It will take a combined effort from all of us to continue to seek replacements.

My term as Commander would not have happened without the support of many members. Our Adjutant has given endless hours maintaining our records and has kept us financially sound. Blue Team Six continues to be a vital part of our VSO (Veterans Service Organization) goal of honoring our departed veterans. These members show up in all kinds of weather and have never said "no" to a request to honor our deceased veterans. Proud would not even come close to how I feel about their service.


Nebraska by educating them in the workings of state government --- as well as the politics involved with the various offices.

Thankfully, this Spring has been much quieter than a year ago for motorcycle accidents --- but they are still take place at the Denton American Legion happening. I asked then that you keep an eye out for motorcycles as an ALR member may

be riding it, and I'm asking for that again this year.

This Spring has not only been quiet for accidents but for our Chapter activities as a whole. We were recently at the Star City Customer Expo and helped at a few other events; but, otherwise, not much has been going on. That will soon change!

We will kick off the Summer as many of you will --- paying our respects to those in Heaven's ranks by being part of Memorial Day services. We will be part of the services at Lincoln Memorial (as usual), and some members will be part of their home post activities. Then, there will be weekend after weekend of poker runs, parades, and surrounding community events.

Our own Poker Run will be Saturday, June 9th --- with an Auction and our Raffle drawings to follow. Our poker run ends at the Denton Legion Post. Everyone is invited to meet us there, bid on items in the Auction, buy some Raffle tickets, eat dinner, and meet some great folks.

Our Chapter is currently holding two raffles. One is for a "Battle Flag" made of cold-rolled steel from a company in North Carolina. It's painted and treated to be displayed outside with mounting brackets already part of the flag. The second raffle is for a quilt that was made by ALR Vice Commander Jerry Hutchinson's wife, Lynda, and their daughter. It has a center panel with a motorcycle and the words "Born to Ride." The panel is then bordered by fabric strips in matching red and yellows. The quilting is in the shape of flames and was wonderfully done by a local quilter. Don't ride yourself? How about a family member? You can be ahead of the game for a birthday or Christmas if you win!! Tickets for either raffle are \$5 each or 5 for \$20. The quilt has a limit of 500 tickets, the Battle Flag a limit of 1,000.

Some of the funds raised this year have already been designated to go into an emergency fund that is dispersed by Post 3. The more we raise, the more veterans who are in need of emergency assistance can be helped. These emergencies arise from vehicle breakdowns, utility bills and rent assistance, and even

medical bills. We all have had a time or two where some extra cash was needed to get you through and you couldn't wait for red tape to obtain government assistance. Last year, we were able to donate \$2,000 to start this fund; and it has been completely depleted. It would be great to be able to have a larger reserve after the Poker Run and Raffles have been tallied. By the time you read this, we will either be preparing to celebrate Memorial Day or we will have already done so. However, every day is an appropriate time to remember and give thanks for all those men and women who serve and who have served this "One Nation Under God." 

PRISONERS OF WAR AND MISSING IN ACTION

World War II saw more than 16 million Americans in uniform with more than 400,000 killed. As of this posting, 72,934 service personnel remain unaccounted.

Nebraska Missing In Action



Navy Petty Officer, First Class Charles Henry Alexander

Born September 15, 1921, Petty Office First Class Alexander grew up in the sandhills village of Springview, Nebraska.

Alexander enlisted in the Navy and served as a Yeoman (administrative specialist) aboard the submarine USS Argonaut. The Argonaut entered service in 1927 as a

minelayer but was converted in 1942 into a troop transport submarine. Not an attack submarine, it did carry out attack missions against Japanese warships. During an attack mission on 2 January 1943, Argonaut sank the Japanese gunboat Ebon Maru in the Bismarck Sea, northeast of New Guinea. Eight days later, the Argonaut spotted a convoy of five freighters, which were escorted by three Japanese destroyers. According to a report submitted by a crewmember of an Army Air Force bomber, who witnessed the engagement, the Argonaut hit one of the destroyers with a torpedo. The destroyers counterattacked, and it appeared at least one of the depth charges they launched caused catastrophic damage to the Argonaut. The aircrew member reported the Argonaut's bow suddenly broke the water at an unusual angle. The wounded and hapless submarine was then circled by the destroyers and shelled until it disappeared beneath the sea. The Argonaut carried one hundred and two officers and men --- the worst loss of life for an American submarine in wartime. Prior to that final cruise, the Argonaut's bell was donated to the chapel at the Pearl Harbor submarine base, where it remains in service today.



Army Sergeant Melvin C. Anderson

Born December 12, 1912, Sergeant Anderson was raised in Douglas County, Nebraska. He enlisted in the Army and rose to the rank of Sergeant as a Gun Commander in the 803rd Tank Destroyer (TD) Battalion (Bn).

The 803d TD Bn participated in the Normandy Beach landings, arriving in the vicinity of St. Lo, France on 8

June 1944. Their arrival marked the first of the unit's 330 days of combat. From 19 September - 16 December 1944, the 803rd fought in the Hürtgen Forest offensive in the eastern Belgium border region with Germany. That engagement was the longest battle the U.S. Army has ever fought. The Allied objective was to pin the Germans in the Aachen, Germany area. Casualties were horrific, with U.S. forces suffering over 33,000 killed and the Germans over 28,000.

SGT Anderson commanded an M10 Tank Destroyer, which was a modified M4A2 or M4A3 Sherman tank mounted with a 76.2mm main gun. It had a five-man crew. On 25 November 1944, SGT Anderson's M10 was hit by enemy fire. He was believed to have attempted to escape the damaged M10 and was ultimately listed as missing in action. His remains have never been recovered. A Tablet of the Missing at Netherlands American Cemetery, Margraten, Netherlands, bears his name; and he was posthumously awarded a Bronze Star shortly before the end of the war in Europe.

The 803d's unit motto was 'Seek, Strike and Destroy' but at least one soldier joked it was 'Sneak, Peek and Retreat'. The 803rd earned five campaign stars, a Presidential Unit citation, and the French and Belgian Fourré à Guerre's.



Army Air Force

2LT Edgar A. Waite

Born 11 May 1921, in Crawford, Nebraska, 2LT Waite graduated from Scottsbluff High School where he had been a star athlete. He enlisted in the Army Air Force and became a co-pilot of a B-25 'Mitchell' (named for MG

William 'Billy' Mitchell), two-engine medium bomber. He was assigned to the 345th Bomber Group in the Pacific.

The B-25 medium bomber was converted to enable it to function in a strafing role because bombing in the heavily jungled environs of the South Pacific was determined ineffective. The 345th became well-known for the success it achieved in this role.

The conversion included placing four forward-firing .50-caliber machine guns in the plane's nose section. Armed with eight fifty-caliber machine guns, twin fifties in the top turret and tail, and single fifties at the waist positions made the B-25 a formidable ground attack aircraft. Later versions would bring the total forward firing capabilities to 14 forward firing .50 caliber machine guns that could be used effectively against the superstructure of an enemy ship as the armor-piercing incendiary projectiles melted it.

On 25 January 1944, a B-25 dubbed the 'Dittum-Dattum II', which 2LT Waite co-piloted, was on a low-level strafing run of the Momote, Los Negros airfield in the Admiralty Islands north of Papua, New Guinea. Waite's bomber was struck by anti-aircraft fire causing it to crash and explode. There were no survivors.

2LT Waite is listed on the Tables of the Missing at the Manila American Cemetery.

Jerry Cummings POW / MIA Liason



At the May meeting of Post 3, forensic anthropologist Dr. Traci L. Van Deest was the guest speaker. Dr. Van Deest works for the Defense POW/MIA Agency at Offutt Air Force Base and gave a very interesting presentation on the work she and others do recovering and identifying the remains of veterans lost in service to their country.


