LETTER FROM THE COMMANDER

Fellow Legionnaires ---

The past year, in which you entrusted me with helping to manage your post, has gone by quickly. I want to thank everyone for trusting me to lead this great American Legion post again this year. It is an honor to be the Commander of Nebraska's largest American Legion Post.



I am fortunate to be joined by a slate of great officers. Bruce Gubser is the 1st Vice Commander, Ron Hindmand is your 2nd Vice Commander, and Ed Schnabel is our Post 3 Adjutant.

July and August were busy months for Post 3. We worked on processing current memberships, completing transfers, and processing new memberships. I want to thank Jack Sibert, Wade Graft, and especially Ed Schnabel for their hard work in accomplishing this important task.

Loyalty

While the 2022 membership year doesn't officially end until December 31, we have essentially ended the 2022 year with 1217 members against a goal of 1344 (established by the Department of Nebraska as part of its national goal). Commander Gerry Wolf addressed those in attendance at the July meeting after being installed to serve a second term as Post 3 Commander.




National Executive Committeeman Fred Craigie served as installing officer for the Post 3 installation of officers at the July meeting.

Loyalty Fosters Hope

On October 3rd, 1993, CW4 Michael Durant was the pilot of "Super-Six-Four." a 160th Special Operations Aviation Regiment (SOAR) Black Hawk helicopter, participating in the horrific Battle of Mogadishu during Operation Gothic Serpent. Durant's helicopter was struck on the tail by a rocket propelled grenade fired from a Somali fighter atop a nearby

building, rendering his tail rotor ineffective and resulting in a violent crash. After a brief exchange of small arms fire with the hundreds of Somalis

surrounding their aircraft on the ground, the crew of "Super-Six-Four" ran out of ammunition and succumbed to the angry mob. Durant was the only survivor among the crew of four onboard that day. However, he was immediately taken captive by a warlord on the ground who had recognized Durant's value as a prisoner. Durant was immediately brought to a well-hidden room and held captive for 11 days.

While Durant was falling in and out of consciousness while in custody of the Somalis, his fellow soldiers from the 160th were not giving up hope and

continued to risk their lives to search for him from the air. Several times, Durant heard their calls from the loudspeaker they had on their aircraft: "Mike Durant, we will not leave you behind!" On one occasion, Durant's brothers-in-arms even played one of his favorite songs, AC/DC's "Hell's Bells," over the loudspeaker to encourage Durant to hold out hope that they would find him and bring him home.

Durant was eventually turned over to the Red Cross after the Somalis realized that they weren't equipped to deal with hostage negotiations. Durant returned home with a hero's welcome, recuperated, and began flying again until his retirement in 2001.

Durant later recalled just how much hearing the voices of his fellow soldiers proclaiming that they were not giving up on him --- and were proactively looking for him --- tremendously bolstered his hope. That display of loyalty from his fellow soldiers fostered an incredible hope within Durant, which gave him the strength to continue to fight to live.

You and I can provide that strength to our fellow service members, family, and friends by simply letting them know that we are looking out for them. An occasional phone call, text, or email to simply check in with them may be the bolster of hope that they need in their lives. Never stop being loyal to those you're blessed to have in your life. The hope that will surely come from your loyalty will benefit everyone involved.

"VETERANS HONOR"

Not everyone knows, but Past Post 3 Commander and current Sons of the American Legion Squadron 3 Commander Brendan Moore knows a lot about roses. He grows and shows roses --- and is routinely recognized for showing "winning" blooms at the county and state fair and other rose shows --- and he's accredited by the American Rose Society as a rose show judge.

As a member of the Lincoln Rose Society, he worked with Unit 3 member Lynne Wild regarding some planned renovation and maintenance of the Hamann Rose Garden located near the Children's Zoo on the east side of 27th Street at about "C" Street.

As a result, Lincoln American Legion Auxiliary Unit 3 agreed to sponsor one of the beds of 12 roses. The bed is located at the southeast entrance to the Hamann Garden --- and is the first bed on the right as you enter. An appropriate marker identifying Unit 3 as the sponsor was recently placed there.

The variety of the rose growing in the bed sponsored by Unit 3 is aptly called "Veterans Honor." The variety was developed and introduced by the Jackson & Perkins Co. Brendan describes the rose as is a beautiful non-fading red rose that is one of the top exhibition roses of the American Rose Society.

Brendan encourages everyone to stop by the Hamann Gardens to "stop and smell the roses" --- especially the Veterans Honor roses sponsored by Unit 3. He also indicated that the colors are most vibrant in the fall when the weather is more tolerable to visit.

POLL WORKERS

Here in Lancaster County --- and in other counties, too, from what I gather --- election poll workers are in short supply. I would urge anyone who is able and interested to consider becoming an election poll worker.



Each county has an election commissioner, and I am sure they would like to have an ample supply of potential workers.

The day is long, typically from 7:00 AM to 8:30 - 9:00 PM (with a break for lunch. In Lancaster County, poll workers are paid \$9.00/hr. Perhaps that's not a lot of money, but the job is vital to our government.

The work is not hard at all. Two clerks and two judges along with an inspector (or supervisor) comprise the crew at each location. For the sake of integrity, the clerks and judges need to be of different political affiliation. Discussing political issues is taboo.

Training and/or retraining is required just prior to each election so that workers are better able to handle issues that may present themselves. If you are still working, I suggest that you contact your employer for time off to be a poll worker. I'm sure that there are many employers who would allow or encourage it.



BE THE ONE

The American Legion recently launched its "Be The One" campaign to encourage American Legion Family members, veterans, service members, and others to take action when they believe a veteran is at risk of suicide. Today, the No. 1 issue facing those who served is veteran suicide, according to the National Veteran Suicide Prevention Annual Report. Each day, no fewer than 17 veterans die by suicide. That's more than 6,000 each year. The rate of suicide for veterans is more than 50% higher than that of non-veteran adults.





TO LISTEN WHEN A VETERAN NEEDS TO TALK.

TO REACH OUT WHEN A VETERAN IS STRUGGLING.

In activation an ongoing national platform to end veteran suicide, the American Legion is hopeful that the "Be the One" campaign will:

1 - Destigmatize asking for mental health support, creating opportunity for those with mental health issues to speak freely and get the support they need

2 - Provide peer-to-peer support and resources in local communities; and

3 - Deploy FDA-approved therapeutics for veterans to identify issues and find resources for support.

The stigma associated with mental health issues is a barrier to veterans seeking assistance. They fear loss of their job, think they can handle their situation themselves, or don't think others can understand their situation. Family members may be the first to recognize the signs that their loved one needs help, but they may lack the knowledge of how to approach the situation. If you have a family member who is a veteran, The American Legion encourages you to "Be the One" to:

- Ask veterans in your life how they are doing.
- Listen when a veteran needs to talk.
- Reach out when a veteran is struggling.
- Pledge to Be the One at betheone.org by signing up for email updates.

While this program is designed to help all veterans, we know that everyone responds differently to stresses, have different life experiences and have varying results in types of treatment. However, the following are guidelines intended to provide help before a crisis situation develops. The American Legion encourages you to "Be the One" to:

- 1 Talk with others about how you are feeling;
- 2 Ask for help when you know you need it;
- 3 Know there are millions of people ready to help you; and
- 4 Remember your family and friend's care.

If you are a veteran in crisis, VA has resources available 24 hours a day, seven days a week:

- Text 838255
- Visit the VA Crisis Line website.

On a local level, in June, Governor Pete Ricketts announced Nebraska's participation in the Governor's Challenge to Prevent Suicide among Service Members, Veterans, and Their Families. Nebraska is one of 35 states taking part in the initiative from the U.S. Department of Veterans Affairs (VA) and Substance Abuse and Mental Health Services Administration (SAMHSA). The Nebraska Department of Veterans' Affairs (NDVA) and the Nebraska Department of Health and Human Services (DHHS) will be the lead agencies on the program. The two-year initiative will identify gaps in care and drive

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enhancements to the state's mental health services.

In discussing the initiative, the Governor highlighted the sacrifices made by service members to protect and defend America. In particular, he cited the time spent away from family while on deployment, frequent relocations, and the physical and psychological impact of combat. Gov. Ricketts credited the Nebraska Department of Veterans' Affairs for its great work to care for veterans and their families across the state, and he noted that improving access to mental health care will further the State's goal of becoming the best state in America for military families and veterans.

DHHS Behavioral Health Director Sheri Dawson expressed her excitement at the opportunity to coordinate veterans' and mental health resources through the initiative. She discussed the State's intent to overcome the stigma of discussing mental health and to remove obstacles for those seeking mental healthcare.

NDVA Director John Hilgert highlighted three main ways his department supports veterans in crisis: 1) emergency financial support through the Veterans Aid Fund; 2) NDVA's state service office which does over 100 outreach events each year to help veterans get the support they're eligible to receive; and 3) the NDVA website at veterans.nebraska.gov, which includes a live chat option and a map to mental health resources across the state.

The Suicide Prevention Lifeline phone number is 1-800-273-8255. By pressing "1" when the call connects, callers will be transferred to the Veterans Crisis Line, which offers support specifically for veterans and their loved ones. There's no need to be enrolled in VA benefits or healthcare to make use of the service.

In July, Nebraska rolled out the new 988 suicide prevention lifeline. It's patterned after 911 and gives callers a simple, easy-to-remember number to dial for assistance during a mental health crisis.



Moving to 988 does not mean the previous Suicide Hotline 1-800-273-TALK (8255) will go away. After July 16, 2022, both numbers will get callers to the same services.

NOTES FROM THE ADJUTANT'S OFFICE

We look forward seeing you at the Post 3 meeting in September.

A BIG THANK YOU to those who have renewed for 2023. Including the Nebraska Life members who might not have been posted yet, our currentl number stands at almost 700 renewals.

Thanks again for renewing with Post 3 and The American Legion. It is the eleven dollar portion of your Post 3 dues that allows us to serve our fellow veterans at the local level. The remaining thirty-five dollars goes to cover Department and National dues, which support Legion activities on the state and national level.

The American Legion National Headquarters will be mailing out the second renewal notices for 2023 during the second or third week of October. If you have renewed, just throw it away. Remember, there is a delay between the time you mail your dues and the time that National shows that you have renewed for 2023. This delay could be up to two or three weeks, depending on when we receive your payment, when we get the membership slips to Department, and when they process them and get them forwarded to National. Once at National, it will take them up to a week to process and credit you with your payment. Only then will the system stop sending out renewal notices to you.

If you wish to pay by credit card, you can do so by using the America Legion's online renewal. Log into www.legion.org, click on "Renew," and then input your name and data. You can also set up an "auto renewal" payment for future years.

If you have mailed your payment and have not received your 2023 card within two weeks, please let me know. Mail can and does get misdirected, damaged, or just lost. I will be glad to get a replacement mailed out to you.

Does your 2023 membership show your correct years of service?

We know that the National Headquarters made a major error when they listed 2022 as your first year. This was only to show that you had paid dues for 2022, not the year that you first joined the Legion. Same for the sample card on the reverse side of the notice. They all showed one year --- not necessarily your true years of service. The 2023 card that we will be mailing out should be correct. If the years are not correct, please let us know and we can get it corrected for you.

The new membership software that the American Legion rolled out in April of 2021 still has lots of issues. We have fielded many calls about total years not being correct. This would take a lot of work to double check what is printed on the 2023 cards, so if yours is not correct, please email or text me, and I can correct the years for you. So, double check your card from 2022 to see if the 2023 card has added one year for you. If not, let me know and I will mail out a new card with the correct years and have National update your membership record. { edschnabelasa@gmail.com; 402-480-8542 }

It also helps us if you can keep us informed if you happen to move, are a snowbird, etc. We also appreciate being notified by a relative when one of our members passes. This saves Post 3, Department, and the National office money by not having to send out a second or third renewal, or mailing a renewal to a member who has passed away, etc. It is these extra little costs that drive up your dues --- as it cost us to pay for returned mail.

Post 3 receives lots of Honor Guard requests, some at the last minute. If you wish for an Honor Detail for an event or for a Military Service, please call well ahead so that we can be sure to be there when asked.

If you have not talked with your family about your wishes for your funeral, do not put it off. Do it now. Two items to let them know is do you wish Military Honors and where you would like to be interred. If you wish an Honor Guard from your branch of service, you will need to produce a copy of your DD214 or discharge papers. Burial in a VA cemetery also requires a DD214 or discharge papers to show that you earned this honor. Your funeral home should do the contacting for you when the time comes. If you need help, please call and I will be glad to assist you.

LINCOLN CBOC / VA NEWS - AUGUST 2022

All Gave Some, Some Gave All

More changes to the VA Health care system.

The Lincoln Community Based Outpatient Clinic (CBOC) is now doing walkin EXPRESS CARE between 3:00 PM and 7:00 PM. No appointment needed. If you need a nurse to look at something you think needs to be treated, make use of this new service.

Starting July 13th, the Lincoln clinic did away with the kiosks and went to a system where you use your smart phone to sign in for appointments. For those without a smart phone, someone will have to have the staff sign you in.

This new system is called "VA Mobile Check-in for Appointments." This is to allow you to sign in for appointments without the need to touch anything while doing so. Clinics that will be using this new system will have a QR code for you to scan posted in the check-in area as you enter the clinics. To use this new system, you need a smart phone that is registered with the VA. Once you scan the QR code the system will text your phone to check you in for your appointments.

Once you use the system once or twice, it really will be faster --- as you won't need to stand and wait to check in. Once you have used the system, you can refresh an old VA check-in message and use it again to check into your next appointment.

However, one drawback to the new sign-in system is that the Lincoln Clinic has limited bandwidth --- thus downloading is very slow at times. Be patient. Once loaded, the VA will send a link for signing in. Once you get the link, you will be asked to verify your personal information and that of your next of kin, etc. If all is correct, answer "Yes" (three times) and the system will check you in.

Another drawback to the system in Lincoln is that it does not tell where to wait to see your provider. If you are seeing a new provider, you might have to ask a staff member where their waiting area is located. Primary care providers are on the first floor, and most of the other services are on the second floor.

If you do not use a smart phone, or do not wish to use this new system, you will have to check in with the staff.

The LAB still has their kiosk for the time bring. Use it for signing in for blood draws. Look for changes during September, as this kiosk may also go away.

Unwanted Drugs disposal: if you have old meds you would like to get rid of, you can now drop them off in the Pharmacy waiting area. There is a locked BLUE drop box where you can deposit your old, out of date meds. Get them out of your homes and keep them out of our kids' hands.

VA System ID Cards: If, by chance, you do not have a current VA ID card you can request one while you are in the clinic. You will need to have some form of ID that will allow them to double check your identity. You can use a state issued driver's license and/or state issued ID card. The process is done by video computer link. Ask any VA clerk, and they will show you where the room is for this video computer link. You can also get help to enroll in the VA system, etc. by using this link: www.myhealth.va.gov.

My Healthy Vet: Did you know you can request refills of your meds, check your upcoming appointments, or send a note to your provider online? The VA has a web site called, My Healthy Vet that allows you to do this. If you are not

currently using it, or if you need help in using it, or are signing up for My Healthy Vet, stop by their education center on your next visit.

In Lincoln, the education center is just to the right of the front entrance. The Lincoln education center is staffed on Tuesday – Friday, 0800-1400 hours. To get the full use of the web site, you need to have a Premium My HealtheVet Account. To upgrade your account, you need to be authenticated. This only take a minute. Just stop, and visit with the staff.

Remember, the VA will only to be there for us if we use its services. If we do not use them, the government sees it as a service not needed here and will cut funding for the Lincoln CBOC. The government funds each CBOC / hospital based on the number of veterans signed up for services in its service area. They, the veterans, do not need to be using the VA for their medical needs, just need to be enrolled in the VA Health Care System.


Funding is based on foreseen needs, not current need, thus we need to talk with our fellow veterans to be sure they are enrolled in the VA system. There are many veterans who could receive medical service but have never signed up for this benefit of our service. Again, it is the old story --- use them or lose them.

You may not know that the Lincoln CBOC receives \$4,000.00 dollars for each veteran registered as living in our service area. This area takes in most of southeast Nebraska and a few of the counties in northern Kansas.

Even if you do not wish to us the VA services, we need you to be registered. These funds are based on those registered --- not just those receiving services. Thanks for your service.


Lynne Wild was an Auxiliary delegate from Unit 3. Fred Craigie and Steve Bartos were American Legion delegates from Post 3.
