Constitutional Amendments Proposed for the Kansas 2026 Elections

1) Kansas Elections for Supreme Court Justices Amendment (August 2026)

The Kansas Elections for Supreme Court Justices Amendment is on the

The amendment would provide the direct election of [Kansas Supreme Court](#) justices at staggered elections and abolish the existing [Kansas Supreme Court Nominating Commission](#). The amendment authorizes the [Kansas State Legislature](#) to develop rules regarding the elections. Justices' terms would remain the same at six years, and vacancies would be filled by election as provided for by law.^[2]

Currently, the seven justices are selected through the assisted appointment method. The nominating commission is responsible for providing the names of nominees to the governor, who must then select a justice from that list. The commission is made up of nine members, one lawyer and one non-lawyer from each congressional district and one additional lawyer who serves as chairperson.^[2]

The measure would amend [section 1 of Article 5](#) of the [Kansas Constitution](#) to specify that in order to vote in Kansas, individuals must be citizens, at least 18 years old, and a resident of the area in which the person is seeking to vote in. Currently, the constitution says, "Every citizen of the United States who has attained the age of eighteen years and who resides in the voting area in which he or she seeks to vote shall be deemed a qualified elector."^[2]

Can noncitizens vote in the United States?

In 1996, the [U.S. Congress](#) passed a law prohibiting noncitizens from voting in federal elections, such as U.S. House, U.S. Senate, and presidential elections. Federal law did not address state or local elections.^[3]
