Clinical Recognition of Vaccine Preventable Diseases

As the incidence of vaccine preventable disease decreases, both patient and clinician recognition of previously common infections becomes a difficult task. Without appropriate clinical acumen (including symptoms and signs of less common diseases), timely and accurate diagnosis becomes uncertain when breakthrough infections occur. As each vaccine becomes more effective, diseases decrease and the perceived threat of infection dissipates, challenging the ability to counsel patients and parents regarding the balance of benefits and risks of each vaccine. During this session, the successes of effective immunization programs will be reviewed along with ever recurring lapses in vaccine delivery. Also, specific symptoms and signs of vaccine preventable diseases will be discussed, including all diseases currently on the Advisory Committee on Immunization Practices (ACIP) schedule.

Following this session, participants will be able to:

- Appraise the impact of vaccinations on all vaccine preventable diseases included in the ACIP vaccine schedule, emphasizing more uncommon infectious diseases that are often under-diagnosed;
- List at least three signs/symptoms/complications of vaccine preventable diseases, enhancing effective counseling for patients/parents relative to the benefits and risks of vaccinations;
- Identify at least two clinical manifestations of these illnesses affording participants improved and more timely diagnostic skills, especially relative to recent lapses in vaccination rates leading to recurrent disease.

Join us in celebrating the **50th Anniversary of the Vaccine Assistance Act or Section 317** of the Public Health Service Act and the **10th Anniversary of the New Hampshire Vaccine Association!**

Enacted in 1962, the Vaccine Assistance Act or Section 317 was initially designed to purchase polio, diphtheria, pertussis, tetanus, and measles (added in 1965). As more vaccines have become available, the program has been used to purchase all vaccines recommended by the Advisory Committee on Immunization Practices (ACIP).

The State of New Hampshire presently purchases all vaccines recommended under the US Childhood Immunization Schedule. They are purchased for all resident children, regardless of insurance coverage or income, through the age of 18. The New Hampshire Vaccine Association was formed as a cooperative undertaking among the New Hampshire Department of Health and Human Services, the New Hampshire Insurance Department, and the insurance industry. RSA 126-Q was adopted by the New Hampshire legislature effective June 17, 2002.


