Before this date, its predecessors, like the US Army Air Corps (1926-1941) and the US Army Air Force (1941-1947) existed, but 1947 marks its formal creation as a separate service on par with the Army and the Navy. On 19 September we mark recognition of POW/MIA Day. We begin every Post 3 meeting remembering that there are veterans to this day that remain unidentified or missing from many of our wars and military actions.

Notes from the Adjutant's Desk



2026 Renewals: As we start the 2026 Legion Year, we currently stand at 585 members. Department Life Members currently are down to 45 members, with six members who have joined the Post Everlasting this past year. Over the past three years we have lost 11 Department Life members to Post Everlasting. Online Renewals are 69, one for three years.

During this past month we have lost three members who have died, 4 who have transferred out to other posts, 1 who has transferred in, and 1 who has joined as a new member.

Those who took advantage and renewed for three years should not have received a renewal notice. Those who are regular PUFL members, your 2026 membership card will be mailed out sometime in July from the National Headquarters. If you have not received your 2026 card by the end of July, please let us know.

For those who did not renew for 2025, as of January first, you were classified as expired. You will stop receiving The Legion magazine, and you could be denied entry into a Legion Club. Those who are in the Legion Insurance program, your coverage also ended as of 31st of December 2024. You must be a member in good standing to be covered.

Applying for Legion Insurance is easy to do. Just go to their website and enroll. Legion Insurance covers you while you are traveling to a Legion Activity.

<u>Military Service</u>: We still are trying to update our membership roster as to branch or service and the war era that you served. National has been printing on the back of renewal slips the data that is in the Legion database. Please check and add as needed so we can correct our database. Thanks, it makes it so much easier to reach out to you if needed.

VSO Web Sites: Nebraska's Department of Veterans Affairs, VFW, DAV, AMVETS web sites are a great place to find current and helpful information on what Congress is currently working on and how it could affect you as a veteran. The VA website has many tips on filing claims and links to other VA services to which you are entitled.

Veteran Service Organizations: They do an excellent job of keeping track of Congressional activities that can or will affect veterans. (veteransaffairs@messages.va.gov).

The Nebraska Department of Veterans Affairs and your local County Service Office are here to serve you. They can pull up your records of military service and help track your claims you may have filed. If you have not visited with your service officer, now would be a great time to stop and visit with him/her. The 2025 Nebraska Legislature may have passed legislation that may have affected you and your benefits.

<u>Membership:</u> We need to talk with our younger troops that have had service since the Gulf War. They will become the backbone of our VSOs in a few years. Without these younger veterans we will no longer have a strong voice in Congress. Without a strong voice in Congress, we will keep losing funding for the Department of Veterans Affairs and the VA Health Care System.

If you are a member of this group of veterans or know a veteran from these conflicts, please ask them if they are a member of a VSO (veteran service org) and if not, ask them to please join. They may not be using VA service now, and may wish to in the future. They may find that VA services have been cut back due to a lack of a strong voice in Congress.

Thank you for your Service and for being a member of Post 3 and the American Legion.

Lincoln CBOC/VA News



Remember that the Clinics will be closed on Labor Day, Monday September first.

One of the most asked questions I am asked, "Where is the Finance Office?" Sorry to say, the Lincoln CBOC does not have a finance office on site. If you have a billing question, you will have to call the number that is listed on the Copay notice you might have received.

Food drive to collect food items for our homeless veterans in the Lincoln area is still ongoing. Items requested are shelf ready, power bars, easy to open items (pull tabs), etc. Please do not bring in food items that are past their expiration date. They just must be thrown away. Other items that our Homeless Veterans could use are hygiene care items. They should be the small size that would fit easily into a backpack.

As the weather changes from fall to winter, these homeless veterans could use warm clothing, hats, gloves, underwear, etc. Volunteer Services has a list of the most requested items. In Lincoln, they can be reached by calling 402-486-7938 or texting Ty.Andrews@va. Gov.

Flu shots and Covid shots are available only to those enrolled in the VA Health system. Those with an appointment will be asked if they wish to receive a current shot during their visit with their care provider. Walk-ins can request a shot by speaking to the MSA staff at check-in and waiting for a nurse to be free.

There are no mask requirements at VA clinics and hospitals. Masks are available for those who wish to wear them at the front doors of the clinics.

Express Care is a walk-in service for those who wish to have a nurse check out minor items. Times might be different at your local clinic, so give them a call and see if they offer Express Care (walk-in) service. This care is available to those who might wish to see a VA nurse without an appointment during normal hours. The Lincoln Clinic treats 300 a month as walk-ins.

Want to serve your fellow Veterans? The VA can use more volunteers at your local clinic or hospital. You volunteer to help veterans in the clinic or hospital, or a veteran's home. Or you can donate to your local clinic, hospital, or veteran's home. They can always use a monetary donation, or you can donate activities bags for younger kids to have when they come to the clinic or hospital with a parent for their appointments.

Clinics and hospitals can always use books or magazines for patients. You would need to check with your local hospital, clinic, or veteran's home volunteer office to see what items they need or allow. This would be a great project for your church, school, or youth group.

Hours given by the volunteers are credited with saving the VA Health at Omaha, Lincoln, and Grand Island an equivalent of 25 full-time staff employees. This is based on an hour of service being credited at the rate of \$31.50 dollars per hour.

The only animals that should be brought into a VA Health clinic or hospital are trained service animals that qualify under DAV requirements. Other pets or comfort dogs do not qualify and should be left at home.

With the signing of the PAC act, more veterans have become eligible for services, not only for those who served "Boots on the ground", but anyone who has served since the Gulf War. If you have any questions, call your local service officer, VSO, county, or state. It only takes a few minutes to see if you might qualify for an increase, or a new VA disability rating.

The Veteran Affairs web site is a great place to visit. You can find out the latest information affecting Veterans. You can track claim status, file for travel pay, view your VA account, payments received, or Co-pay owed. You can make the Co-pay payments online.

Thanks for your service to your fellow Veterans and thanks for your service to this great country.

Greetings Fellow Legion Riders and Legion Family,

Who'd have thought after the scorchingly hot days of earlyand mid-August, we'd be having 60* nights by late-August? I'm thinking some Indian Summer days in early-September, how about you?

Riding season will be drawing to a close in the next few weeks. Harvest will soon be under way, which means farm

implements of all sizes will be sharing the roadways of Nebraska. I urge everyone, whether on two (or three) wheels or on four (or more) wheels, be vigilant as you drive Nebraska highways and byways in the next couple of months.

I was deeply saddened during August by two motorcycle fatalities here in Lincoln. While I did not know either rider, it reminded me to remain extra aware as I ride and drive. One of the accidents occurred only a couple of blocks from my residence. I drive by that spot nearly every day, and can still see evidence of the crash on the roadway. While excessive speed by the motorcyclist appears to be the root cause of the accident, and I'm fairly confident that the car driver exercised what they thought was due diligence before pulling out from a stop sign, this accident in particular is a grim reminder to watch out for one another on the road (and to not act the fool by excessive speed). At the speed the motorcycle was apparently traveling, he was covering somewhere around 150 feet per second. it is difficult to fault the car driver when the motorcycle was traveling the length of a football field in two seconds.

On a happier note, I am so excited to tell you that our annual Poker Run was a resounding success! The weather was perfect for riding, and nearly 70 riders and passengers signed up to participate. Between the poker hands, silent auction and raffle, we cleared just under \$2,000. We also gave away the rifle, for which we have been selling tickets for the last six months or so. Our rifle raffle netted just over \$4,000. Our two charities will reap the rewards of the Poker Run and rifle raffle. Our charities this year were the Veterans Mission of Mercy and Wheels 4 Warriors.

I want to give a big shoutout and a huge thank you to every Rider, Legionnaire, Son and Auxiliary member who has supported your American Legion Riders Chapter 3 in our fund-raising efforts.

Air Force Serviceman Identified From Vietnam War





On August 8, 2025, the Defense POW/MIA Accounting Agency (DPAA) identified the remains of Master Sgt. James Henry Calfee, missing from the Vietnam War.

Calfee entered the U.S. Air Force from Texas and served with Detachment 1, 1043rd Radar Evaluation Squadron. In 1968, Calfee and 18 other men were assigned to Lima Site 85, a tactical air navigation radar site on a remote, 5,600-foot mountain peak known as Phou Pha Thi in Houaphan Province, Laos.

In the early morning of March 11, the site was overrun by Vietnamese commandos with grenades and mortars, causing the Americans to seek safety on a narrow ledge of the steep mountain. A few hours later, under the protective cover of A-1 Skyraider aircraft, U.S. helicopters were able to rescue eight of the men. Calfee and 10 other Americans were killed in action and could not be recovered at the time.

In 2003, a joint team recovered remains during site investigation work along the western slopes of Phou Pha Thi. The remains were scientifically identified as one of the 11 missing Airmen from this incident. In 2005, a Laotian citizen provided U.S. officials an identification card belonging to another missing servicemember and human remains that had purportedly been found at the base of Phou Pha Thi.

In 2023, DPAA personnel and members from partner organizations discovered unexploded ordnance, incident-related materials, possible material evidence, and possible osseus remains from the research site, leading to another identification of one of the missing. Joint recovery teams surveyed and excavated the site from Jan. 16 – Feb. 16, 2025, and March 2-31, 2025, recovering possible human remains, possible material evidence, and other osseus material. All remains and evidence were subsequently sent to the DPAA Laboratory for scientific analysis. Based on the laboratory analysis and total evidence available, a portion of the remains recovered were identified as those of Calfee.

He is memorialized on the Courts of the Missing at the National Memorial Cemetery of the Pacific. His name is also inscribed along with all his fallen comrades on the Vietnam Veterans Memorial Wall in Washington, DC.

Marine Awarded The Medal Of Honor





For conspicuous gallantry and intrepidity at the risk of his life above and beyond the call of duty in action against the enemy while serving as Company Gunnery Sergeant, Company A, First Battalion, First Marines, First Marine Division from 31 January to 6 February 1968, in the Republic of Vietnam. Company A fought off multiple vicious attacks as it rapidly moved along the highway toward Hue City to relieve friendly forces that were surrounded by enemy forces.

Despite being wounded in these engagements, Gunnery Sergeant Canley repeatedly rushed across fire-swept terrain to carry his wounded Marines to safety. After his commanding officer was severely wounded, Gunnery Sergeant Canley took command and led the company into Hue City. At Hue City, caught in deadly crossfire from enemy machine gun positions, he set up a base of fire and maneuvered with a platoon in a flanking attack that eliminated several enemy positions. Retaining command of the company for three days, he led attacks against multiple enemy fortified positions while routinely braving enemy fire to carry wounded Marines to safety.

On 4 February, he led a group of Marines into an enemy-occupied building in Hue City. He moved into the open to draw fire, located the enemy, eliminated the threat, and expanded the company's hold on the building room by room. Gunnery Sergeant Canley then gained position above the enemy strongpoint and dropped in a large satchel charge that forced the enemy to withdraw.

On 6 February, during a fierce firefight at a hospital compound, Gunnery Sergeant Canley twice scaled a wall in full view of the enemy to carry wounded Marines to safety.

By his undaunted courage, selfless sacrifice, and unwavering devotion to duty, Gunnery Sergeant Canley reflected great credit upon himself and upheld the highest traditions of the Marine Corps and the United States Naval Service.

The Medal Of Honor was awarded to Sgt. Maj. Johnny L. Canley on October 17, 2018, at the White House, by President Donald J. Trump.






