

CLUB EXPO 2025

John McMahon and Rosie have returned from a short break in Victoria's High Country, taking advantage of the last of the Autumn weather. John has asked me to remind members of the need to get cracking on your entries for the Club's Expo in July.

"This year's Expo is quickly approaching, and lots of help from all our members will soon be needed to ready the clubrooms and workshop, and to distribute our flyers to the local community.



Flyers can now be distributed to the club's suppliers. At the end of May we will start distributing to local businesses, such as your local coffee shop & butcher, or retirement village, and in mid-June we will be doing letterbox drops. We will need lots of help for this, so if you can help out, please see **Don Buchanan** or **John McMahon.**

Our clean-up working bee and bbq will be on Thursday 3rd July. Lots of help will be needed on this day to not only clean up the workshop and clubrooms, but also to relocate machinery and workbenches to make room for our demonstration and sales areas. Remember that the workshop will be closed for all members' use from this date until after the Expo on Tuesday 15th July.

Rosters for demonstrations and reception/sales desks are now displayed near the library corner in the clubrooms. Members are asked to consider making themselves available for an hour or so to demonstrate one of our woodworking activities. While members are welcome to undertake these demonstrations at any time of the day, we will be advertising specific times for each demonstration on a rotating basis, so need to ensure someone is available for each advertised session.

Entry forms are now available on the library table in the clubrooms. Note that there are different forms for pieces being entered in the exhibition, and for pieces that are for sale but not eligible to be displayed in the exhibition. Completed entries can be left in the tray on the library table. Entries close on Friday 4th July, but the earlier they are lodged the easier it is to manage the registration process and free us up for all the other last-minute activities that need doing, such as printing the display cards. Delivery of the actual entry pieces will be between Friday 4th and Monday 7th July.

So now is the time to be getting stuck into your exhibition pieces. Good luck with them, and I'm sure they will ensure we have another successful Expo this year."

two to the Club's coffers in acknowledgement.


David expects to have the delivery around the end of May.



FROM THE INTERNET: While many of our members are thoroughly experienced at woodwork, some of us are still learning. Here are some tips that may be useful to those who don't already know about them.

1. Makeshift Drill Bit.

If you don't have the correct size drill bit for a hole that you need to drill you can actually just use a nail instead. Take the nail that you're planning on using, clip off the head, attach it to the drill and just use that as the drill bit.

2. No-Clamp Gluing - Side-by-Side.

If you have to glue some pieces of wood together for a top but don't have a clamp, take two pieces of scrap wood and attach them to a work surface a little bit further apart than the size of the pieces that are being glued. Put the glued wood pieces in the gap and then use two wedges to fill the open gap.

3. No-Clamp Gluing – On Top of One Another

If you're gluing pieces together on top of each other like for a leg, for example, you can substitute C-shapes for a clamp. The same idea applies as in number two: make the gap of the C-shape a bit bigger than the pieces that are being glued and then use smaller wedges to fill the gap and keep the pieces in place.

4. Salt Glue Trick

When gluing the pieces to each other, you may find that they slip around a bit while trying to clamp them in place. After applying the glue, sprinkle just a little bit of regular table salt before placing them together – it'll prevent any of that movement.

5. Drilling a 90deg Hole.

Without a drill press, drilling a 90° hole can be quite tricky. There is a way to do it as close to 90° as possible, though. Stack together two pieces of dimensional lumber with one piece sticking up a little bit higher so that it creates a corner with a right angle. Place your drill right against that corner and drill away!

If you do have a drill press but can't fit the piece of wood, drill the hole into a piece of scrap wood. Then attach the same drill bit to your hand drill, run it through the hole in the scrap piece and use that almost like a stencil or guide to drill through the piece that you actually need.

6. Sharpening Blades

A blunt utility knife isn't very helpful when working with wood, but what do you do without a sharpener? Take a regular ceramic mug, turn it upsidedown and scrape the blade against the bottom rim just as you would with a sharpening stone.



7. Filling a Hole

When removing a nail from the wall where a painting used to hang, you're left with that hole in the wall. Instead of driving to the store and spending money on spackle, just apply some toothpaste. After about two hours of drying you can paint right over it and no one would ever know!


