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A high regard for 'Political Suicide' I guess I haven't done a re-I won't go into the subject view of a theatrical event for matter beyond the obvious, indicated by the title, so as The Citizen for perhaps 25 years — probably "Wizard of not to give away any of the

Oz" by Streetcar in 1987 but I have one for you now that you have to go see.

'Political Suicide," four short plays written and directed by Ernest Thompson - he also acts in three of them — is playing at Pitman's Freight Room on New Salem Street, Laconia, through Feb. 12.

Don't put it off until then. You can catch the show Fridays and Saturdays at 8 or Sundays at 2 p.m., the weekends of Jan. 13-15 and Feb. 3-5 and 10-12. You may want to go back and see it again.

This is professional theater — professionally written, professionally acted, witty, funny and poignant.

surprises. But I guarantee you will be captivated by each of the stories perhaps challenged.

Yes, there is a bit of "adult language" here and there, but I think that even your middle-schoolers can handle that, thank you very much. Although Thompson is

the only actor appearing courtesy of the Actor's Equity Association, his castmates are certainly up to that organization's high standards. Austine Howard, Pat Langille, Evan Clinton and Meredith Imbimbo (in order of appearance, of course) are also wonderful, believable, credible. I am reminded of the days

of Alton Wilkes' Lakes Region Playhouse, which entertained us so well from 1950 to the early 1980s. In fact, Thompson even makes a curtain speech reminiscent of those of Wilkes over at the old barn in Gilford. Quite a lot of material has

appeared in the press about Ernest Thompson, who "has performed on Broadway and in theatres on both coasts, starred on two TV series and

films." And, "as a writer, his work includes the plays *On* Golden Pond, which he directed last summer in Whitebridge Farm Productions' very successful run at the Little Church Theatre in Holderness, and which has been translated into 28 languages and been produced in more than 40 countries." Yes, I'm cribbing from the

show's souvenir program which, by the way, is one of the more literate I've encountered. Another of the actors is

Evan Clinton, born in Laconia but who has lived in Moultonborough for most of his life, graduating from Moultonborough Academy in 2007. His portrayal of a student activist/demonstrator is totally convincing and the final sentence in that scene is a tour de force for Thompson, both as writer and actor.

Austine Howard, a cofounder of the Little Church Theater, shows true stage appeared in numerous presence in her characters,

as do Meredith Imbimbo and Pat Langille. Of Imbimbo, a recent graduate of Franklin Pierce University, the program advises to "catch her daily performances at Hannaford Supermarket. Langille has acted profes-

sionally in the New England area since 2007, including "a stint this summer playing M'Lynn in Steel Magnolias at the Winnipesaukee Playhouse."

Hope I've convinced you that we have a real treasure in Whitebridge Farm productions. Go see "Political Suicide" now before it decamps to Broadway, off or off-off.
