Notes from the Adjutant's Desk.

A BIG THANK YOU to those who have renewed for 2022.

Renewals stand at 830, about 61% of our 2022 goal.

I thought I would review the current demographics of the post membership. These figures are based on the current renewals shown on the National data base. They do not include those who are Nebraska Life members, as Department has yet to pay their national dues, which account for seventy-one members.

Continuous years: Three members have seventy plus years [77, 76, 72], three members will join this group next year (2023), with 69 years. Another thirty-seven have sixty plus continuous years with three members who will join the sixty plus in 2023. 114 have fifty plus years, with three with 59 years. 132 have forty plus years with ten with 49 years. The largest group is thirty plus years with 159, 16 with 39 years.

War eras: World War Two-Our Grand Generation is down to just twenty-two members with three of them with the 77, 76, 72 years of continuous years. Korean War era vets account for 169 members. Our largest group is our Vietnam veterans, with five hundred members.

Seventy-one members fall into war eras since 1975.

If you have sent in your 2022 dues and have not received your 2022 card, please call, and let us know. This is the only way we know that you have not received your 2022 card.

Last item on 2022 renewals, those who have not been credited for paying their 2022, will be receiving a second dues notice during the second week of October.

Where is your DD214 or Discharge Papers? And does your family know where to find it?

Cannot over stress this, NOW is the time to be sure that your family knows your wishes. You can help your loved ones with your request for Military Honors by doing some simple things now. If you desire Military Honors during your memorial service, you need to talk with your family, so they know your wishes. Your DD214 or discharge papers, are the key piece in requesting Military Honors that are provided by DOD personal. You can find answers to many of your questions on the VA's web site.

The VA's site will help with requesting a VA grave head stone, how to request burial in a National Cemetery, etc. Feel free to call the office for assistance with this effort.

LINCOLN CBOC/VA NEWS



The VA is requiring the use of the blue paper masks. Cloth masks are not acceptable.

The VA Web Site said they are now giving shots to partners of veterans. If you get care from the VA Health Care System, then you are enrolled. For those who do not currently use NWI (Nebraska Western Iowa) Health Care System, Omaha VA Hospital or the local CBOC's, you can call 404-828-5257 to check if you are enrolled and enroll if you are not currently enrolled to receive VA Health services. They request that you use the VA Facebook or the VA web site to request an appointment. The VA will call you back to make the appointment with you. They are now taking walk ins, but it is best to call first for an appointment. Shots are only being given to the veteran and those who are enrolled as a Veteran Care Giver with the VA.

FLU shots will begin soon. If you have a doctor appointment, you should be able to request during your visit. Walk Ins will begin later in the month once they receive their supply of the vaccines.

Remember your VA ID card. You are required to check in for your appointment on the Kiosk, you will need your VA ID card or your FULL SSA number. When checking in, the Kiosk will print off your appointments. Be sure to follow the prompts. Continue, to advance to the next screen, until you reach Exit. On the first print out is a number, disregard it, the second print out tells you your appointments and which waiting area to wait in. Staff will come out to the waiting areas and escort you to your appointments.

For those needing blood work, there is Kiosk just for lab check in. It is just to the right of the entrance to the lab. The lab is located to the right of main entrance in area B. Check in and take your number and have a seat, you will be called by Number

For those visiting the pharmacy, there two Kiosks for pharmacy, one to speak to the pharmacy clerk and one to pick up your prescriptions.

If by chance you do not have a current VA ID card you can request one while you are in the clinic. You will need to have some form of ID that will allow them to double check your identity. You can use a state issued driver's license and/or state issued ID card.

The process is done by video computer link. Ask any VA clerk and they will show you where the room is for this.

Try and be in the reception area about 15 minutes prior to your appointment time. The nurse/staff will come to the reception areas and call you by your name.

For those who are required to make a Copay. If you made a payment to the VA during the last 9 months of 2020, you should receive a refund. The VA send out notices of the refund and any amount due you. If you have not received a notice and made payments, I would call the VA to check the status of your account.

EYEGASSES: Those who require eyeglasses may want to check with the VA. When I had my new glasses adjusted the tech told me that there was a change in VA policy. That made almost all veterans eligible to receive glasses from the VA. It would be worth a look to see if you are eligible to get eyeglasses from the VA.

Do you need help traveling to your appointments? You can request rides to the Lincoln clinic or the Omaha VA hospital through the VA. For appointments at the Lincoln clinic, call the DAV travel number. They will pick up veterans in Lincoln.

Call VTS, Veterans Transportation Service, 402-995-4200, for travel to appointments at the VA hospital in Omaha. The earlier you call, the better chance of getting a ride. Travel to Omaha fills up quickly, best to request appointments on Tuesdays or Thursdays, as slots for travel on Monday, Wednesday and Friday are very limited. Morning appointments are best if you will be needing a return trip. VTS will pick you up at your home and return you to your home. You must call at least 7 to 10 days ahead of the day of your appointment.

Remember, the VA will only to be there for us if we use its services. If we do not use them, the government sees it as a service not needed here and will cut funding for the Lincoln CBOC. The government funds each CBOC / hospital based on the number of veterans signed up for services in its service area. The veterans do not need to be using the VA for their medical needs, they just need to be enrolled in the VA Health Care System.

There are many veterans who could receive medical service but have never signed up for this benefit of our service. Again, it is the old story, use them or lose them.

Your Lincoln Chapter 3, American Legion Riders, continued to represent the Legion Family during several activities in September. Sadly, most of that representation was at funeral services for Veterans who joined Post Everlasting.

We had a number of Riders participate in the homecoming of the remains of Marine Corporal Daegan Page in Omaha.

We joined about 650 other motorcyclists who rode in silent tribute to Corporal Page and his 12 comrades killed in the suicide bombing at the Kabul, Afghanistan, airport in late-August, as his remains were transported from Eppley Airport to the funeral home in Omaha. Many of those same Riders returned to Omaha a week later to attend the funeral and escort Corporal Page on his final journey to the Omaha National Cemetery.

It was incredibly moving to see the outpouring of love and support by the greater Nebraska, Iowa, Kansas, and South Dakota communities during both missions. Thousands of citizens lined the streets and bridges along both routes, standing in silent tribute to Corporal Page. It was truly a humbling experience to have participated in and observed those two missions.

Individual Riders also participated in a number of Patriot Guard missions honoring deceased Veterans during the month.

Riding season is winding down. Temperatures are cooling. But our Riders will continue to ride whenever we are called to support our Community, State and Nation.

POW/MIA Flag

I just wanted you to know in conjunction with POW/MIA Recognition Day September 17th, Governor Ricketts has signed an executive order declaring that the POW/MIA flag will be a permanent fixture at state properties. The POW/MIA flag will be displayed at all state-owned properties that display the flag of the United States of America.

I know that this is an important issue for Nebraska's veterans and wanted you to know that Governor Ricketts recognizes the sacrifice of our veterans, our service members and military families.

National Commander Dillard is hoping that the opportunity to retain "continuous" membership status for Legionnaires who last paid for the 2020 year without having to pay for 2021 will be an incentive to pay their 2022 dues. **Regular Meeting of American Legion Post 3
Lincoln Elks Lodge #80 and also on ZOOM
September 14, 2021**

Commander Gerry Wolf opened the September 14, 2021 meeting of American Legion Post 3 at 7:00 PM at the Lincoln Elks Lodge 80 with about 20 Legionnaires present. The meeting was also being made available on Zoom.

Steve Bartos read the minutes of the July 13, 2021 meeting; and they were approved without correction.

Ed Schnabel gave the financial report for the month ending August 31, 2021 showing a balance on hand of \$44,610.42. The report was filed for review.

Father Emil Kapaun begins journey home

HONOLULU, HAWAII –

Emil Kapaun was a priest from Pilsen, Kansas who became a war hero for his actions during the Korean War. He was awarded the Medal of Honor in 2013. None of his family or his closest Korean War compatriots thought Tuesday's events were possible, not in 70 years. But the day has come. And Father Emil Kapaun can come home to Kansas now. Farm boy. Catholic priest. U.S. Army chaplain. Defiant prisoner of war who stole food and medicine right under the noses of camp guards. Medal of Honor recipient, possible Roman Catholic saint — and now, finally, a long-lost son of Kansas returning to a family that can lay him to rest.

On Tuesday, 70 years after he died in a North Korean prisoner of war camp, U.S. Defense Department searchers for missing soldiers gave the hero's remains to his family in a ceremony at Pearl Harbor. Father Kapaun's funeral was held Wednesday, Sept. 29, 2021 in Wichita, Kansas.

An honor guard made up of men and women from all branches of the military escorted Kapaun's flag-draped remains outside past more than 50 saluting soldiers on one side and white coated lab anthropologists and lab technicians on the other. Ray and Lee Kapaun walked a few steps behind, with Johnie Webb beside them; Johnie is a deputy director of the Hawaii based search teams and a legend among former POWs and fellow MIA searchers. For Ray, this day was the latest tribute in a wild six months since his phone rang at his home on Whidbey Island in Washington State in March; a U.S. Army soldier told him the Defense Department had found his uncle, who starved to death in 1951 after saving many fellow starving prisoners of war in North Korea. In the weeks after his uncle's identification Ray traveled; he talked many times to the few surviving POWs who revered their chaplain friend.

Ray made many calls after March. He talked with the POW William Funchess, who in 1951 hugged Father Kapaun night after night trying to warm the dying man's body. Funches died only weeks after Ray called him.

Ray talked many times with the former POW Mike Dowe, who wrote Father Kapaun's first Medal of Honor recommendation in 1954. He visited — and hugged— the POW Robert McGreevy in Maryland, who struggles now to stand. At the battle of Unsan, where they were both captured in 1950, McGreevy had been a 19-year-old soldier who saw Kapaun repeatedly ignore officers' orders to evacuate; Dowe has said the POWs who revere Kapaun all thought his body would never be found, they thought the Chinese guards in North Korea had rolled his body into one of the many mass graves that were dug in Camp Five, where they were imprisoned. More than 1,400 of the 3,000 American and Allied prisoners in Camp Five starved or froze to death in the first winter of the war.

But the Chinese in 1954 had sent 4,200 sets of remains south after the war. The odds were long that one set might be those of Father Kapaun.

Not only was 4,200 only a fraction of those killed in North Korea, but the Army had found it impossible in the mid-1950s to identify more than 850 of those Korean War remains.

They buried them as “unknowns” in the Punchbowl, an ancient volcanic crater now called the National Memorial Cemetery of the Pacific, on the Hawaiian island of Oahu. In August 2019, as part of a concerted effort to finally identify the Korean War unknowns, soldiers dug up hundreds of sets of remains and sent them to the Pearl Harbor laboratories for analysis.

In March, to the surprise of his friends and family, scientists using DNA and other investigative methods identified Kapaun's remains.

For Dowe it was a gathering of brothers. In May 1951, while Kapaun lay sick and starved, Dowe and other POWS got into a shoving match with camp guards when the guards came to take Kapaun away to what they called a hospital and what the POWS called “The Death House.” “They got aggressive with their bayonets,” Dowe said. The enfeebled and sick Americans relented only when Kapaun himself told them to stop fighting.

Those men can rest easy now. He's coming home.

The Man Who Saved The World 59 years ago - (1962)

The man who saved the world... 59 years ago, at the height of the Cuban Missile Crisis, second-in-command Vasilli Arkhipov of the Soviet submarine B-59 refused to agree with his Captain's order to launch nuclear torpedos against US warships and setting off what might well have been a terminal superpower nuclear war.

The US had been dropping depth charges near the submarine in an attempt to force it to surface, unaware it was carrying nuclear arms. The Soviet officers, who had lost radio contact with Moscow, concluded that World War 3 had begun, and two of the officers agreed to 'blast the warships out of the water'. Arkhipov refused to agree - unanimous consent of three officers was required - and thanks to him, we are here to talk about it.

His story is finally being told - the BBC is airing a documentary on it. Raise a glass to Vasilli Arkhipov - the Man Who Saved the World.
