From the President

Bi-Partisan Virtues

Some may think the title of this article is a cute oxymoron. Others may well be tempted to read on. I hope you will do just that.



Speaking for myself and not for the Society of Sons, generally or locally, I am alarmed by the firestorm of partisanship that greets me with almost every newscast. I am alarmed but not surprised. According to historian H. W. Brands, strident partisanship rested at the core of our nation's founding. It is a romantic naiveté to believe the founders were in harmonious lockstep in establishing and creating our democratic Republic. They were not, and far from it. The likes of Hamilton, Madison, Jefferson, Adams and a host of others were possessive of their individual vision of the nascent nation while Washington feared where such political visions might lead. In some ways, what is being displayed in our day might be considered "child's play" when compared to the divisive spirit that prevailed after 1776. The "miracle" is that the American experiment was born, and for almost 250 years it has withstood a host of political headwinds. In one sense, today's assortment of headwinds should make us proud: it could be argued American political divisiveness is soundly patriotic; but at what cost? When do good-old-fashioned political differences cease to make America great and, instead, become a corrosive chipping away at the precious fabric of what makes America the envy of the world?

For Christmas, I received Brands's newest book, **Founding Partisans**. Let me urge you to obtain your copy from bookstore or library, and to read it

before you cast your vote in the Fall presidential election. Brands gives me a glitter of hope that the divisive spirit plaguing our political system can be worked through and it might even strengthen the core values of our Republic for years to come. However, a caution must be raised: in the midst of our prideful political positions, we may end up doing irreparable harm to our party system, and by harm I mean it may dissolve eventually the mutual and civil discourse that was intended to define our form of government. Such an ultimate loss would be tragic, and it might well deliver us into the hands of a form of government many of us, including our Revolutionary ancestors, believe to be anathema to our democratic form of government.

In the meantime, I am buoyed by the witness the Society of Sons provides in our day. The purpose of being Sons is not to minimize the cost of our freedom, a cost each generation must pay not just every four years but year after year. Our witness, our vigilance must ceaselessly point to and advocate for a particular concord among our parties, a temperament that seeks not to destroy but to debate, not to vilify but to voice the greater good that binds us together as Americans. To be sure, I am not asking for one party to surrender principle for the sake of righteous indignation; rather, I want to advocate for a reengagement of a key ingredient that delivered our nation into existence: compromise. In making America great, both in our day and in days to come, we need to view compromise not as a cudgel but as a way to move forward as Americans, citizens who love being members of a free society and who are willing to trust one another with the precious vision for which our ancestors fought and died. Such trust is worth the compromise of being Americans together, united, respectful, and forever free.

Visitation of Revolutionary War Memorial - Centre Presbyterian Church, Mooresville



A November Grave marking ceremony was attended by SRNC President Succop and Chaplain McCullough. A monument placed by the Mecklenburg Chapter of the SAR was dedicated in 2018 to honor members of Centre Church who fought in the American Revolutionary War (1775-1783). The memorial is located beside the historic cemetery where more than 35 Revolutionary War soldiers are buried.

2023 Wreaths Across America

The SRNC was a co-sponsor of the Wreaths Across America Ceremonies at Raleigh National Cemetery.



Each December on National Wreaths Across America Day, our mission to Remember, Honor and Teach is carried out by coordinating wreath-laying ceremonies at Arlington National Cemetery, as well as at more than 2,100 additional locations in all 50 U.S. states, at sea and abroad. The Raleigh National Cemetery has over 5600 graves and each year we get enough wreaths sponsored to have a wreath on every Veteran's grave.

Every year the SRNC lays a wreath in honor of the Revolutionary War Soldiers who fought to create the United States.

SRSC Evacuation Day Commemoration – Dec 16, 2023

At the invitation of the South Carolina Society of Sons, President and Vice President, Gus Succop and Randy Sprinkle, respectively, attended the second Annual SRSC Evacuation Day Commemoration. They were joined by other NC Society members Carlton Mansfield and Joe Steele. The occasion commemorates the day of Dec. 14, 1782, when all British troops left the City of Charleston.

Hosted by the South Carolina Society and President Jeff Murrie, the black tie soiree was attended by members of the GSSR, SRSC, SRNC, SOC, SAR and DAR. The evening was accented with an assortment of archival documentation from the founders of the South Carolina Society as well as enjoyable and convivial hospitality.

Gen. Wm. Lee Davidson Chapter Honors their Namesake at 243rd Commemoration of the Battle of Cowan's Ford

On January 27, 2024 in Huntersville, NC, a contingent of compatriots of the Gen. Wm. Lee Davidson Chapter, SRNC, gathered to pay tribute and render honors to their fallen namesake.

Messrs. Bob Ray, Fred Decker, Chuck Decker, John Misenheimer, and Russell H. McCullough gathered and represented the chapter to remember the **Battle of Cowan's Ford** (1 February 1781) and to lament the loss that day of our hero, General William Lee Davidson, aged 35 ½. Rendering honors for all was Mr. Bob Ray. The final benediction was given by Russell H. McCullough, State Chaplain for the SRNC.



Unlike many observances in past years, where bitter cold was the norm, today's ceremonies were held in seasonally warm weather, though under cloudy skies. A large crowd made up of many patriotic societies, gathered from places as far away as Arizona. After a fine breakfast, the congregation assembled in the sanctuary of the ancient Hopewell Presbyterian Church, still extant, not far from the battlefield where outnumbered Patriot forces sought, unsuccessfully, to deter General Charles Cornwallis from crossing the Catawba in his ongoing assault on North Carolina in pursuit of the stealthy and evasive General Nathaniel Green. Valiantly. General Davidson lost his young life that day in the cause of Liberty. "Honor to whom honor is due," was given him at his graveside after a spirited and patriotic discourse spoken by the 5X great grandson of Patrick Henry, Patrick Henry Jolly of Ohio in the hallowed hall. An honorary musket volley closed the ceremony. Many commented on the numerous wreaths presented as well as the multitude of honors rendered by attendees.

The Sons of the Revolution erected a monument here in the graveyard several years ago commemorating the battle and the loss of General Davidson. Pictured left and below, two new memorials were presented today by our friends from the Children of the American Revolution and the Descendants of Washington's Army at Valley Forge.

Battle of Moores Creek Commemoration – Feb. 24-25, 2024



Color guard members Gary Hall and Joe Steele participated in events commemorating the 248th Anniversary of the Battle of Moores Creek Bridge. The battle was brief, as loyalists mistakenly assumed Patriot forces had retreated - instead they were quickly defeated by the rebels that met them with fierce and fast musket and cannon fire from the patriot earthworks. The whole skirmish possibly lasted only three minutes. The battle would mark the first decisive patriot victory of the American Revolution. Allowing North Carolina to become the first American colony to instruct their delegates sent to the Continental Congress to vote for independence!

George Washington Commemorative Birthday Luncheon – Mar. 2, 2024

Halifax Resolves Day in Historic Halifax, NC – April 12, 2024

The April 12, 1776, resolution calling for independence from Great Britain was the first among the British colonies. It was followed by comparable proclamations by other colonies culminating with the Declaration of Independence in July 1776. The commemoration was organized by the NC Sons of the American Revolution.

Sons of the Revolution Grave Markers Are Available Again!



After a lengthy hiatus, due to Covid and manufacturing delays/complications, grave markers will be made available soon to all Sons of the Revolution (SR) state societies. Special thanks to the Allan Rellinger (**CenTec Cast Metal Products**), SRNC Pres. Gus Succop, and SRNC Treasurer Andy Smith for striving towards the finish line.

An older cast medallion, possessed by the New York Society, was used to re-make the mold pattern. The museum piece is a significant historical marker. Soon, the new replica commemorative markers will be available. Prior to reestablishment of the forging process, the SR had been without a general embodiment for state societies to honor ancestors or to identify publicly membership in the society. Sometime this summer, inventory will be available once again!

Grave marking ceremonies provide high profile Society and color guard opportunities to enhance a state society's visibility. A grave marking ceremony does not necessarily require a color guard to be present; it can be done in conjunction with other hereditary societies. It does need to be done with descendants of the patriot and the cooperation of the cemetery, however. Publicity is key to visibility and needs to be arranged weeks before. Local newspapers, TV and social media should all be contacted. Cemeteries will have rules for graveside ceremonies. Representatives should be contacted before working with the family.

The SR grave markers are bronze, 5 ¾ inches in diameter and have two lugs for screws on the back. To mount to a stone, two half inch holes are drilled into the stone to a depth of about an inch. Cement or epoxy is put into the holes and screws placed into the back of the marker are pressed into the filler, which makes the marker permanent. In the case of a fragile gravestone or a stone with no room, a concrete pad of about twelve by eighteen inches can be buried in the ground so that a mower can pass over it without damaging it. The local society can add an inscription to the pad as desired.

Lighter aluminum markers with an adhesive backing are also available. These can be placed on a wood backing with a plate or certificate as an award or recognition of membership. The aluminum marker has a bronze finish.

Ordering ability will be available in the coming weeks - as we reestablish the process and make sure it is operational and ready. Currently, pricing for the bronze and (lighter) aluminum grave markers, together with shipping and handling, is being determined, based on current manufacturing costs. **Stay tuned for more information on this matter.**

Partnership with Friends of Historic Halifax



Pursuant to the Board's action at the 2022 Annual Meeting, the SRNC has entered into partnership with the "Friends of Historic Halifax." Halifax, North Carolina, is important to the cause of American Independence. On April 12, 1776, the Halifax Resolves were published. The Resolves, the first proclamation from a British colony, called for independence from Great Britain. Months later in Philadelphia, the spirit of the Resolves would find full expression in the passing of the Declaration of Independence by Congress. For 2023, the SRNC made a gift to FOHH that will be used to enhance the garden at the Visitors' Center in the historic district of Halifax.

Overmountain Victory Trail Association (OVTA)

SRNC supports Each vear. the organizations that promote the spirit of the American Revolution. Recently, the SRNC entered into partnership with Historic Halifax, the location where the Halifax Resolves were published calling for Independence from Great Britain. The significant fact about the Resolves is that it marked North Carolina as the first colonial entity to call for Independence. The SRNC another organization, supports also an organization that some may not recognize but whose witness reminds us of a deciding battle of the Revolution, the Battle of Kings Mountain (Oct. 7. 1780).

Like our support of Historic Halifax, the SRNC gives annually to the Overmountain Victory Trail Association (OVTA; www.ovta.org). The association makes it possible for thousands of students to learn about the Revolution, in general, and the Battle of Kings Mountain. in particular. Specifically, the association makes it possible for school children to take a field trip that informs them about American history. Whether a OVTA program site is visited or whether the OVTA takes a program to a particular school, the history lesson learned is invaluable. Hopefully, one day, many of the students who come in contact with the OVTA will seek membership in the SRNC or a comparable hereditary organization, to which we can all say, Huzzah!

New SRNC Website & Newsletter!

NC & SC Societies forging common cause with Grave Marker efforts

During the Presidency of Ivan Bennett (2016-18), SRSC became interested in the recasting efforts of the traditional grave markers by neighbors in NC. The revived marker, in concert with General Society approval, became available in 2015 after a long absence. SRSC viewed the markers as a unique opportunity – for use in wreath laying, monument dedication, plaques and grave markers.

A plaque presented to the Heritage Library on Hilton Head Island at Zion Cemetery and Baynard Mausoleum was the first bronze marker presentation. Four Revolutionary War soldiers are buried at the cemetery.



The markers were in the annual wreath laying and presentation at Ft Thicketty near Gaffney SC. SRSC celebrates the engagement at Ft Thicketty, every August. The marker was mounted to the door frame of the building by Chuck Swoope (pictured above), Past President of SRSC.



A grave marker was installed at a ceremony and wreath laying at the Isaac Hayne Plantation Cemetery and Grave site (above). Isaac Hayne was a Revolutionary War martyr who was hung in Marion Square, Charleston, SC. His plantation is in Jacksonboro, SC. Initially posted in the ground and in consideration of the upcoming Semiquincentennial, state park officials thought it best to affix permanently the grave markers to the brick columned entrance of the cemetery.



A grave marker was placed at the Thomas Heyward Jr. monument in Ridgeland, SC Cemetery. The SRSC had its annual pilgrimage to Thomas Heyward Jr. cemetery in July for a wreath laying presentation with ancestors of the signer of the Declaration of Independence. The ceremony is a youth event with SR Junior Members responsible for the program.



The most recent grave marker ceremony was a \$1400 monument largely funded by the GSSR. SRSC, and SR Greenville Chapter. Small donations came from Colonial Dames and DAR. The location is in Pickens county (near Clemson). The annual December ceremony is in conjunction with Wreaths Across America. The cemetery of 30-35 Rev War soldiers is behind Pickens Chapel. This impressive monument is a contemporary addition to two other monuments in Charleston (from 1895 and 1905) at the Liberty Tree and the Old Exchange.

These many uses of grave markers have been provided by the SRSC with sincere appreciation and gratitude to SRNC. Through the use of these been plaques, monuments, and grave markers, we support the efforts of the General Society to commemorate the sacrifices of our ancestors for coming generations.
