
AMERICAN LEGION AUXILIARY



PRISONERS OF WAR AND MISSING IN ACTION



Remembering Captain William "Bill" Lawrence: A

Testament to Courage and Faith

Every September, as our nation observes National POW/MIA Recognition Day, which always falls on the third Friday of September, we pause to honor those who endured captivity and those who never made it home. This

year, I find myself reflecting on one man's story --- a story of grit, faith, and an unshakable love for country: Captain William "Bill" Lawrence, United States Navy.

On May 19, 1967, while flying a combat mission over North Vietnam, Captain Lawrence's F-4 Phantom was shot down. He was captured and spent the next six years and eight months in the infamous "Hanoi Hilton" and other prison camps. Six years — think about that. Six Nebraska winters and summers. Six Christmases. Six birthdays. All spent in isolation, often shackled, with barely enough food to survive.

What kept him going was more than sheer willpower. Lawrence leaned heavily on his faith, reciting the Lord's Prayer countless times a day. He composed poems in his mind to keep his thoughts sharp. He tapped messages through the walls to fellow prisoners, maintaining a sense of brotherhood when the captors tried to break them apart. He later credited his survival not to luck, but to an unwavering belief in God, in America, and in the men beside him.

When he was finally released in 1973, Captain Lawrence came home --- not bitter, but grateful. He returned to service, eventually becoming Superintendent of the U.S. Naval Academy. His life became a living reminder that hardship can forge the strongest steel.

Mid-September is when we officially pause to remember our POWs and MIAs, but their stories deserve to be carried with us year-round. Here in Nebraska, where the wind whips across the fields and the seasons turn like clockwork, we can take a page from Captain Lawrence's book — to endure, to stay connected, and to hold fast to the values we cherish.

As we mark this year's National POW/MIA Recognition Day on September 19th, let us remember not just Captain Lawrence, but every man and woman who sacrificed their freedom for ours. Let's say their names, share their stories, and make sure our children know what that black-and-white POW/MIA flag truly means.

DIGNIFIED FLAG RETIREMENT

It is fitting and proper that flags that have been used for the decoration of graves or displayed at homes or businesses be collected and inspected. Worn and unserviceable flags will be condemned and properly destroyed.

The approved method of disposing of unserviceable flags has long been to destroy them by burning. The purpose of The American Legion in adopting this ceremony was to encourage proper respect for the flag of the United States and to provide for the disposal of unserviceable flags in a dignified manner.

On Saturday, July 19th, after a short Flag Retirement Ceremony, members of Post 3 conducted a Dignified Flag Retirement at Dave Timmerman's acreage. In less than an hour, an estimated 1,500 flags were retired.

Notes from the Adjutant's Office

RENEWALS

2026 Renewals: As we start the 2026 American Legion membership year, we currently stand at 585 members. Department Life members currently are down to 45 in number, with six members having joined the Post Everlasting this past year. Over the past three years, we have lost 11 Department Life members.

Online Renewals. 69 members have renewed so far, one for three years. Those who previously took advantage and renewed for three years should not have received a renewal notice. For those who are Paid-Up-for-Life (PUFL) members, your 2026 membership card should have been mailed out from the National Headquarters sometime in July. If you have not received your 2026 card, please let us know.

For those who did not renew for 2025, you were classified as expired as of January first --- and you probably have stopped receiving The American Legion magazine. You could be denied entry into a Legion Club. For those who are in the American Legion Insurance program, your coverage also ended as of the 31st of December 2024. You must be a member in good standing to be covered.

American Legion insurance is easy to obtain. Just go to the American Legion website and enroll. Legion Insurance covers you while you are traveling to an American Legion activity.

Military Service. We are still trying to update our membership roster as to your branch of service and the war era in which you served. National has been printing on the back of renewal slips the data that is in the Legion database. Please check and add and correct as needed so we can correct our database. Thanks. It makes it so much easier to reach out to you if needed.

VSO Web Sites to Visit.

Nebraska's Department of Veterans Affairs, VFW, DAV, and AMVETS websites are a great place to find current and helpful information on what Congress is currently working on and how it could affect you as a veteran. The VA website has many tips on filing claims and links to other VA services to which you are entitled. The VFW, DAV, etc. do an excellent job of keeping track of Congressional activities that can or will affect veterans.

VA News (veteransaffairs@messages.va.gov). The Nebraska Department of Veterans Affairs and your local County Service Office are here to serve you. They can pull up your records of military service and help track the claims you may have filed. If you have not visited with your service officer, now would be a great time to stop and visit with him/her.

The 2025 Nebraska Legislature may have passed legislation that affected you and your benefits.

Membership.

We need to talk with our younger troops who have served since the Gulf War. They will become the backbone of our VSOs in a few years. Without these younger veterans, we will no longer have a strong voice in Congress. Without a strong voice in Congress, we will keep losing funding for the Department of Veterans Affairs and the VA Health Care System.

If you are a member of this group of veterans or know a veteran from these conflicts, please ask them if they are a member of a VSO (veteran service org); and, if not, ask them to please join. They may not be using VA services now, but may wish to in the future --- and then find that VA services have been cut back due to a lack of a strong voice in Congress..

During this past month, we have lost three members who have died and four who have transferred out to other posts. One member has transferred into Post 3, and one has joined as a new member.

We thank them all for their service and for being members of Post 3 and the American Legion.

40 MEN AND 8 HORSES

La Societe des Quarante Hommes et Huit Chevaux, otherwise known as The Society of 40 Men and 8 Horses, was founded in 1920 by Joseph W. Breen at American Legion Post 297 in Philadelphia, Pennsylvania.

Inspired by World War I French boxcars, which were stamped with the 40/8 to indicate that they could carry either 40 soldiers or 8 horses, Breen and 16 other prominent Legionnaires envisioned an elite membership and camaraderie for leaders of the American Legion. Today, their legacy continues to stand strong, bringing hope to a new generation of veterans.

The Forty and Eight severed ties with the American Legion in 1959 and became an independent organization; but, with many vestiges of its parent organization remaining intact --- including the prerequisite of American Legion membership.

There have been many changes in eligibility for the Forty and Eight starting with the elimination of racial restrictions in 1973, gender restrictions in 2006, and the prerequisite for American Legion membership in 2008.

The members of Lincoln Post #3 and Lincoln Voiture #103 have been working side by side for over 100 years with programs that benefit the veterans and their families of Lincoln and Nebraska. Just because the national organizations didn't get along doesn't mean that we haven't. I am a 55-year member of the American Legion and a 42-year member of the Forty and Eight --- and have served at the local, state, and national levels of both organizations. At the local level, we have always cooperated and shared information between both organizations.

Also, the Eight and Forty is an organization that was at one time affiliated with the American Legion Auxiliary but was never part of the Forty and Eight. It is NOT the auxiliary of the 40/8, and the American Legion has not disassociated itself from the 8/40. The national American Legion regularly sends a representative to the National Marche (convention) of the 8/40 for the presentation of some Child Welfare awards.

I hope this explains why we publish the activities of these organizations and their members in our newspaper and monthly newsletter.

LINCOLN CBOC (COMMUNITY-BASED OUTPATIENT CLINIC)

One of the most frequent questions I am asked is, "Where is the Finance Office?" I'm sorry to say that the Lincoln CBOC does not have a finance office on site. If you have a billing question, you will have to call the number that is listed on the copay notice you might have received.

The food drive to collect food items for our homeless veterans in the Lincoln area is still ongoing. Things being requested are shelf-ready items, power bars, easy-to-open items (pull tabs), etc. Please do not bring in food items that are past their expiration date --- they just must be thrown away.

Other items that our homeless veterans could use are hygiene care items. They should be the small size that would fit easily into a backpack.

As the weather changes from fall to winter, these homeless veterans could use warm clothing, hats, gloves, underwear, etc. Volunteer Services has a list of the most requested items. In Lincoln, they can be reached by calling 402-486-7938 or texting Ty.Andrews@va. gov

Flu shots and Covid shots: Shots are available only to those enrolled in the VA

Health system. Those with an appointment will be asked if they wish to receive a current shot during their visit with their care provider. Walk-ins can request a shot by speaking to the MSA staff at check in and waiting for a nurse to be free to give you the shot.

There are no mask requirements at VA clinics and hospitals. Masks are available for those who wish to wear them at the front doors of the clinics.

Express Care, a walk-in service, is available for those who wish to have a nurse check out minor items. Times might be different at your local clinic, so give them a call and see if they offer Express Care (walk in) service. This care is available to those who might wish to see a VA nurse without an appointment during normal hours. The Lincoln Clinic treats 300 a month as walk-ins.

Want to serve your fellow Veterans? The VA can use more volunteers at your local clinic or hospital. You can volunteer to help veterans in the clinic or hospital, or at a veteran's home. Or you can donate to your local clinic, hospital, or veteran's home. They can always use a monetary donation.

Also, you can donate activity bags for younger kids to have when they come to the clinic / hospital with a parent for their appointments. There is always a need for the younger kids who come with parents, grandparents, etc., when too young to be left alone at home.

Clinics / hospitals can always use books, magazines, etc. for patients. You would need to check with your local hospital / clinic / veteran's home volunteer office to see what items they need or allow. This would be a great project for your church, school, or youth group.

Hours given by the volunteers are credited with saving the VA Health at Omaha, Lincoln, and Grand Island the equivalent of 25 full-time staff employees. This is based on an hour of service being credited at the rate of \$31.50 dollars per hour.

Service animals: The only animals that should be brought into a VA Health clinic / hospital are trained service dogs, etc., that qualify under DVA requirements. Other pets / comfort dogs, etc., do not qualify and should be left at home.

VA Claims: With the signing of the PACT Act, more veterans have become eligible for services, not only for those who served "boots on the ground," but for anyone who has served since the Gulf War. If you have any questions, call your local service officer, VSO, county, or state. It only takes a few minutes to see if you might qualify for an increase or a new VA disability rating.

The Veterans Affairs website is a great place to visit. You can find out the latest information affecting Veterans. You can track claim status, file for travel pay, view your VA account, payments received, or copay owed. You can make the copay payments online, etc.

Thanks for your service to your fellow veterans, and thanks for your service to this great country.


