LETTER FROM THE COMMANDER

I am Gerry Wolf, a 40-year member of Post 3. Recently, I was elected to serve as your Post 3 Commander.

I was raised in a small farm town in Iowa and later moved to Bellevue, Nebraska. In 1964, I graduated from Bellevue High School and attended Creighton University where I also enrolled in the 4-year ROTC program.

In 1968, I received a BS in mathematics and, at the same

time, was commissioned as a 2nd Lieutenant in the US Army
Corps of Engineers. After several military schools in the States, I was assigned
to the 24th Combat Engineer Battalion, 4th Armored Division (later replaced by
the 16th Combat Engineer Battalion, 1st Armored Division) in Fuerth, Germany.
I served my last 20 months commanding the Battalion's Mobile Assault Bridge

Company with responsibility along the German/Czech border.

In 1972, I was discharged and began working for Ralston Purina Company in Omaha. In 1978, I transferred to Lincoln as plant manager where I remained until I retired in 2009.

I became active with the American Legion upon my retirement. Since joining the American Legion, I have held the positions of District 15 Commander, District 15 Vice Commander, and Post 3 Vice Commander. I also serve on the Post 3 Honor Guard.

My wife, Nancy, and I have a son and a daughter, 3 grandchildren, and 2 great-grandchildren.

I would like to spend a minute discussing membership. Legionnaires are slowly fading away. Our membership numbers decline each year by about 8%. We need to stop this decline. Last year, we ended the year with 1325 members, down from our goal of 1427. Post 3 has a goal of 1344 paid members on our roster at the end of this year.

Granted, we can't stop the decline of members going to Post Everlasting. However, we can sign up more of the Iraqi and Afghan veterans and veterans who are eligible to join because of the Legion Act --- as well as retaining our current members. Membership is what drives the American Legion. Membership is everyone's responsibility.

Do you want to help your community and fellow veterans by recruiting a member to join the American Legion? If you can certify that a veteran served at least one day of active military duty since December 7, 1941, and was honorably discharged (or currently continues to serve honorably), that veteran or active duty member is eligible to join the American Legion. Let's sign them up.

It is an honor to be your Post Commander. I am fortunate to have Bruce Gubser as 1st Vice Commander, Ron Hindmand as 2nd Vice Commander, and Ed Schnabel as Post Adjutant. All are knowledgeable leaders. We ask for your support in helping us help our military personnel, our veterans, their families, our youth, and our Nation.

PRISONERS OF WAR AND MISSING IN ACTION

Warrior Loyalty

On March 1, 1942, Richard Antrim found himself as the Executive Officer aboard the destroyer Pope, attempting to escort the damaged British heavy cruiser Exeter out of the treacherous waters of the Java Sea. Antrim and his crew quickly found themselves outnumbered and outgunned by the enemy. Blow after blow, the destroyer Pope finally

succumbed to the damage and sank.

Antrim, even though he was wounded, was able to round up enough life vessels to ensure the crews safety. After floating at sea for three days, a Japanese destroyer picked them up and quickly delivered them to the prisoner of war facility at Makassar, Celebes.

One dreary day in April of 1942, a fellow POW officer failed to pay the proper respect to one of the prison guards and was ferociously beaten by the guard into a semiconscious state. When Antrim saw that the guard showed no signs of stopping, he stepped in, demanded that the guard stop, and attempted to discuss the officer's situation. Not convinced by Antrim's argument, the camp commandant sentenced the defenseless officer to 50 lashes.

The battered officer took as many lashes as he could physically stand, and upon falling to the ground unconscious, the surrounding guards began to kick him. Antrim had seen enough. He immediately stepped forward and calmly offered that he would take the rest of the lashes. The Japanese guards were speechless. The camp commandant bowed slightly to Antrim and ordered the badly beaten officer be taken away. Antrim did not receive the remaining lashes, but because of his warrior loyalty to his men, the Japanese found a new respect for him that day.

This spirit of warrior loyalty is what carries so many of us through our time in the service. We get to know our brothers and sisters beside us and form a bond, oftentimes so strong that we would lay down our lives for each other. That same mentality can be carried into our lives today, whether we're still actively serving in the military or not.

There are societal issues that can act as the enemy and can be just as destructive as the physical abuse that those Japanese guards delivered to that unfortunate officer, but more on an emotional and mental front. These stressful issues can be extremely diverse, and are different for each of us. But, it is up to us to recognize these stressors in our fellow service members and help them through it. Just as Antrim boldly stood in his fellow soldier's place to protect him, it is our duty to be loyal warriors in defense of each other.

Recognize when somebody needs your help and boldly step in to offer help. We are forever indebted to the amazing sacrifices that our POW/MIA brethren endured, and it's our duty to carry on the values that they managed to stand for in their toughest times.

HAVE YOU RENEWED YET?

Have you ever paid your American Legion dues and then received another dues notice? And wondered why?

After the initial dues notice for the year (about July 1st), the National Headquarters sends out 5 additional notices. And --- for each --- paid members are dropped from the mailing if those members had paid soon enough (the Cutoff Date) for their dues to be processed by Post 3 and Department Headquarters and then forwarded to Indianapolis for additional processing and creation of the next dues notice.

Depending on the size of the renewal mailing to be created, up to a month of "lead time" is necessary for all of the steps to be accomplished. Shown below are the renewal notice dates scheduled for the remainder of the 2022 membership year --- and the "Cutoff Date" to drop unnecessary renewal notices from the mailing in question.

Renewal Notice Mailing Date: Cutoff Date for Renewal Notice:

October 8, 2021 September 9, 2021
November 12, 2021 October 14, 2021
January 7, 2022 December 8, 2021
February 25, 2022 February 9, 2022
April 30, 2022 April 13, 2022

The Cutoff Dates shown are when the National Headquarters needs to receive the transmittal from Department Headquarters. In reality, our real Cutoff Date is about 2 days prior to the date shown so there is time for the post and department to react.

You also have the ability to pay your dues online. It may not prevent you from getting a renewal notice if the online payment is made on the actual Cutoff Date, but it can certainly speed up the process otherwise.

We certainly encourage you to pay your dues promptly. It helps us to gauge how well our membership effort is going --- and it definitely saves the national organization some printing and postage expense of generating additional and unnecessary dues notices.





CONSTITUTION AND BYLAWS

The American Legion is now more than 100 years old; and, over the years, a number of changes have taken place in the American Legion --- both nationally and at the local level.

While some changes were made in the Post 3 constitution and bylaws over all those years, they did not address some changes that came with the times. And, documentation of the changes that were made were sometimes fell through the cracks.

Accordingly, the post leadership has been working this year to go through our Post 3 Constitution and Bylaws in their entirety in an effort to update and modernize them to be compatible with the way we really do business now. And, in some instances, wording will be added to address and permit the use of technology in conducting Post 3 meetings and doing other business.

Having been announced at the August 2021 meeting of Post 3 and published for review on the Post 3 website and in the email newsletter, the revised and amended Constitution and Bylaws are scheduled for discussion and adoption at the September 14, 2021 meeting.

Once adopted, the post plans to proceed with another administrative project. Following recommendations of the national and state American Legion, Post 3 plans to file Articles of Incorporation. This administrative change is considered a wise action to take to protect the members of the post.

Notes from the Adjutant's Office

A BIG THANK YOU to those who have renewed for 2022.

As I've written before, dues remain the same at \$46.00 dollars --- with \$35.00 dollars of the dues being passed on to Department to cover State and National dues. The remaining \$11.00 dollars are used at the Post level to cover administrative costs and fund many American Legion activities that Post 3 supports.

Renewals stand at 774, about 55% of our 2022 goal. You should receive your 2022 membership card about 10 days after submitting your dues to the Post 3 office. We tried to process dues daily during August just to keep up.

For those who wish to use a credit card, you can renew your 2022 memberships online at MyLegion.org. You will need name and membership ID number. You can print your 2022 card once you have paid your dues. We print off a list of those who do pay online and mail out a 2022 membership card to those who have paid dues online.

If by chance you have not received your 2022 membership card, let us know. Call or email the office. Occasionally, we receive only parts of envelopes where we do not receive the renewal slip or check --- and do not know whose it was. Sometimes we get the membership card mailing back due to a poor address. If you have moved, please be sure to let us know so we can update the Legion data base. It's nice when we have a phone number or email address so we can call and verify a mailing address.

Thanks again for renewing with POST 3 and the American Legion.

Where is your DD214? And does your family know where to find it? I cannot over stress this. NOW is the time to be sure that your family knows your wishes. You can help your loved ones with your request for Military Honors by doing some simple things now. If you desire Military Honors during your memorial service, you need to talk with your family so they know your wishes.

Your DD214, or discharge papers, are the key piece in requesting Military Honors that are provided by DOD personnel. You can find answers to many of your questions on the VA's web site. The VA's site will help with requesting a VA grave headstone, how to request burial in a National Cemetery, etc. Feel free to call the office for assistance with this effort.
