We Currently stand at 1064 paid members for 2024, or 96% of our goal of 1107.

Thanks to those who have let us know they had not received their 2024 membership cards. We have received only a few this year, but if by chance you have not received your 2024 membership card and have sent a payment, please let us know. We try to get cards

out within a day or two of receipt of payment.

Thanks to those who have made use of the MyLegion web site to renew their membership. It is quick and easy; you can even print your own 2024 membership card.

The American Legion National leadership has raised National dues \$5.00 a year beginning July first, 2024. Department of Nebraska most likely will raise their dues at their 2024 Department Convention this summer. At this time, Post 3 will not be raising its dues for 2025, remaining at \$11.00 dollars. The Post 3 dues beginning July 1st will be \$56.00 dollars. (National - \$23.50, Department - \$ 21.50, Post 3 - \$11.00)

Want to save 20 or 30 Dollars? As of this date, we have 20 members who have taken the opportunity to extend their membership for two or three extra years, saving themselves \$20 or \$30. To take advantage of this opportunity you need to log onto MYLEGION.ORG. Once there, click on renew, it should bring up current renewal status, paid for 2024. It then should allow you the opportunity to renew for an additional two or three years. If you have questions, give us a call.

We would like to thank those who have provided the request for phone/emails information. We have many members who do not have a phone number or an email address on file. Same goes for branch of service, or war era. National has been printing on the back of the renewal slips, the data that is in the Legion data base. Please check and add as needed so we can correct our database. Thanks, it makes it so much easier to reach out to you if needed.

The Honor Guard has been busy this spring with memorial services and flag details. On April 24th, Post 3 provided a Color Guard for "Our Community Salutes", to honor those High School graduates who have enlisted for military service following graduation this spring.

May is always a busy month for Post 3 Honor Guard, as we are called upon to provide details for Memorial events to honor our fellow veterans living in retirement or nursing homes.

This would be the time to review your memorial plans with the family. Locate your DD214 or other discharge papers. You have earned the right to burial in a VA cemetery or request a VA headstone for a private cemetery. You can do all this now by going to the VA web site and filling out the forms. If you need assistance, see your local service officer, or give me a call.

Again, thanks for your Service and thanks for being a member of Post 3. Remember to also thank your fellow Veterans for their service.

Lincoln CBOC/VA News

For FY 2024 (Oct-Apr) the Lincoln Clinic has served 11,397 veterans: 9% of veterans served were female veterans; 58% of veterans served are 65+ years old. On an average day the clinic serves 394 veterans. During FY 23, 315 new veterans enrolled for service at the Lincoln campus.

A new service added to the CBOC is the Orthopedic Clinic and it is now serving veterans, Express Care hours have expanded

to 0830 to 1900 at the Lincoln clinic.

Flu shots and Covid shots are currently being given but you need to call the clinic to schedule an appointment.

VA clinics and hospitals no longer require the wearing of masks to enter clinics. Masks are available for those who still wish to wear them.

Express Care is a walk-in service, for those who wish to have a nurse check out minor items. This care is available to those who might wish to see a VA nurse without an appointment during normal hours.

Want to serve your fellow Veterans? The VA can use more volunteers to help at your local clinic or hospital. Or you can donate to your local clinic, hospital, or veteran's home. They can always use a monetary donation, or you can donate activities bags for younger kids to have when they come to the clinic/hospital with a parent for their appointments. There is always a need as some younger kids come with parents, grandparents, etc., and are too young to be left at home alone.

Clinics and hospitals can always use books, magazines, etc. for patients. You would need to check with your local hospital, clinic, or veteran's home volunteer office to see what items they need or allow. This would be a great project for your church, school, or youth group.

With the signing of the PAC, more veterans have become eligible for services, not only for those who served "Boots on the ground", but anyone who has served since the Gulf War.

If you have any questions, call your local service officer, VSO, county, or state. Only takes a few minutes to see if you might qualify for an increase, or a new VA disability rating.



University Of Nebraska Chancellor's Review





On April 18th, the University of Nebraska, Lincoln ROTC Battalion held their annual Chancellor's Review of cadets and awards ceremony. Adjutant Ed Schnabel and Post 3 member, Gerry Wolf attended the ROTC Chancellor's Review. Post 3 awarded 12 Cadets with certificates and medals for Scholastic Excellence and another 12 Cadets for Military Excellence.

The annual event is a celebration of the ROTC cadets and their commitment to service. Organized by the university's Big Red Battalion (featuring representatives of the Army, Air Force, Navy, and Marines ROTC programs), the event is open to university leaders, alumni, community members, ROTC program partners and special guests.

The university's military science program was established in 1876 under provisions of the Morrill Act of 1862. Today, the military science and ROTC programs are an integral part of the university's commitment to the veteran and military-connected communities.

Later that day, similar certificates and medals were given to two Air Force JROTC Cadets at Lincoln Northeast High School. It might be mentioned that Lincoln Northeast High School is the only Lincoln high school that provides JROTC training in the city.

 - Women Veterans: If you have honorably completed your military service, you are eligible.

- Memorable Experience: Share at least one impactful moment from your service.

WASHINGTON – U.S. Senators Deb Fischer (R-Neb.) and Jacky Rosen (D-Nev.) introduced the Veterans Assistance Helpline Act to maintain a permanent helpline for veterans to quickly obtain information and assistance with all services from the Department of Veterans Affairs (VA).

"We owe so much to our veterans for their sacrifice to protect our country and defend our freedoms. Unfortunately, too many veterans have difficulty navigating the VA and identifying which divisions to contact. The VA's current main information line provides veterans with a single hub to access information about different VA contact centers. Our legislation will codify this resource to ensure veterans can maintain access to this critical tool and better connect with the resources available to them," said Senator Fischer.

"Our nation's veterans sacrificed so much to keep us safe, and the least we can do is make sure they have easy access to VA support and resources, and their hard-earned VA benefits. I'm proud to be working across the aisle to make sure the VA's veteran helpline is permanently codified so they never lose access to a resource that will get them the information and assistance they need," said Senator Rosen.

Background:

The VA has had multiple phone number hotlines for veterans to call with questions about benefits. While the VA lists these phone numbers online, it can be difficult for older veterans to locate this information.

In February 2020, Senators Fischer and Rosen <u>introduced</u> the Veterans Assistance Helpline Act to create a simple helpline for veterans to obtain information and assistance with all VA services.


In response, the VA <u>launched</u> a main information line (1-800-MyVA411) in December 2020. The phone line allows veterans and other eligible individuals to speak with a live agent, who can answer questions and direct them to the proper contact center within the VA.

Senators Fischer and Rosen's <u>new legislation</u> will codify the existing 1-800 number to ensure that it will remain in place for veterans in the future.

According to the VA, there are over 125,000 veterans living in Nebraska.



WWII Nebraska Soldier Accounted For





The Defense POW/MIA Accounting Agency (DPAA) announced recently that U.S. Army Air Force Sergeant White S. Goings Jr., 22, of Auburn, Nebraska, who was captured and died as a prisoner of war during World War II, was accounted for June 27, 2023.In late 1942, Goings was a member of the 93rd Bombardment Squadron (Bomb Sq), 19th Bombardment Group (Bomb Gp), when Japanese forces invaded the Philippine Islands in December. Intense fighting continued until the surrender of the Bataan peninsula on April 9, 1942, and of Corregidor Island on May 6, 1942.

Thousands of U.S. and Filipino service members were captured and interned at POW camps. Goings was among those reported captured when U.S. forces in Bataan surrendered to the Japanese. They were subjected to the 65-mile Bataan Death March and then held at the Cabanatuan POW camp. More than 2,500 POWs perished in this camp during the war.

According to prison camp and other historical records, Goings died July 19, 1942, and was buried along with other deceased prisoners in the local Cabanatuan Camp Cemetery in Common Grave 312.

Following the war, American Graves Registration Service (AGRS) personnel exhumed those buried at the Cabanatuan cemetery and relocated the remains to a temporary U.S. military mausoleum near Manila. In 1947, the AGRS examined the remains in an attempt to identify them. Twenty-two sets of remains from Common Grave 312 were identified, but the rest were declared unidentifiable. The unidentified remains were buried at the Manila American Cemetery and Memorial (MACM) as Unknowns.

In early 2018, the remains associated with Common Grave 312 were disinterred and sent to the DPAA laboratory for analysis.

To identify Goings's remains, scientists from DPAA used dental and anthropological analysis, as well as circumstantial evidence. Additionally, scientists from the Armed Forces Medical Examiner System used mitochondrial DNA (mtDNA) and Y chromosome DNA (Y-STR) analysis.

Goings will be buried in Auburn, Nebraska, in June, 2024.

CITATION

For conspicuous gallantry and intrepidity at the risk of life above and beyond the call of duty in action. On 9 April 1943 in the vicinity of Fondouk, Tunisia, Pvt. Booker, while engaged in action against the enemy, carried a light machine gun and a box of ammunition over 200 yards of open ground.

He continued to advance even though two enemy machine guns and several mortars were using him as an individual target. Although enemy artillery also began to register on him, upon reaching his objective he immediately commenced firing. After being wounded he silenced one enemy machine gun and was beginning to fire at the other when he received a second mortal wound.

With his last remaining strength, he encouraged the members of his squad and directed their fire. Pvt. Booker acted without regard for his own safety. His initiative and courage against insurmountable odds are an example of the highest standard of self-sacrifice and fidelity to duty.


