CENTENNIAL MOMENT

July 24, 1963: Future two-term U.S. President Bill Clinton, then a 16-year-old student at Hot Springs, Ark., High School, famously meets and shakes hands with Legionnaire President John F. Kennedy at the White House during American Legion Boys Nation. Clinton had been chosen as a delegate to Boys Nation after participation in Arkansas American Legion Boys State. The experience that summer, and the opportunity of meeting JFK, helped inspire Clinton to begin a life of public service and elected office.
