Commander's Call



Fellow Legionnaires:

I am sure you all know that Thursday, November 11th is Veterans Day.

Veterans Day is a time to honor not just those who have fought for us in battle, but, in fact, all the outstanding men and women who served in our nation's Armed Forces since our founding more than 245 years ago.

Peacetime or wartime, all Veterans have taken an oath indicating that they were willing to offer their lives to defend our Constitution and country. Most Veterans will agree that the best wars are the ones that are never fought.

While many realize that Veterans Day is a day to honor our Veterans, few realize the significance of the day.

Veterans Day originated as Armistice Day and marked the end of hostilities of World War I that occurred on the 11th hour of the 11th day of the 11th month. Therefore, the day is always recognized on November 11th, regardless of the day of the week the 11th falls on.

The day was originally set aside to honor Veterans of World War I with a day of parades and remembrances as well as a pause in activities at 11 am on that day.

However, after World War II and the Korean War, Congress recognized a need to expand the meaning of the day to recognize all our veterans and not just those of World War I.

In 1954, the word "Armistice" was replaced with "Veterans" as a way to formally include all Veterans of all American wars in the day of remembrance.

Since 1938, Veterans Day has been a federal holiday which many cities celebrate with parades and ceremonies. In Washington, D.C., there are ceremonies throughout the city including a wreath laying at Arlington National Cemetery.

For the first time in nearly 100 years, and as part of the Tomb of the Unknown Soldier Centennial Commemoration, the public will be able to walk on the Tomb of the Unknown Soldier Plaza and lay flowers in front of the Tomb on November 9th and 10th. A privilege otherwise given only to the Sentinels of the 3rd U.S. Infantry Regiment, "The Old Guard."

Americans are encouraged to say "Thank You" to those who fulfill the patriotic duty of maintaining the freedom of our country.

Please join us as we celebrate Veterans Day on Sunday, November 7th at 2:00 with the Veterans Day Parade. We will march down K Street from 21st Street to the Capitol. Hope to see you there.

Where is your DD214 or Discharge Papers? And does your family know where to find it?

We keep getting a late request for Military Honors, without the DD214, this can cause the military branch not to be able to carry out your request, as they must have a DD214. •

I cannot over stress this, NOW is the time to be sure that your family knows your wishes. You can help your loved ones with your request for Military Honors by doing some simple things

If you desire Military Honors during your memorial service, you need to talk with your family, so they know your wishes. Your DD214 or discharge papers, is the key piece in requesting Military Honors that are provided by DOD personal.

You can find answers to many of your questions on the VA's web site. The VA's site will help with requesting a VA grave head stone, how to request burial in a National Cemetery, etc. Feel free to call the office for assistance with this effort.

Take time to remember our VETERANS on Veteran's Day, November 11th, 2021. Take time to thank a veteran or a soldier for their service.

LINCOLN CBOC/VA NEWS



The VA Clinics are now providing special clinics for giving the Covid 19 Booster shots. Lincoln COBC had three Saturday clinics for three weeks starting this coming Saturday. These are for the newly approved booster shots. You might want to call if you have not received a notice from the VA to come and get your booster.

FLU shots will begin soon. If you have a doctor appointment, you should be able to request one during your visit. Walk Ins will begin the second week of the month. Again, dates and times will vary by the Clinic you go to for you VA care.

Remember your VA ID card. You are required to check in for your appointment on the Kiosk, you will need your VA ID card or your FULL SSA number. When checking in, the Kiosk will print off your appointments. Be sure to follow the prompts, Continue, to advance to the next screen, until you reach Exit. On the first print out is a number, disregard it, the second print out, it tells you your appointments and which waiting area to wait in. Staff will come out to the waiting areas and escort you to your appointments.

Those needing blood work, there is a Kiosk just for lab check in. It is just to the right of the entrance to the lab. The lab is located to the right of the main entrance in area B. Check in and take your number and have a seat, you will be called by number.

For those visiting the pharmacy, there are two Kiosks for pharmacy, one to speak to the pharmacy clerk and one to pick up your prescriptions. Just a note, if you have old meds you would like to get rid of, you can now drop them off in the Pharmacy waiting area. There is a locked BLUE drop box where you can deposit your old, out of date meds. Get them out of you homes and keep out of our kid's hands.

If by chance you do not have a current VA ID card you can request one while you are in the clinic. You will need to have some form of ID that will allow them to double check your identity. You can use a state issued driver's license and/or state issued ID card.

The process is done by video computer link. Ask any VA clerk and they will show you where the room is for this video computer link. You can also get help to enroll in the VA system, etc. by using this computer link.

Waiting areas, two on the main floor and two on the second floor have NEW NAMES: Area A, to the left and Area B, to the right. The nurse / staff will come to the reception areas and call you by your name. Try and be in the reception area about 15 minutes prior to your appointment time.

For those who are required to make a Copay. If you made a payment to the VA during the last 9 months of 2020, you should receive a refund. The VA sent out notices of the refund and any amount due you. If you have not received a notice and made payments, I would call the VA to check the status of your account.

EYEGLASSES. Those who require eyeglasses may want to check with the VA. When I had my new glasses adjusted the tech told me that there was a change in VA policy, that made almost all veterans eligible to receive glasses from the VA. It would be worth a look to see if you are eligible to get eyeglasses from the VA.

Do you need help traveling to your appointments? You can request rides to the Lincoln clinic or the Omaha VA hospital through the VA.

For appointments at the Lincoln clinic, call the DAV travel number. They will pick up veterans in Lincoln.

Call VTS, Veterans Transportation Service, 402-995-4200, for travel to appointments at the VA hospital in Omaha.

The earlier you call, the better chance of getting a ride. Travel to Omaha fills up quickly, best to request appointments on Tuesdays or Thursdays, as slots for travel on Monday, Wednesday and Friday are very limited.

Morning appointments are best if you will be needing a return trip.

VTS will pick you up at your home and return you to your home. You must call at least 7 to 10 days ahead of the day of your appointment.

Last three items:

Voluntary Services has a new name: VA Center for Development and Civic Engagement (CDCE). If you want to donate items to the VA or Volunteer, you need to contact us at CDCE. Treats for Veterans, was told at our meeting yesterday, that due to lack of space in the Lincoln CBOC, the VSO will not be allowed to set up tables to give out treats to veterans on special days, like Veterans' Day on the 11th.

Last. If you would like to give calls to veterans, the VA has a new program, Compassionate Contact Care Volunteer Program. This would involve calling or receiving calls to talk with veterans. Details are still being worked out.

Remember, the VA will only be there for us if we use its services. If we do not use them, the government sees it as a service not needed here and will cut funding for the Lincoln CBOC. The government funds each CBOC / hospital based on the number of veterans signed up for services in its service area. They, the veterans, do not need to be using the VA for their medical needs, just need to be enrolled in the VA Health Care System.

Funding is based on foreseen needs, not current need, thus we need to talk with our fellow veterans to be sure they are enrolled in the VA system. There are many veterans who could receive medical service but have never signed up for this benefit of our service. Again, it is the old story, use them or lose them.

Post 3 ALR Director's Remarks



Riders and Friends,

Well, November really marks the point where motorcycle riding for most people ends. Leaves on the trees are changing colors and falling to the ground. The temperatures continue to drop. Most sane people tuck their two- or three-wheeled vehicles in for a long winter's nap. Not so for some of your American Legion Riders, many of whom will continue to support Veterans, their families, and the Four Pillars of The American Legion, regardless of the weather.

On Thursday, October 24th, Lincoln Chapter 3 Assistant Director Ray Paulson and Treasurer Dave Dietz traveled to Firth, Nebraska, to present a donation of \$1,300 to the family of Kaylean Gentry. Kaylean was tragically killed in a motorcycle accident earlier this year, leaving behind her husband, Brandon, and five children, four boys and one girl, ages 5-months to 9-years.

Three of the five children have a blood disorder called Hemophilia. Kaylean was very active, both in Nebraska and nationally, with bleeding disorder organizations. Treasurer Dave reported that Brandon was very appreciative of all the support he has received and was especially grateful for our Chapter's donation. It was an honor to be able to provide some small measure of relief and help to the Gentry family.



Although I am writing this in late-October, there is still one event that will have happened before you actually read this newsletter. Your American Legion Riders will be participating in a once-in-a-lifetime event on Saturday, October 30th. We will be supporting the inurnment of the cremains of a Civil War Veteran at Plattsmouth. Private Benton Kinkead, served with the 77th Ohio Volunteers and saw action in four major battles, including the Battle of Shiloh in 1862. Shiloh is remembered as one of the Civil War's bloodiest battles, with over 23,700 casualties, including over 3,500 killed, in the two-day battle.

Private Kinkead sustained injuries during his service and was discharged. He married and moved to Plattsmouth, where he lived until his wife died in 1910. He moved to Washington state and died in 1916. His cremains remained, unclaimed, on a shelf at the mortuary for the next 105 years.

On October 30th, a ceremony will be held in Plattsmouth and Private Kinkead's cremains will join those of his beloved wife.

But what should all this forecasting of "doom-n-gloom" say to you as a follower of Christ.



Sons Of The American Legion News



The SAL meetings are now on the second Thursday of each month and are held at the Post 3 office just south of 84th and "O" street. Please try to attend if you are able.

It has been a tradition for the SAL to provide food baskets for Thanksgiving and Christmas, but with the situation that we are in now it isn't feasible. I have been looking for other outlets for SAL to contribute to veterans' community. With the addition of the Victory Park apartments, I have offered the services of the SAL to see what we could do for the residents. It appears that the meals are taken care of by HyVee and other local groups. It is a new complex so they do have some other things that we can provide. Rugged

patio furniture would be nice, but it is too late in the season for that. Patio heaters seemed to be a good solution, so I purchased two of them in the name of the SAL.

They came un-assembled so that the veterans would take some claim to them and take good care of them.

Each year, the Department Commander and Adjutant are invited to Fall Meetings in Indianapolis. During that meeting, time is set aside for Department Commanders/Adjutants to enter into a competition with other Departments. The competition is to predict where the Departments believe their respective membership numbers will be (percentagewise) when the March membership goal date rolls around. All Departments are supposed to be at the 90% mark by that March date.

Department Commander Benes and Department Adjutant Salak pledged Nebraska would be at 91.15% or 23,787 members as of March 2022. Post 3 has a goal of 1344 members at year end. Let's try to do our part before that. If you have not renewed, do so now. If you know of a veteran who has served at least one day of active military duty since December 7, 1941, and was honorably discharged or are currently serving honorably, let's get him/her signed up.

Adjutant Schnabel reported that we are at about 69% of our 2022 goal. Let's help Commander Benes win this competition!

Hardships Make Us Stronger.



On Thanksgiving Day of 1944, Harry and Daisy Reab were informed that their son had gone missing two weeks earlier on November 9 while fighting near Vossenack, Germany, in the battle of Hurtgen Forest.

Amongst one of the most cherished and most joyful times of the year, they were devastated when they heard this news, but they continued to hope that he would resurface. However, seven months later, the Army informed the Reabs that their son Lyle had been presumed dead. Harry and Daisy would live out the rest of their days wondering whatever happened to their son Lyle, as Harry passed away in 1973 and Daisy in 1986.

Some 80 years later, the living relatives of Lyle Reab were notified that his remains had been identified and plans had been made to return them to his hometown to be buried next to his parents in Giltner, NE. What a moment of solace and joy this news must have brought to the Reab family. By the amazing work of the Defense POW/MIA Accounting Agency this family was able to receive the closure they so desperately sought.



The hardship that this family experienced yielded profoundly positive effects in the long term. They were saddled with such a difficult reality to endure, yet they carried it with pride. In a world full of anger and hurt, we need to be able to find that same resilience and realize that we must face our own hardships and create a new and better reality after embracing them.

As Craig D. Lounsbrough said, "Without mountains, we might find ourselves relieved that we can avoid the pain of the ascent, but we will forever miss the thrill of the summit. And in such a terribly scandalous trade-off, it is the absence of pain that becomes the thief of life." As we encounter hardship, we're conditioned, we learn how to endure and be patient. We learn adaptability and resilience, we grow stronger, and we learn gratitude for our trials. Most importantly, we learn that, without the storm, we won't ever be able to appreciate the calm.

Even though it may take some time to see it, there's always something tremendously positive in any hardship. As the saying goes, it's not the mountain we conquer, but ourselves.



Medal Of Honor Awarded to Army Specialist In The War On Terrorism





Specialist Ty M. Carter distinguished himself by acts of gallantry and intrepidity at the risk of his life above and beyond the call of duty while serving as a Scout with Bravo Troop, 3d Squadron, 61st Cavalry Regiment, 4th Brigade Combat Team, 4th Infantry Division, during combat operations against an armed enemy in Kamdesh District, Nuristan Province, Afghanistan on October 3, 2009.

On that morning, Specialist Carter and his comrades awakened to an attack of an estimated 300 enemy fighters occupying the high ground on all four sides of Combat Outpost Keating, employing concentrated fire from recoilless rifles, rocket propelled grenades, anti-aircraft machine guns, mortars and small arms fire.

Specialist Carter reinforced a forward battle position, ran twice through a 100 meter gauntlet of enemy fire to resupply ammunition and voluntarily remained there to defend the isolated position. Armed with only an M4 carbine rifle, Specialist Carter placed accurate, deadly fire on the enemy, beating back the assault force and preventing the position from being overrun, over the course of several hours.


With complete disregard for his own safety and in spite of his own wounds, he ran through a hail of enemy rocket propelled grenade and machine gun fire to rescue a critically wounded comrade who had been pinned down in an exposed position.

Specialist Carter rendered life extending first aid and carried the Soldier to cover. On his own initiative, Specialist Carter again maneuvered through enemy fire to check on a fallen Soldier and recovered the squad's radio, which allowed them to coordinate their evacuation with fellow Soldiers. With teammates providing covering fire, Specialist Carter assisted in moving the wounded Soldier 100 meters through withering enemy fire to the aid station and before returning to the fight. Specialist Carter's heroic actions and tactical skill were critical to the defense of Combat Outpost Keating, preventing the enemy from capturing the position and saving the lives of his fellow Soldiers.

Specialist Ty M. Carter's extraordinary heroism and selflessness above and beyond the call of duty are in keeping with the highest traditions of military service and reflect great credit upon himself, Bravo Troop, 3d Squadron, 61st Cavalry Regiment, 4th Brigade Combat Team, 4th Infantry Division and the United States Army.

On Saturday, October 30, 2021, a Civil War Veteran's ashes were buried in Plattsmouth, Nebraska. Private Benton Kinkead's remains have returned home.

Flashback to the five bloodiest years in American history, the war between the States affected almost every household in the country. More than 160 years later, the remains of many who served are still unaccounted for.

Benton Kinkead served the Union, enlisting with Company D, 77th Ohio Volunteers. Kinkead fought in four major battles including Shiloh. He survived the war and moved west, settling in Plattsmouth before moving on to Washington state.

But to Kinkead, Plattsmouth was always home.

Kinkead's ashes were recently discovered in Seattle through the 'Missing in America Project' where he passed away in 1916.

John Surman with the <u>Sons of Union Veterans of the Civil War</u> said it's special for his organization to be able to return Kinkead's remains to Plattsmouth.

"I think any Veteran has a right, and I don't care what war they were in, to have a proper burial," Surman said. "It's the very least that we owe them, and we actually owe them a lot more than that."

Kinkead was buried next to his wife, who passed away in 1910.

Private Kinkead's two oldest surviving direct descendants, his great granddaughter and great grandson, will be mailed a flag from the ceremony.

Commemorating a Century of Honor

The Tomb of the Unknown Soldier, 1921-2021



For 100 years, the Tomb of the Unknown Soldier has served as the heart of Arlington National Cemetery. As a sacred memorial site and the grave of three unknown American service members, the Tomb connects visitors with the legacy of the United States armed forces throughout the nation's history. It stands as a people's memorial that inspires reflection on service, valor, sacrifice and mourning. Since November 11, 1921, the Tomb has provided a final resting place for one of America's unidentified World War I service members, and Unknowns from later wars were added in 1958 and 1984.

Throughout 2021, Arlington National Cemetery is holding a series of commemorative events, exhibits and ceremonies that will culminate on November 11 in conjunction with the National Veterans Day Observance

In November, events will include a ceremony during which visitors may place flowers onto the tomb plaza. "This will be the first time in many years that the public will be allowed to walk across the tomb plaza and honor the unknowns at their gravesite," said Charles Alexander, superintendent of Arlington National Cemetery.

He or she is an ordinary and yet an extraordinary human being. A person who offered some of his life's most vital years in service to his Country, and who sacrificed his ambitions so others would not have to sacrifice theirs.

He or she is a Soldier and a Savior and a Sword against the darkness, and he is nothing more than the finest, greatest testimony on behalf of the finest, greatest Nation ever known.

They come in all shapes, ages, genders, colors, religions, education and political beliefs, but they all share one common bond. They displayed that outstanding unselfish call to duty and answered when their Country called.

So remember, each time you see someone who has served our Country, just stop and say "Thank You." That's all most of them need, and in most cases it will mean more than any medals they could have been awarded or were awarded.

Two little words that mean a lot to that person we know as a Veteran.
