LETTER FROM THE CHAPLAIN

AMERICAN LEGION RIDERS



Greetings, American Legion Riders & Friends ---

Well, the long, hard, winter is now in the rear view mirror. Spring has sprung. May is Motorcycle Awareness Month. The motto is "Look Twice, Save a Life." I ask my fellow Riders to keep their head on a swivel and be safe while riding. I ask my fellow drivers on four (or more) wheels to keep an eye out for motorcycles.



Shannon, a very good friend (and fellow Legion Rider) of my bride and me, lives in Florida and, a couple weeks ago, was out cruising with her husband, cruising along at about 45mph, when a "distracted driver" (in other words, a jerk on his cellphone while driving) turned left right in front of her. She tried to avoid the collision, but was unable to do so. Her motorcycle struck the pickup, and our friend was thrown over the hood and landed on the pavement on the other side.

Florida motorcycle riders are not required to wear a helmet, but she always does. That helmet saved her life. Her injuries consisted of a compound fracture of her lower left leg (which has already required multiple surgeries over the past week), multiple facial fractures (in spite of wearing a helmet), and a severe facial partial evisceration (look that one up). She is now home from the hospital and will require some additional medical procedures over the next weeks and months, but is on the road to recovery. If you are so inclined, I'm sure Shannon would appreciate your prayers.

The bottom line is this. Everyone in or on a motorized vehicle is responsible for the safe operation of that vehicle. Please, please, please --- do not drive or ride while distracted or impaired. Motorcyclists, please watch out for cars and each other. All drivers, please watch out for motorcycles and each other.

On a lighter note, please make sure you mark your calendar for our Poker Run on Saturday, May 22nd. Everyone is welcome, whether on two-, three- or more wheels. This fundraiser for Pets for Vets and Guitars for Vets starts at Frontier Harley-Davidson, 205 NW 40th Street, with registration from 10:00 AM-noon. Our endpoint is the Denton Legion Club. Prizes will be awarded at 5:30 PM. Denton will be serving dinner, as well; so come hungry!

We also began a fundraiser (recipient organizations to be determined) which we are calling the "Lack of Cents Challenge." During this challenge, your American Legion Riders will be riding miles for funds to benefit our local veterans and vharities by asking friends, family, and associates to "sponsor" them as they ride this riding season. We are taking beginning mileage readings on each Rider's motorcycle (or car, for those who are unable to ride), and the sponsor agrees to donate an amount based on the number of miles ridden from now until October 31, 2021.

For example, if a sponsor agreed to one cent per mile and the rider logs 5000 miles between now and October 31st, the sponsor would donate \$50. If the sponsor agreed to 1/2 cent per mile, the sponsor would donate \$25 for that same 5000 miles. I encourage our riders to find multiple sponsors, at ANY amount per mile (e.g., 1/10 cent, 1/4 cent, 1/2 cent, 1 cent, 5 cents, 10 cents, 25 cents, 50 cents, 100 cents, and so on). Of course, if the sponsor wanted to donate a flat dollar amount, we would graciously accept that as well.

Lastly, at our April meeting, we amended our bylaws to bringing them in line with requirements set by National Headquarters. The most significant change was a name change for two leadership positions in the Chapter. The leader of our chapter, yours truly, now is known as Director (formerly Commander), and second-in-command is now known as Assistant Director (formerly Vice Commander). Sadly, this means that Assistant Director Ray will no longer be known as the "Commander of Vice." LOL!!! Sorry about that, Ray.

Seven-years ago, Girl Scout Leader Bonnie Horne of Troop 20631 contacted Unit 3 Secretary Nancy Vallis, a lifetime member of the Girl Scouts organization, and asked if the Lincoln unit might be interested in helping them ship Girl Scout Cookies to deployed military members by paying

the postage for the packages. Unit members thought it was a great idea and have been doing it ever since.

At our February Unit 3 meeting, Bonnie Horne and two Girl Scouts (daughter Erica Horne and Rein Guill) did a fine job of telling of their project where they not only sell their Girl Scout cookies to friends and family; but also encourage them to purchase additional boxes for any military family or friend who is currently deployed. Since they only earn 60 cents on each box of cookies sold, this has been a good project for both the unit and the troop.

Bonnie signed off by saying if we know of any deployed military friends/ family members who would enjoy receiving a box we should let them know ---and, through the help of the Auxiliary, a box will be sent.

Chaplain Jeanie Harris reported she was a member of the Nebraska Admiral Association of Nebraska. Annually, the association brings in naval personnel of the Ohio-class USS Nebraska Nuclear Submarine (USSN-739) to Nebraska and honors them by hosting several events across the State.

Fleet Admiral David Olson of the Association was asked if he knew of any Naval personnel on the USSN-739 who were personally from Nebraska to whom the Girl Scout group could send a cookie box.

He was totally impressed with the idea. Ironically, his daughter is the Girl Scout Camp Director of Utah; and, between David and his daughter, they carried through with the mission. They ended up collecting \$297, which resulted in 48 boxes of cookies being sent. Admiral Olson noted he was sorry not to give the Lincoln troop any points toward sales. However, sharing "giving" ideas with others is always a "win-win" story.

LINCOLN AREA YOUTH PICKED TO ATTEND AMERICAN LEGION CORNHUSKER BOYS' STATE AND AMERICAN LEGION AUXILIARY CORNHUSKER GIRLS STATE

Cornhusker Boys' State and Cornhusker Girls State, educational programs sponsored by the Nebraska American Legion and Nebraska American Legion Auxiliary that teach about city, county, and state government in a nonpartisan manner, remain two of the best-known and most respected projects associated with the American Legion Family.

Twenty-four young men and sixteen young women from the Lincoln area were chosen to be among the approximately 350 high school junior boys and 400 high school junior girls who normally attend the annual sessions of Cornhusker Boys State and Cornhusker Girls State. The week-long events were scheduled to begin on Sunday, June 13th on the University of Nebraska Lincoln campus. The delegates would have had hands-on learning as they held their own elections for public office, legislature, and court systems while living as citizens of their mythical towns. Students selected to attend must have demonstrated good scholastic records, leadership qualities, honesty, and good character.


Unfortunately, the 2021 sessions of Cornhusker Boys State was cancelled due to concerns and circumstances associated with the pandemic and Cornhusker Girls State was converted to a "virtual" session this year.

Lincoln's American Legion Post 3 sponsored the Lincoln boys who were to attend and contributed the enrollment fee for some. A number of other American Legion Family or community organizations also contributed enrollment fees.

Lincoln's American Legion Auxiliary Unit 3 and Havelock American Legion Auxiliary Unit 342 sponsored the Lincoln girls who were to attend and contributed the enrollment fee for some. PRISONERS OF WAR AND MISSING IN ACTION



Clarence "Shorty" Goodwin passed away almost 6 years ago at the age of 92. Shorty may have departed this world, but his legacy, the insurmountable pain and suffering he endured for our country, and the incredible sacrifices he selflessly underwent will forever be present.

It is the duty of those of us who have followed in Shorty's footsteps, in serving our country, to ensure that honorable

men and women who have sacrificed as a POW, or even further, laid down their lives for our country, are never forgotten. We must speak of them often and seek out ways to ensure that knowledge of their selfless sacrifices are passed on to generations to come so that our society may never forget from where we came.

Shorty Goodwin was one of five survivors of his 42man unit. He was captured and tortured by the Nazis, who forced him and many others to walk hundreds of miles from location to location, shooting stragglers along the way. Shorty underwent an emergency appendectomy, performed by another POW on a small Polish farm, being stitched up with the thread from a feed sack found in a barn.



He and his fellow POW's scrounged water from mud

puddles wherever they could find them. The only food they were given was infested with maggots or covered in mold, but they learned to eat what they could to maintain their survival. Eventually, Shorty was able to jump from a moving train car and make his way to the Russian military who miraculously facilitated his return to the Americans. The atrocities to which Shorty was subjected were horrendous and remained with him to his dying day.

Shorty still considered himself one of the "fortunate ones" who was able to escape from captivity and make his way home. However, no matter how much time passed, he always carried the physical and emotional scars of the dreadful time he spent as a POW. It's important to know stories such as Shorty's in order to keep his legacy alive, as well as to keep our own daily problems in perspective.

There are many stories like Shorty's, and we should strive to learn about as many of them as we can and share them with our friends and family in hopes that they will do the same. We must always honor those who blazed the trail that we now walk on.
