

time we are all enduring. The Rose can separate from the stand.



From John McMahon. "I have attached a picture of a bowl that I am in the process of doing some piercing with the Dremel. You will note that I have stuck some clear tape over the inside of the bowl & marked where I want to pierce on the tape with a marker pen. I find this method easier than drawing directly on the wood, particularly when I change my mind & need to rub it out. I used to just use masking tape for this, but the clear tape lets me see the underlying grain of the wood so that I can modify the piercing if I want to retain a grain feature. This piece was partly prepared a few weeks ago, & I was intending to use it as part of my Dremel demonstration at our exhibition, but now that it's cancelled, I thought I might as well finish it now."

Paul Parer has returned from his holiday in time to send me these

photos. Here's what Paul says: "We have survived our 14 days isolation, since arriving home and are both OK and able to join the daily search for toilet paper and other essentials that we didn't stock up on at the end of February, before going away."

The next picture is part of my contribution to the Christmas toys. 12 trays of bricks and the wheels are separate because I can't get the screws to fit them to the trays as they are still in the clubhouse workshop."

One of the castings was broken, part of the frame was missing and over the years bolts had been lost and replaced with whatever was



available. A friend TIG welded the broken casting, I machined a spindle for the main pulley, re-manufactured part of the frame and sourced a belt. The top & bottom beams are timber as is the link from the treadle to the main pulley, these were all re-made at the Club.

I'm not normally a fan of re-painting tools but this was in such a poor state when I got it I thought it needed to be done. It's missing some pinstriping on the main casting but as I've never done pinstriping before I decided to leave this off for the time being."



"The little York Gum NE Bowl is only 2" dia. Only a scrap, but who throws away York gum? Had to do something with it. It is one piece NOT a base and top."

Apart from his woodworking skills, Keith is known, among club members, for his interest in and knowledge of rare

and exotic wood. Keith recently tried his hand at turning some Xanthorea (Australian Grass Tree). On the following page he tells of the results of his effort.





"This an on- going project combining Hand Forged Supports for a Bowl/Base from Blackboy (naughty), should be called GrassTree.

The Bowl section will be about 180mm. dia, as yet I don't know how high it will finish.

It is terrible stuff to turn, dry as chips and so, so dusty, the dust extraction is working overtime, though I have saved quite a lot of sanding

dust to mix with Super Glue to fill some small voids of which there

is a lot. I now know why I have put off turning it. I forged the MS supports with a simple twist in the middle and will file the ends to slot into 8mm holes in the Base section.

The Grasstree Bowl section is part finished. Oh what a trial, wish I had thrown it in the bin at the beginning. So, So, dusty and so many voids, have run out of CA Glue."
