

Letter From the Pastor

Greetings parishioners,

As you may know, this is my second year offering "Teenager Order of Christian Initiation" — a program for young people who have a desire about the Catholic faith but were not raised Catholic. This year, the program has grown significantly compared to last year, and this year I meet with ten teens on Saturday mornings. These students come from both public and Catholic schools and are seeking to join the Church through this program.

This is wonderful news — that young people who were not raised in the Catholic faith are now choosing to become Catholic! However, there is a bit of an obstacle. Although these teens have fallen in love with Jesus, many are journeying alone in that relationship. Their parents have graciously given them permission to join the Church, yet most of these teens do not have anyone in their lives who can serve as their sponsor for Baptism and Confirmation at the Easter Vigil.

I would like to ask for your help!

If you would be open to serving as a teenager's Catholic sponsor, please prayerfully consider this invitation.

A Confirmation sponsor is not merely a name on a certificate or someone who stands beside a candidate on the big day. A good sponsor is a guide, mentor, and example of what it means to live as a committed Catholic. Sponsors accompany their candidates through prayer, conversation, and encouragement

— helping them to recognize the gifts of the Holy Spirit and how those gifts shape everyday life.

To serve as a sponsor, one must be a confirmed Catholic, at least sixteen years old, and actively practicing the faith. Also, if married their marriage must be recognized by the Church. Most importantly, a sponsor should strive to live in a way that reflects Christ's love — someone the candidate can look to as a model of faith, service, and integrity.

If you are asked to be a sponsor, take time to pray about it. Say "yes" not only to the ceremony but also to Jesus' call to be a fisher of men and women — even after the Easter Vigil. Stay in touch with your candidate after Confirmation. Celebrate their milestones and remind them that the Holy Spirit is always at work in their lives, especially during times when faith feels challenging.

Through this sacred friendship, both sponsor and candidate grow closer to Christ and His Church. What a beautiful calling that is!



Dear Fellow St. Joseph Parishioners,

Since I composed the original bulletin announcement thanking Steve and Connie Marek for their nine years of service as Fish Fry Chairpersons and asking parishioners to consider following in their footsteps by volunteering to fill that role in time to shadow them during their tenth and final Fish Fry season this coming Lent, I thought I should follow up with some important information. This is Tressa Reith, and I have had the pleasure of watching Steve and Connie work their Fish Fry magic for several years. No one has stepped forward to volunteer or even called Steve to learn about the task, so I thought I'd go ahead and answer a few unasked questions.

The new Fish Fry Chairpersons do not have to be a married couple. That worked beautifully for Connie and Steve, but future Fish Fry leadership might look different. It could be two people, or more than two, if that's what it takes to get volunteers, and they certainly don't have to be married.

The new Fish Fry Chairpersons do not have to commit to ten years. Of course, once the new leaders learn the job and get comfortable with it, we hope they will be able to stay in place for a good while but, if ten years isn't in the cards, that's OK.

The new Fish Fry Chairpersons will not be working alone. There are at least 40 of us who don't feel up to taking the leadership role but who do help and who plan to continue to help. We have a great group of parishioners who pick up the frozen fish every Wednesday and deliver it to the Convocation Center kitchen where another great team unpacks it, thaws it, and layers it in pans that are kept chilled and ready for cooking on Friday. There is another great team who gathers on Thursdays to prep condiments and side dishes. Anything that can be done prior to Friday is taken care of by this team. Friday has a food prep team, a set-up team, and a kitchen team. When it's go-time on Friday, we have two who fry fish, one who bakes fish, four who bread fish, kitchen runners, food servers, outdoor order takers, cashiers, table bussers, dish washers, and clean-up crew. We also have someone whose responsibility it is to get all these helpers signed up for each week. (That's my job.) I tell you all this to assure you that volunteering to Captain the Fish Frys once Steve and Connie hang up their aprons at the end of Lent 2026 will not be a lonely position. There are lots of us who help. We just, for as many reasons as there are people, are not up to being in charge of the whole operation.

I won't speak for my fellow Fish Fry helpers, although I feel pretty sure that I could, but I will tell you that I am still willing to do the jobs that I've been doing for these last several years. Along with scheduling volunteers, I also do the advertising and marketing. I suspect that most of my Fish Fry partners in this project are going to continue doing their usual jobs as well. It's fun!

If you want to volunteer in any capacity at all, I will gladly sign you up. I'll share my phone number closer to Lent. If you have volunteered in the past, you know I'll be asking you to help again. Most of all, if you are someone who is thinking that you just might have what it takes to be our new Fish Fry leadership, know that you will have lots of support from those of us who have worked Fish Frys in the past. If anything about this intrigues you or if this assurance of help convinces you that you can do this job, please contact Steve Marek at (419) 295-1827. I've filled you in on what we helpers do. We are support staff. Only Steve and Connie know the complete job description for the leadership roles. Please call Steve if you want to know more.

Special Pastoral Message on Immigration



United States Conference of Catholic Bishops

As pastors, we the bishops of the United States are bound to our people by ties of communion and compassion in Our Lord Jesus Christ. We are disturbed when we see among our people a climate of fear and anxiety around questions of profiling and immigration enforcement. We are saddened by the state of contemporary debate and the vilification of immigrants. We are concerned about the conditions in detention centers and the lack of access to pastoral care. We lament that some immigrants in the United States have arbitrarily lost their legal status. We are troubled by threats against the sanctity of houses of worship and the special nature of hospitals and schools. We are grieved when we meet parents who fear being detained when taking their children to school and when we try to console family members who have already been separated from their loved ones.

Despite obstacles and prejudices, generations of immigrants have made enormous contributions to the well-being of our nation. We as Catholic bishops love our country and pray for its peace and prosperity. For this very reason, we feel compelled now in this environment to raise our voices in defense of God-given human dignity.

Catholic teaching exhorts nations to recognize the fundamental dignity of all persons, including immigrants. We bishops advocate for a meaningful reform of our nation's immigration laws and procedures. Human dignity and national security are not in conflict. Both are possible if people of good will work together.

We recognize that nations have a responsibility to regulate their borders and establish a just and orderly immigration system for the sake of the common good. Without such processes, immigrants face the risk of trafficking and other forms of exploitation. Safe and legal pathways serve as an antidote to such risks.

The Church's teaching rests on the foundational concern for the human person, as created in the image and likeness of God (*Genesis* 1:27). As pastors, we look to Sacred Scripture and the example of the Lord Himself, where we find the wisdom of God's compassion. The priority of the Lord, as the Prophets remind us, is for those who are most vulnerable: the widow, the orphan, the poor, and the stranger (*Zechariah* 7:10). In the Lord Jesus, we see the One who became poor for our sake (*2 Corinthians* 8:9), we see the Good Samaritan who lifts us from the dust (*Luke* 10:30–37), and we see the One who is found in the least

of these (*Matthew* 25). The Church's concern for neighbor and our concern here for immigrants is a response to the Lord's command to love as He has loved us (*John* 13:34).

To our immigrant brothers and sisters, we stand with you in your suffering, since, when one member suffers, all suffer (*cf. 1 Corinthians* 12:26). You are not alone!


We note with gratitude that so many of our clergy, consecrated religious, and lay faithful already accompany and assist immigrants in meeting their basic human needs. We urge all people of good will to continue and expand such efforts.

We oppose the indiscriminate mass deportation of people. We pray for an end to dehumanizing rhetoric and violence, whether directed at immigrants or at law enforcement. We pray that the Lord may guide the leaders of our nation, and we are grateful for past and present opportunities to dialogue with public and elected officials. In this dialogue, we will continue to advocate for meaningful immigration reform.

As disciples of the Lord, we remain men and women of hope, and hope does not disappoint! (cf. Romans 5:5)

May the mantle of Our Lady of Guadalupe enfold us all in her maternal and loving care and draw us ever closer to the heart of Christ.

The USCCB Special Pastoral Message on Immigration was issued on November 12, 2025 at the Fall Plenary Assembly of Bishops in Baltimore. It was approved by the general membership of bishops and released for immediate distribution.
