Berwick District Woodworkers Club Inc. Notice to all members

Our Workshop and Club Rooms will reopen for normal group activities on Wednesday 25th November at 9.00am. There will be restriction on numbers in any one space and mandated requirements around social distancing and hygiene which we have all come to see as the new normal. A shed safety officer is required by law and this will be Club President or his deputy. He or she will be required to enforce the rules. Please abide with the directives, they are there to keep us and those that we hold dear safe.

Following is the "Covid Safe Plan" mandated by Law and your Committee of Management. Please read it carefully.

You will see these signs at the entrance door to the shed

STOP

Please read and comply with the following notice Before entering this workshop all members and visitors are required to read the

COVID PLAN

- 1: Use the hand sanitiser provided at this entry station.
- 2: Be wearing a closely fitted face mask that covers the mouth and nose. (Scarves, Bandannas, face shields on their own are not permitted)
- 3: Sign in on the official register. This must include your time of entry and exit. Use your own pen wherever possible.

In addition, all visitors must record a current contact phone number.

- 4: If you feel unwell, have had contact with a known Covid case, have been overseas, or have tested positive to Covid-19 in the past 28 days you must declare that and stay away. You are then required to undergo a Covid test, isolate at home until your results are known before venturing out into the community.
- 5: In the workshop observe all social distancing, strict personal hygiene, surface cleaning and disinfection rules.

At the Club Rooms entrance you will see this sign.

STOP you are now entering a high-risk area Please read and comply with the following

- 1: Use the hand sanitiser supplied at this station
- 2: Observe all required social distancing, personal and surface hygiene rules.
- 3: Wash all cups, plates and eating utensils in hot water and detergent. Allow to drip dry in the sink drying rack. Wash your hands with soap/detergent thoroughly before putting the cups etc. away in the cupboard at the end of each session.
- 4: Wipe down all contact surfaces with the detergent spray, disinfectant spray and the paper towel provided.
- 5: Face masks are required except when eating or drinking. Seems like a bit of a nanny state, but these rules are put in place to protect us, are mandated by law, and we have to respect them in order to protect our families and our work-mates. The news on the vaccine front is very encouraging and this gives us hope that we may see an end to this terrible pandemic that the people on our planet continue to endured. We are so blessed that we live in Australia.

We realise that you have not had much of a return for your subs this year but we still have to pay our insurance that represents almost half of your \$65.00 we have had about 55 members pay so far. Subs were due in July 2020. Be aware that our insurance costs are based on our financial membership. If you have not yet paid your subs please do so because if you are not financial you are not covered by club insurance if you use the club's facilities or undertake club activities, and you do not get a vote at the AGM.
