness about the importance of adult vaccines inspired her to develop and implement "Start the Conversation", a public awareness campaign to promote conversations between health care providers and their adult patients about the importance of vaccination. This campaign received national recognition in August of 2014.

In 2015, Karen applied for and was one of ten states nation-wide to receive a grant to develop and implement community infrastructure to increase and maintain adult immunization rates and reduce immunization rate disparities among adults.

In her role as the Adult Immunization Coordinator, Karen's dedication and commitment has been instrumental in raising awareness and has brought national recognition to our State.

It is an honor to recognize her for her many achievements.

### **Excellence Awards**

### Excellence in Childhood & Adolescent Immunization

### Cindy Foley, RN, Spaulding Youth Center, Northfield, NH

The Spaulding Youth Center works with a unique student population including those with autism, behavioral, developmental, emotional disorders and some nonverbal. This can be particularly challenging for the nurse trying to get students immunized.

Cindy Foley, the nurse at Spaulding Youth Center goes the extra mile to put students at ease and helps them overcome years of anxiety around getting vaccinated. Some students display agitation or aggressive behaviors when stressed. For some, sitting in a nurse's office smelling an alcohol swab or seeing a needle can be anxiety inducing.

In an effort to reduce fears and/or stress levels, Cindy works with parents and teachers to find out what would help the student relax or what their interests are, and incorporates them into practice sessions preparing a student for getting immunized. For some students, it may take multiple practice sessions of incremental steps before a student is ready. Small rewards are used for each small gain. Cindy is highly attuned to the student's facial expressions and body language so she can end each practice session on a positive note.

One of Cindy's many successes is when a student came to the facility without up-to-date immunizations due to extreme anxiety and after less than a year of multiple practice sessions, patience, and a sense of humor, Cindy was able to get this student's immunizations up-to-date. The implementation of these innovative strategies resulted in a 90% student influenza immunization rate and a 99% student vaccination rate of all required school immunizations.

### Linda Culver, RN, Littleton Regional Hospital

Linda Culver, RN began working at Littleton Regional Hospital in 1977 and will be celebrating her 40th anniversary in February of 2017. During her career in the healthcare field, she has been a charge nurse, obstetric staff nurse, and manager of the obstetric unit. Her true love though is in pediatrics.

Linda has spent numerous hours educating children and parents at the office, in school settings, and out in the communities where she works with students who wish to pursue a career in healthcare. She is patient-centered, beloved by the parents of her patients, and is a true supporter of parents in their new and renewed parental roles. She listens to understand and assist - not just to answer. Linda feels every child is important and spends countless hours explaining and helping parents to understand the importance of immunizing their children. She is a team player and is respected by all who work with her and learn from her many years of experience. Linda states, "It's a true honor to work with the families."

Linda was nominated for this award by her colleagues at Littleton Regional Hospital.

### **Excellence Awards**

### First Annual Tricia McGuire Memorial Award

This award is presented in honor of Tricia McGuire, former Medical Assistant at Indian Stream Healthcare. The award recognizes an individual that has made an exceptional contribution towards improved vaccination rates and vaccine management in their organization.

Originally from Enfield, Connecticut, Tricia McGuire moved to Vermont in 2003 with her husband, Christopher. Her son Charlie was born in 2004. Tricia worked in the medical field for 14 years, primarily in pediatrics, and joined the team at Indian Stream Health Center in 2007. Tricia was a great Medical Assistant, demonstrating genuine care for the people in her community. She provided wonderful nursing care to patients of all ages and her patients genuinely enjoyed her as well. The pediatric population had a special place in Tricia's heart and she treated every child that she came into contact with as her own.



At Indian Stream Health Center, Tricia was known as the "Vaccine Queen", managing the vaccine program, and serving as a trusted resource for all things vaccine-related. Her passion for the importance of vaccination was evident as she worked alongside her colleagues, always taking opportunities to teach others.

In July of 2014, Tricia was diagnosed with cancer. She quickly began treatments, and in November, returned to work at Indian Stream Health Center putting vaccine information into the electronic medical record system. Although she was unable to have patient contact during this time, Tricia made sure that her patients were still taken care of by completing the behind-the-scenes tasks. Through it all, Tricia never lost the charisma and joy that she exuberated on a daily basis. Her pleasant, positive energy came through in her care of Indian Stream Health Center's patients.

This year, we are honored to present the Tricia McGuire Memorial Award to <u>Teresa Frazier, Medical Assistant, Dartmouth-Hitchcock Concord, Pediatrics and Primary Care Department.</u>

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
