A 12 metre skip bin was ordered and delivered last week and all the rubbish and old equipment was disposed of. The place is now looking quite respectable again.

The Club makes wooden toys for these groups each year for disadvantaged Children at Christmas. Last year we were able to present these clubs with just over 900 wooden toys. With an estimated value of over \$35,000 each year

The Club also assists the Officer Specialist School, where we make *Kits for Kids* in August each year (last year we assisted 180 students) with a wooden article that they can assemble with our assistance and take home for their parent/s.

We also do minor repairs to furniture for the general community where applicable, and make various items for the local schools.

To enable the community to purchase fresh fruit and vegetables direct from the farmers a Farmers Market is held on the second and fourth Saturday of each month.


I hope the rooms will serve their new purpose as successfully as they have done for us.

USEFUL TREES - by Keith Towe.

We all admire and seek colourful and figured Timbers. We hunt for those Timbers with Fiddle back and blister grain to add another visual element to our Woodwork or Turnings, but how many of us realize the medicinal benefits that many of our Native Trees contain.

The Chinese, the Egyptians, American Indians, and many other cultures have utilized the Medicinal properties of their Native Trees for many 1000's of years and these properties are well understood and faithfully recorded.

Here in Australia our Indigenous community have used the Medicinal properties of our trees for over 50 000 years but until recently nothing has been formally written down or recorded. Our people have passed down these special properties by word of mouth, and I have read that the main source of knowledge now lies with Indigenous women, as many men "cannot be bothered", thank goodness for the women.

A lot has been written about the benefits of certain shrubs, bushes, and Roots etc., but as I have a great interest in Native Trees, I would like to mention some in this category and maybe add a couple in future issues of our Newsletter.

Pittosporum phillyreoides:- This tree is from the same family as the now classified pest tree *Pittosporum undulatum*, which is becoming an invasive weed.

The *phillyreoides* species: The indigenous people call it Gumbi Gumbi, or Cumbi Cumbi, and many of our Tree lovers call it Weeping *Pittosporum*, or Native Apricot. It is a small neat tree with long slender leaves and produces a small orange coloured fruit which is edible, but it is the leaves that are mainly used to treat Cancer and other ailments, with some remarkable claims being made for the use of this species.

I like most *Pittosporum* trees as they have nice white timber that holds its whiteness for a long time, and although it not usually available in large sizes, and it can get a Blue stain if kept in a damp place it turns beautifully. If this subject interests you look it up on the internet.
