

TENNESSEE



U.S. MINT News-

Uncirculated 2023 Morgan and Peace dollars will be priced at \$67 per coin. Proof versions will be priced at \$73 per coin.

The U.S. Mint also plans to execute a two-coin Reverse Proof set containing 2023 Morgan and Peace dollars. That set will be offered at \$175.

There are no 2022 dollars being produced.

U.S. Mint releases 2022 Kennedy Half Dollars- July 8th report

There apparently is a need for Kennedy half dollars, as the Federal Reserve has placed orders for millions of circulation quality coins for release into commerce channels in 2022.

U.S. Mint spokesman Michael White informed *Coin World* July 1 that the bureau to date had shipped 5.2 million circulation quality Kennedy half dollars to the Federal Reserve — 3 million from the Denver Mint production and 2.2 million from the Philadelphia Mint.

Another 3.08 million coins — 1.54 million from each facility — were sold by the U.S. Mint above face value in bags and rolls.

Denver Mint employee steals error coinage - July 7th Report

185 error coins were recovered.

The report does not indicate in what capacity the unidentified Denver Mint employee serves. Three of the stolen error coins had been handed out as souvenirs by the alleged thief.

The Denver Mint employee received a 14-day suspension, after the OIG's office provided the Mint with information gained from its probe into the theft.

According to the report, criminal prosecution of the employee was presented to and declined by the United States Attorney's Office for the District of Colorado in Denver.

UPDATE- 1882-CC GSA Morgan Dollar struck 15% off-center has been graded MS-65 at NGC. Fred Weinberg offered \$2000 but the offer was declined. I personally think the coin is worth \$50,000 to \$100,000, it being the only GSA off-center in existence.

Spanish Galleon found off of Columbia with Treasure on board.

The 64-cannon Spanish ship San Jose was sunk by the British navy during an encounter in 1708 during the War of the Spanish Succession. According to Colombian government reports, the ill-fated ship was carrying more than 200 tons of emeralds, gold, and silver coins. The value of this treasure has been estimated at perhaps as much as \$17 billion.

New finds from the Spanish galleon Maravillas that sunk in 1656 have been made off the Bahamas. Emeralds, gold chains and coins were recovered recently from the debris field. This ship has been salvaged for 350 years. Just when you thought they found everything, they find more treasurer.
