SAFETY REMINDER: The following item has been taken from the list published in the club's website.

DRILL PRESSES:

Check the speed setting to see that it is correct for your work. Holes over 13 mm (1/2 in.) should be bored at the lowest speed.

Use only an approved type of bit. Bits with feed screws or those with excessive length should not be used.

Mount the bit securely to the full depth of the chuck and in the centre. Remove the key immediately.

Position the table and adjust the feed stroke so there is no chance of the bit hitting the table.

The work should be placed on a wood pad when the holes are drilled all the way through.

Work that will be held by hand should be centre punched.

Small or irregular shaped pieces must be clamped to the table or held in a special fixture.

Feed the bit smoothly into the work. When the hole is deep, withdraw the drill frequently to clear the shavings and cool the bit.

When using special clamping setups, a hole saw or fly-cutter; have your Mentor or Session Leader inspect it before turning it on.





Old age and treachery will always beat youth and exuberance. Ken Whitefield (73, married with two sons, a daughter and two grandchildren)

A day in the life of...

The suspected suitcase bomb was emanating a soft, but distinctly mechanical noise from where it sat surrounded by a crowd at Melbourne Airport's Customs Hall. As the Australian Federal Police representative summonsed to investigate, Ken Whitefield first isolated, then X-rayed it. The X-ray clearly revealed battery leads and a bulk mass which could have been the body of the bomb but no detonator. Maybe it was cleverly hidden he thought.



Well-known amongst his colleagues for being thorough and tenacious, Ken asked for the suitcase owner to be located for questioning. She was a 'drop-dead gorgeous young woman' who claimed to have 'no idea' what the noise could be, leaving Ken just one option - he bravely opened the case. Inside, he found the woman's vibrator, accidentally jolted on and jumping around by itself between her packed clothing.

Most important lesson of Ken's life?

Now retired, Ken says the most important lesson in his life came from his grandfather, who converted him from a soft 15-year-old city boy, born and raised in Christchurch New Zealand, into a capable farm worker with a fierce work ethic. Of course, there were a few hic-cups along the way, like the time he swung away from his girlfriend at the end of a dance, while confidently grabbing her hand to lead her back to their table, only to find when he got there that he'd somehow grabbed the unusually soft hand of another man instead.

Despite this, his girlfriend of that night later became his wife and they've now been married for 50 years.

From New Zealand to Australia

As a 20-year old, after his stint as a farm hand but before he met his wife, Ken and his best mate embarked on an adventure of a lifetime, boarding the Italian ship, the Angelina Laura, to Sydney. Passports were not required to travel between New Zealand and Australia back then.

"We disembarked in Sydney and gave it a whirl but couldn't find a decent job, so moved to Melbourne," he said. "We arrived Saturday night, picked up accommodation in St. Kilda and were employed on Monday in the construction industry, pumping concrete." He worked there for the next three years as a Jack of all trades, before returning to New Zealand to make his new girlfriend his wife. While there, he joined the New Zealand Highway Patrol for two years before returning to Australia, this time with a wife and his first-born son in tow.

Ken's career in the AFP

After a lengthy interview procedure which involved investigations of his siblings, his parents, his grandparents and his great grandparents, Ken walked into his first day of work with the Commonwealth Police (later absorbed into the Australian Federal Police) on the 5th August 1974. He was with them for the next 38 years of his life—12 years in uniform, then later moving into Melbourne as a junior detective, before eventually becoming well known for his successes in large Centrelink, Tax or Customs frauds.

As such, he found himself involved in significant drug seizures, sifting through debris from the bomb blasts in Russell St (1986), the Turkish Consulate (1986) and Bali (2002) for evidence and seconded to Christmas Island (2010) to interview the boat people, so he could identify and imprison the people smugglers.

Greatest achievement of his life?

In 1988 Ken took long service leave to build a house in Narre Warren South, which he lived in with his wife and their three children for 32 years. He claims it was the greatest achievement of his life.

"I'm not a builder but I've always enjoyed woodwork and at the time I'd already been building kitchens and bathrooms," he said. "I thought, surely I could build a house, so I did."

BDWWC Membership

After retiring, Ken did the usual thing and travelled extensively around Australia and internationally. When his wife suggested joining BDWWC in 2014, he said, "I dropped in during morning tea, but I was put off by all the old codgers watching me. As a 64-year old, I thought I'm too young to join them." Nevertheless, he returned the following week and met some of the younger members. The rest is history.

He is now heavily involved in the committee, toy making and co-ordinator for Kits for Kids within BDWWC. "The club is very people focused, friendly and an absolute pleasure to volunteer and participate in wood working activities," he said.
