Post 3 Legionnaires,

Attached to the email containing the newsletter is a document from Post 3 Legionnaire Wendy Gumb. Legionnaire Gumb has declared her candidacy for Area C Vice Commander, and she asked that the attached document be sent to Post 3 Legionnaires. We complied with her request.

You may recall that the membership present at the Post 3 monthly business meeting in April voted unanimously to endorse the other candidate, Legionnaire Martin Neal, for Area C Vice Commander. Legionnaire Neal has served numerous terms as Post Commander of his local post. He has also served for several years as the Lancaster County Commander. He is just finishing his two-year term as District 12 Commander.

Legionnaire Gumb has done none of those things at the Post, County, District or State level, either in Nebraska or in California, where she previously lived. While Legionnaire Gumb has highlighted, in the attached document, her work with American Legion Baseball in California, she did not mention that she is currently banned from Nebraska American Legion Baseball by the Department Athletic Committee, as is Post 3, as long as Legionnaire Gumb is a member of Post 3.

Commander's Call



Fellow Legionnaires,

This will be my final newsletter Commander's Call to you. As you know, we will be electing a new slate of officers at our June meeting, and they will be installed at the July meeting. Please continue to give your newly elected officers the support they need so that we can continue our service to Veterans and our community. It has been my honor and pleasure to have served you over the past two years as Commander of Lincoln Post 3, and I thank you for your support.

Saturday, June 14th, is designated as Flag Day in the United States. June 14th is also the US Army's birthday, 250 years young! Although Flag Day is a nationwide observance, it is not a legal holiday.

Here are some interesting tidbits about the American Flag:

The American Flag is not just a piece of fabric. The Flag of the United States represents freedom and has been an enduring symbol of the country's ideals since its early days. It is symbolic of the fabric of our society as a nation. It has been carried far and wide as a symbol of American pride, all the while serving as an emblem of the freedoms we hold dear.

There have been 27 versions of the American Flag. The 1777 original one had 13 stars and 13 stripes for the American colonies. Each time a state was added to the union, a star was added. We, of course, now stand with 50 stars and 13 stripes.

The current Flag is the only one to have lasted more than 60 years. There have been many changes to the design of the American Flag. But the one we currently observe is the longest running symbol of our Nation, as no states have been added to the union since 1959.

The Flag can be displayed 24 hours a day. While it is Federal law that the Flag should be displayed from sunrise to sunset, unless there is inclement weather, there are measures that can be taken to show the Flag for all 24 hours. All that needs to be added is proper illumination of the Flag, so that it can be seen in the dark.

The colors were chosen carefully. The Red, White and Blue did not just happen by accident. The founding fathers wanted the colors to have meaning, not just look visually pleasing. Red symbolizes hardiness and valor, white symbolizes purity and innocence and blue represents vigilance, perseverance, and justice.

The Flag that flew at Ft. McHenry, immortalized by Francis Scott Key in our National Anthem, "Star Spangled Banner," is still around. A 2" x 5" swatch of that Flag was sold at an auction in 2011 for a whopping \$38,000. The rest of the Flag is on display at Smithsonian's National Museum of American History in Washington D.C.

Five American Flags have made it to the moon. You have probably seen Neil Armstrong on the moon with an American Flag, but he is not the only one to plant one on the surface of the moon. Apollo missions, 12, 14, 15, 16, and 17, ended with an astronaut placing a flag on the moon.

The Flag can touch the ground and still be used. There is a misconception that once a Flag touches the ground it needs to be burned or disposed of. That's not entirely true. If a Flag is soiled or touches the ground, it can be washed and cleaned and continue to be used. Flags should be disposed of in a "dignified manner." If an American Flag is damaged beyond repair and you need to dispose of it, you can burn it with dignity or give it to a local Veterans Service Organization (i.e., American Legion Post 3, DAV, VFW, etc.) for a dignified Flag disposal.

The President is requested to issue each year a proclamation to call on government officials in the USA to display the Flag of the United States on all government buildings on Flag Day and to urge US residents to observe Flag Day as the anniversary of the adoption of the Stars and Stripes as the official Flag of the United States. I hope you will join me in displaying "Old Glory" from your home or business on June 14th.

Elsewhere in the newsletter, please find a copy of the poem, "A Toast to the Flag." Penned in 1917 by journalist John Jay Daly, his poem has received many awards and has even been recited on the floor of Congress. Mr. Daley, a patriot, served in WWI. Many of you have heard me recite this poem at various events. The recitation of this fundamental tribute to the Stars & Stripes in the form of a poem is meant to awaken great feelings of patriotism in the hearts and minds of all who are within earshot.

As always, I ask you to keep our Veterans in your thoughts and prayers, particularly those who may be in need. Also, please keep our active-duty service men and women, wherever they may be dispersed, in your thoughts and prayers as well.

Notes from the Adjutant's Desk



I hope that all American Legion members took time to remember our fellow comrades who served before us, with us, and those who will follow us. This year marks the end of WWII 80 years ago and 50 years for the end of the Vietnam War.

Members of Post 3 were busy over the Memorial Day weekend, providing Honor Guards at three events held in

Lincoln. They began the day with wreath laying and firing a volley at Wyuka's Memorial Day program. Followed by providing a Flag detail and a firing a volley at Lincoln Memorial's cemetery program. Finished the day providing a Flag detail for the Lincoln's Veteran Memorial Garden program.

This past month we have been working on 50 plus years of continuous membership certificates. Awards were presented to those who were able to attend our April meeting. The certificates for those who could not attend have been mailed to them. Need to make a correction, Gerald Salber should have been listed for 50 years of continuous membership in the American Legion.

If you feel you should have received a continuous year certificate and did not receive one, please contact the Post 3 office. We worked off the certificates that we received for Legion National office. We failed to double check the list against our 2025 membership roster.

2025 Renewals: We are still running behind 2024. The current 2025 membership stands at 937 about 87 % of our 2025 goal. We should be at 95%. If you know a current or past member who has not yet renewed for 2025, their 2024 membership card expired as of 31 December 2024.

2026 Renewals: National began printing 2026 membership cards beginning May 1, 2025. They were based on the Post 3 roster of PAID members as of this date. If you had not paid your 2025 dues by 30 April 2025, your 2026 membership card will not show any years of continuous membership in the American Legion. As of January first, you were classified as expired, you will stop receiving The Legion magazine, and you could be denied entry into a Legion Club. Those who are in the Legion Insurance program, your coverage also ended as of 31st of December 2024. You must be a member in good standing to be covered. If you have not yet signed up for Legion Insurance, it is easy to do, just go to their website and enroll.

I want to thank those members who have renewed. If you happen to receive notice and you KNOW that you have received your 2025 membership card, please just throw the notice away. No need to let us know. If you have paid and have not received your 2025 membership card, then call or drop us a note.

Post 3 has 50 Department Life members and 122 PUFL members. 57 members have participated and paid their dues for 3 years. For those who would like to renew for three years, you can do so by logging onto Legion.Org and click the RENEWAL link. You will be given the opportunity to renew for three years.

The rate for renewing will be at the current rate of \$56.00 dollars. The advantage of renewing for three years is that you will save any new renewal increases for the next 3 years.

We still are trying to update our membership roster as to branch or service and the war era that you served. National has been printing on the back of renewal slips the data that is in the Legion database. Please check and add as needed so we can correct our database. Thanks, it makes it so much easier to reach out to you if needed.

Sorry to say we have lost another Veterans Club here in Lincoln, NE. DAV, Chapter 7, has closed its lounge on North 70th Street, as of the end of March 2025. Chapter 7 will still be holding monthly meetings there.

Department of Veterans Affairs, VFW, DAV, AMVETS web sites: These web sites are a great place to find current and helpful information on what Congress is currently working on and how it could affect you as a veteran. The VA website has many tips on filling claims and links to other VA services to which you are entitled. The VFW, DAV, etc. do an excellent job of keeping track of Congressional activities that can or will affect veterans.

VA News (veteransaffairs@messages.va.gov).

The Nebraska Department of Veterans Affairs and your local County Service Office are there to serve you. They can pull up your records of military service and help track your claims you may have filed.

The members of the most current conflicts are now the backbone of not only the American Legion, but also the VFW, DAV, AMV, etc. Without these younger veterans we will no longer have a strong voice in Congress. Without a strong voice in Congress, we will keep losing funding for the Department of Veterans Affairs and the VA Health Care System.

If you are a member of this group of veterans or know a veteran from these conflicts, please ask them if they are a member of a VSO (veteran service organization) and if not, ask them to please join. They may not be using VA service now, and may wish to in the future, then find that VA services have been cut back due to a lack of a strong voice in Congress.

Again, Thanks for your Service and Thanks for being a member of Post 3. Also remember to thank your fellow Veterans for their service.

Lincoln CBOC/VA News



The quarterly VA Rep meeting was held on Wednesday, May 21, 2025.

The Lincoln CBOC: Food drive to collect food items for our homeless veterans in the Lincoln area is still ongoing. Items requested are shelf ready, power bars, easy to open items (pull tabs), etc.

The Health Information Fair held at the Lincoln CBOC clinic building, May 13th, was well attended, with an estimate of 225. A small snack lunch was served. The hope was to draw veterans in the Lincoln area who do not take advantage of the services available to them within the VA Health Care System. Lincoln CBOC clinic sees about 220 veterans a day.

It was brought up that the Combat Veterans Motorcycle Association in Lincoln and the VA Homeless Clinic is in need of donations to help veterans furnish their apartments. See attached sheets for the needed items.

The Lincoln Clinic will be closed on the 4th of July. Volunteer Services is looking for VSOs to bring in treats on Thursday July 3rd to serve to veterans that day. The Lincoln Clinic will have a Garden Swap during the summer.

For those who use MyHealthy Vet, be sure you have set up Your ID.me account. The current sign-in will be going away soon.

Flu shots and Covid shots: Shots are only available for those enrolled in the VA Health system. Those who have an appointment can receive a shot during their visit with their provider. Walk-ins can request a shot by speaking to the staff at check-in and waiting for a nurse to be available to give you the shot. There are no mask requirements at VA clinics and hospitals. Masks are available for those who wish to wear them at the front doors of the clinics.

Express Care, a walk-in service, for those who wish to have a nurse check out minor items. Times might be different at your local clinic, so give them a call and see if they offer Express Care (walk-in) service. This care is available to those who might wish to see a VA nurse without an appointment during normal hours. The Lincoln Clinic treats 300 a month as walk-ins.

Want to serve your fellow Veterans? The VA can use more volunteers at your local clinic or hospital. You volunteer to help veterans in the clinic or hospital, or a veteran's home. Or you can donate to your local clinic, hospital, or veteran's home. They can always use a monetary donation, or you can donate activities bags for younger kids to have when they come to the clinic or hospital with a parent for their appointments. There is always a need for the younger kids who come with parents or grandparents when they are too young to be left at home alone.

Clinics and hospitals can always use books, magazines, etc. for patients. You would need to check with your local hospital, clinic or veteran's home volunteer office to see what items they need or allow. This would be a great project for your church, school, or youth group.

Hours given by the volunteers are credited with saving the VA Health at Omaha, Lincoln, and Grand Island an equivalent of 25 full-time staff employees. This is based on an hour of service being credited at the rate of \$31.50 dollars per hour.

The only animals that should be brought into a VA Health clinic or hospital are trained service animals that qualify under DAV requirements. Other pets, comfort dogs or animals do not qualify and should be left at home.

With the signing of the PAC act, more veterans have become eligible for services, not only for those who served boots on the ground, but anyone who has served since the Gulf War. If you have any questions, call your local service officer, VSO, county, or state. It only takes a few minutes to see if you might qualify for an increase, or a new VA disability rating.

The Veteran Affairs web site is a great place to visit. You can find out the latest information affecting Veterans. You can track claim status, file for travel pay, view your VA account, payments received, or Copay owed. You can make the Copay payments online, etc.

Thanks for your service to your fellow Veterans and thanks for your service to this great country.



Regular Meeting of American Legion Post 3 Lincoln Elks Lodge #80 May 13, 2025

Commander Bruce Gubser opened the May 13, 2025 meeting of American Legion Post 3 at 7:00 PM at the Lincoln Elks Lodge 80 with 17 Legionnaires present.

Veterans of the various war eras were asked to stand and be recognized.

The minutes of the April 8, 2025 meeting were read and approved.

Steve Bartos reported that we now have 20 boys from the Lincoln area scheduled to attend Cornhusker Boys State. He also indicated that he and Commander Gubser conducted a Boys State Orientation on May 4th for about a dozen boys from Lincoln and one from Waverly.

Ed Schnabel gave the financial report for the month ending April 30, 2025, showing a balance of \$43,915.25. It was approved and filed for review.

Adjutant Schnabel reported 2025 membership as 936. He indicated that the first dues notices for 2026 are scheduled to be mailed from Indianapolis the first week of July.

Dr. Jackson gave an Americanism report.

Gerry Wolf reported for the Memorial Squad and outlined some upcoming activities.

Gerry Wolf also reported that he, Ed Schnabel, Department Commander Boyd Yochum, and Fred Craigie (for the 40/8) had attended the Chancellor's Review at the University of Nebraska and passed out some ROTC awards.

Gerry also said that Post 3 had a presence at the Junior ROTC program at Lincoln Northeast High School.

Brendan Moore reported for the Sons of the American Legion. He indicated that Squadron 3 was 2 members short of reaching goal for 2025.

Brendan also reported on the 50-Year Continuous Membership Certificates that had been presented at last month's meeting of Post 3 or delivered personally by him or Fred Craigie to most of the remaining recipients from Lincoln.

Commander Gubser reported for the American Legion Riders. Rifle Raffle tickets are still available. The Riders will meet this Thursday.

The Birthday Card Program continues.

Gerry Wolf reported for the nominating committee. He presented the following slate of candidates for office for the coming year.

This weekend I attended my first National American Legion Meeting in Indianapolis, my primary purpose was to better understand the leadership direction, especially the programs under the Americanism Committee and American Legion Baseball.

Meeting alongside my fellow veterans was inspiring, particularly those who understand our dual mission as legionnaires, serving locally while supporting our National Organization's broader veteran initiatives. However, what I witnessed is what a lack of term limits at all levels, especially in our committees; creating stagnation in progress. When personal position takes precedence over organizational progress, it undermines our effectiveness as an organization.

Fresh leadership talent stands ready to serve yet face resistance when seeking transparency and questioning outdated practices. The refusal to embrace change in favor of preserving personal influence undermines our organization's vitality. Those who challenge the status quo often find themselves marginalized rather than welcomed as catalysts for necessary evolution. This systemic resistance to progress threatens the Legion's future relevance. The time has come to break through institutional stagnation and champion meaningful change.

Core Observations from the Spring Meetings in Indianapolis:

- The inspiring aspects of connecting with fellow veterans who understand the importance of local impact
- The concerning reality of entrenched leadership resistant to modern approaches
- The tension between preserving tradition and necessary evolution

Key Challenges:

- Leadership stagnation due to lack of term limits on Committees across the entire organization
- A 1955 mindset trying to solve 2025 problems
- · The exhausting choice between fighting the status quo or waiting it out
- The disconnect between those who cling to "this is how it's always been" and those who see the need for change
- The "I am just going along to get along" to stay in leadership while remaining ineffective.

As a veteran-led organization, the American Legion must balance its proud heritage with modern business practices to remain effective and relevant. While our mission is service-focused, success requires implementing sound business principles, maintaining ethical leadership, and embracing progressive change. This approach ensures we honor our traditions while adapting to meet contemporary veterans' needs through transparent operations and strategic planning. Our commitment to service excellence demands both respect for our legacy and the courage to evolve.

The American Legion's Core Transformation Priorities:



Modernization Imperative: The critical need to align our organization with contemporary realities, shifting from outdated paradigms to forward-thinking approaches that ensure our relevance through 2045 and beyond. My HealtheVet Is Moving on June 4, 2025

What to know about this change

My HealtheVet on VA.gov is our new health portal for managing your health care online. After June 4, 2025, you'll need to use this new experience instead of the previous My HealtheVet experience. We want you to know what's changing from the previous My HealtheVet experience, how to get started, and how to get support if you need it.

What to expect: After June 4, when you sign in to the current My HealtheVet, you'll notice that we've moved over to the new experience on VA.gov. You'll need to go to My HealtheVet on VA.gov to access appointments, medical records, medications, and messages. We encourage you to start using the new My HealtheVet experience today.

Important note: Veterans who receive care from a VA health facility that uses the My VA Health portal will still need to go to that portal to manage their health care needs for now.

What's new: You can now manage your VA health care in the same place where you manage your other VA benefits and services. And our new mobile-first design and accessibility improvements make it easier to use on any device. We've also added these features and more:

- Track messages more easily with threaded conversations and faster autosave
- Review, print, and download specific parts of your medical records
- Add VA health appointments to your personal digital calendar
- Review your submitted travel pay reimbursement claims and file simple mileage claims
- Review your after-visit summaries
- Order certain medical supplies and equipment online

Other important changes to note:

You can use our Share My Health Data app to track your vitals and share them with your provider.

You can no longer use My HealtheVet as a personal health record to enter and store your own health information outside of your electronic health record. This change helps us make sure that all your important information is in the record your care team has access to. Tell your team about new information you would like added to your record.

To access your previously self-entered information, go to the medical records section of the new My HealtheVet experience on VA.gov. Then select the self-entered health information report. This report includes historical data entered in these My HealtheVet features:

- Caregivers
- Health History
- Journals
- My Coverage
- Self-Entered Medications and Supplements
- Self-Entered Tests
- Self-Entered Vitals
- Treatment Facilities

Shared Vitals:

We're replacing the Shared Vitals feature with the web version of Share My Health Data. After June 4, you'll be able to launch Share My Health Data from the medical records section of the new My HealtheVet experience on VA.gov. There you can securely add health details from your device and share them with your VA care team.

VA Blue Button report:

After June 4, the VA Blue Button report will no longer include My Goals, Wellness Reminders, or VA Electrocardiogram (EKG) information. If you want to save your historical information for your records, download a VA Blue Button report before this date.

How to get started:

Sign in to My HealtheVet on VA.gov with your identity-verified Login.gov or ID.me account. There, you'll find links to the new versions of your trusted health tools.

After you use the new versions of these tools, select Feedback from any page within the portal. Then answer the 3 questions to tell us what you think. We use your feedback to keep improving our tools for you and all Veterans.

WWII Army MIA Identified





The Defense POW/MIA Accounting Agency announced that U.S. Army CWO Charles G. Benthien, 46, of Denver, Colorado, killed during World War II, was accounted for Feb. 25, 2025.

Benthien's family received their full briefing on his identification, therefore, additional details on his identification can be shared.

In April 1942, Benthien was assigned to the Headquarters, Philippine Department on the Bataan Peninsula, in the Philippines. He was held as a prisoner of war by the Empire of Japan in the Philippines until 1944 when the Japanese military moved POWs to Manila for transport to Japan aboard the transport ship *Oryoku Maru*. Unaware the allied POWs were on board, a U.S. carrier-borne aircraft attacked the *Oryoku Maru*, which eventually sank in Subic Bay. Benthien was then transported to Takao, Formosa, known today as Taiwan, aboard the *Enoura Maru*. On Jan. 9, 1945, the Japanese reported that Benthien was killed when U.S. forces attacked and sank the *Enoura Maru*.

Following the end of the war, the <u>American Graves Registration Command (AGRC)</u> was tasked with investigating and recovering missing American personnel. In May 1946, AGRC Search and Recovery Team #9 exhumed a mass grave on a beach at Takao, Formosa, recovering 311 bodies, including those designated as designated X-530 Schofield Mausoleum #2. Following unsuccessful attempts to identify the remains, they were declared unidentifiable. They were buried in the National Memorial Cemetery of the Pacific (NMCP), Honolulu.

Between October 2022 and July 2023, DPAA disinterred Unknowns from the NMCP linked to the *Enoura Maru*, including X-530. The remains were accessioned into the DPAA Laboratory for further analysis.

To identify Benthien's remains, scientists from DPAA used dental and anthropological analysis. Additionally, scientists from the Armed Forces Medical Examiner System used mitochondrial, Y-chromosome, and autosomal DNA analysis.

Benthien's name is recorded on the Walls of the Missing at the Manila American Cemetery and Memorial in the Philippines, along with the others still missing from World War II. A rosette will be placed next to his name to indicate he has been accounted for.

Benthien will be buried in San Diego, California, in June 2025.

Vietnam Army Soldier Awarded The Medal Of Honor





Army Sgt. William David Port took his oath to protect his fellow soldiers seriously. In Vietnam, when a grenade landed among his platoon mates, he didn't hesitate to give his life to save them. Port never made it home from war, but for his sacrifice, he posthumously received the Medal of Honor.

Port was drafted into the Army in March 1967 at the height of the Vietnam War. Five months later, he was shipped to the Southeast Asian country to serve as a rifleman with Company C of the 5th Battalion, 7th Cavalry, 1st Air Cavalry Division.

On Jan. 12, 1968, then-Pfc. Port's platoon was on its way to cut off a group of enemy soldiers in the Que Son Valley when they came under heavy fire from an entrenched enemy force. The intensity of the gunfire required them to quickly withdraw.

Port was wounded in the hand during the initial firefight. Despite the continuing gunfire, he ran through the area to help a wounded soldier get back to the safety of the platoon's perimeter.

As the assault continued, Port and three other soldiers were taking cover behind an embankment when an enemy grenade landed in their midst. Without any concern for himself, Port shouted "grenade!" to warn his fellow soldiers of the danger before hurling himself on top of the device as it exploded.

According to newspaper reports, a medic worked on Port's injuries for more than two hours as the fight continued, but eventually heavier enemy fire forced the unit to withdraw, and since Port appeared to be gravely injured, they were forced to leave him behind. His sacrifice, however, saved the lives of at least three men.

Port was initially listed by the Army as missing in action. The service later learned that the North Vietnamese had taken him as a prisoner and that he had died on Nov. 27, 1968, and was buried in a jungle grave with eight other men.

Port's courage and devotion to duty were not overlooked. He was posthumously promoted to sergeant. On Aug. 6, 1970, his widow and two of his children, Nevin and Kimberly, received the Medal of Honor on his behalf from President Richard M. Nixon during a White House ceremony. In 1975, the children also received a Bronze Star in his name at a ceremony at Fort Indiantown Gap, Pennsylvania.

Port's remains were eventually repatriated to the United States. On Oct. 18, 1985, he was buried in Arlington National Cemetery.

Port is remembered near his hometown in Huntingdon, Pennsylvania, where a bridge crossing the Juniata River was named in his honor.
