JIG SAW SAFETY ADVICE:

Be certain the blade is properly installed. It should be in a vertical position with the teeth pointing up. Roll the machine over by hand to see if there is clearance for the blade, and if the tension sleeve has been properly set.

Keep the hold-down adjusted so the work will not be raised off the table.

When the saw is running, do not permit your fingers to get directly in line with the blade. The

work can usually be held on either side of the cutting line.

I had a lousy day today. Cold, wet and windy. Making a cabinet to fit into a motorhome and the glue up was not going as intended and I seemed to be all fingers and thumbs.

The final straw was my faithful jigsaw threw in the towel as I was cutting the ply for the faces and backs. Did you know that an angle grinder with a thin (1mm) cut off wheel cuts ply better than any jig saw I know?

OUICK FIX FOR DENTS

Dents in wood surfaces can be annoying. But fret not, they can be fixed. Simply soak a washcloth in water and wring it out a bit so it's not sopping wet. Put the damp washcloth on the affected area. The water will wick through the wood, and that's fine. Now, with your iron on its highest setting, place it on the damp washcloth over the affected area, and make small movements back and forth and in circles. Press down firmly and continue until your wash cloth is dry. It won't take long to evaporate. At this point, the wood fibers are absorbing the water and should expand back to where they were originally. Continue this process and repeat by adding more water until the dents rise up to be flush with the rest of the material.


DIY SIMPLE AND SECURE SANDING BLOCK

Not happy with the selection of sanding blocks at the hardware store. I made a few of my own from hardwood scraps left over from a woodworking project. I cut each one to 3/4in. x 1-1/2in, which is just the right size to wrap a quarter sheet of sandpaper around. And the "kerf" cut helps hold the sandpaper in place until I'm ready to change it. -- Tim Olaerts.

DON'T CHUCK THAT CHUCK.

For all of those people who, like me, cannot seem to get enough of a handgrip to tighten up a keyless drill-chuck, this may be the answer to your prayers. Keyless chucks are very handy for the odd drilling job. They are easier to use and you don't have to have a key (which is always somewhere else when you need it) as on a standard key-chuck. The solution is in the kitchen, in the

third drawer, where you put all the stuff that hasn't got a special home.



Note: This should only be used on cordless drills.

ON A PERSONAL NOTE:

From Simon Robbins: On a recent trip to Canberra we visited the National Arboretum which had some interesting plantings two of which are photographed here:

<u>Himalayan Cedar (Cedrus deodara).</u> This species (left) grows in the Himalayan - Hindu Kush region. The timber is rotresistant & in India is used for railway sleepers, house construction, medicinal & in incense. While we were walking through the plantation there was a distinct perfume of the tree.

Cork Oak (Quercus suber). This plantation originates back in the early

days of Canberra when Walter Burley Griffin obtained seedlings to plant out that takes in the Arboretum. The photo at right illustrates that the cork has been harvested. Specialists were brought over from Portugal to educate locals on how to harvest the cork.

We also visited The ACT's National Park, Namadji which is the traditional home of the Ngunnawal People. The National Park was declared in 1984 & covers 106,095 hectares. Namadji is at the northern most end of the Australian Alps. Alpine Environments are rare in Australia, covering a tiny 0.15% of the continent.

Whilst away in our camper- trailer we experienced temperatures around minus 3 & minus 4.
