As the first in my family to reach this level of education, I knew I was breaking barriers, not just for myself but for future generations. My military experience, paired with my desire to own and operate a small business, fueled my decision to pursue this degree. With the support from my best friend and wife, the decision to pursue this terminal degree served as a joint endeavor with shared gratification. The challenges were as distinct as the rewards—the demands on time and energy were greater than expected, but through my veterans benefits, I was fortunate to complete my degree without financial debt. This journey has armed me with the tools and knowledge I need to succeed as a small business owner. One of the most valuable lessons I've learned is the importance of patience and attention to detail—qualities essential for completing a dissertation. The process of gathering feedback, sometimes conflicting, from my chair and subject matter experts was a year-long challenge. Yet, in the end, the hard work paid off, reinforcing the belief that with focus and determination, success is inevitable.

For Dr. Tyler, my motivation was rooted in a desire to challenge myself and expand my understanding of the field. As a Warrant Officer, I had already established myself as a technical expert, but I saw how academic rigor could enhance that expertise, giving me a well-rounded approach to service. Earning my associate's degree early on was a small but significant milestone that showed me the value of dedication and perseverance. As I progressed in my academic career, I realized that pursuing a terminal degree was not just about achieving a title—it was about becoming a practitioner and a role model. I also developed a deeper understanding of the gaps between academic research and industry practices, a perspective that has enhanced my ability to bridge IT and business in my work. Throughout this process, perseverance and self-discipline were key, as was the value of networking and collaboration. I also learned to accept and grow from constructive criticism, using setbacks as opportunities for growth. One of my guiding principles, and something I emphasized to my family, was the importance of maintaining work-life balance. This mindset not only helped me succeed academically but also ensured I could maintain a healthy balance in my personal life.

Through these shared experiences, each of us has gained invaluable lessons about the importance of resilience, time management, and the ability to adapt to challenges. Our journeys highlight not only the dedication required to earn a terminal degree but also the importance of staying true to one's goals and values. Whether inspired by a desire to set an example for our children, advance in our careers, or contribute to the advancement of our fields, we have all emerged stronger, more knowledgeable, and ready to lead in our respective domains. The sacrifices made along the way—whether time, financial, or personal—were significant, but the rewards have been immeasurable. Dr. Steele chose a full-time remote learning option, primarily due to work commitments, learning preferences, and family responsibilities. "Having a strong support system—our tribe—was essential," Dr. Steele notes, emphasizing the importance of setting realistic goals and deadlines while regularly adjusting strategies. Financing the degree through private loans, Dr. Steele advises starting research early to explore all options. The experience of alumni, like Dr. Tyler a fellow Capella Graduate who had successfully completed the program, also influenced Dr. Steele's decision.

Pursuing a terminal degree was a significant commitment for each of us, shaped by our personal motivations and professional ambitions. For Dr. Simpson, it was the merger of military experience and a desire for business ownership that led to choosing a full-time, online program. "Time management was key," Corey says, recalling long weekends spent reading and researching, all while balancing a full-time profession. The Post 9/11 GI Bill and VA benefits helped ease the financial burden, and securing as many grants as possible became a crucial part of the journey. Corey chose National University because of its favorable student-to-instructor ratio and program availability, which aligned with his career goals.

Each of us faced our own unique challenges, but the shared lesson was the importance of balancing responsibilities and seeking out the support we needed to succeed.

For Dr. Wilkinson, his journey was driven by a desire to create a better future for his children and demonstrate to them that anything is possible. In his case, a full-time remote learning option was the only viable choice given the demands of his work and family life. However, the distance learning environment presented unique challenges that required him to adopt new strategies for networking and collaboration. Ian says, "this involved seeking out opportunities to connect with fellow students and faculty both online and in person at conferences and workshops. As I progressed through my program, I realized that a terminal degree was more than just a piece of paper; it represented a commitment to lifelong learning and a desire to contribute to the field of information technology."

Lessons Learned

For Dr. Simpson, I quickly learned that patience is key—especially during the dissertation phase. Throughout my journey to earning a terminal degree, one constant has been the need for patience and persistence. Navigating feedback from both my Chair and subject matter experts took considerable time, and often the feedback didn't align. This was a year-long obstacle, but ultimately, hard work paid off. I found that attention to detail and clear communication were essential, not only in research but in verifying sources and ensuring accuracy at every step. In the end, the degree added institutional validity to my craft, proving that persistence pays off.

Dr. Steele found perseverance and self-discipline to be indispensable. Balancing the demands of academia with personal life—especially as my wife and I were pursuing terminal degrees while raising a newborn—was challenging, but through strong support systems, we managed. The program also taught me the importance of networking and collaboration, as well as how to handle setbacks by seeking mentor advice and practicing self-care. My ability to synthesize information from diverse sources improved significantly, and learning to accept constructive criticism became a key part of my growth. The value of a strong support network truly became apparent as I navigated both academic and personal challenges.

For Dr. Tyler, the journey was about staying focused on the micro goals. "I learned to stick to my plan and focus on the small steps—like eating an elephant, one bite at a time." This mindset helped me balance schoolwork with other responsibilities, and it became crucial when managing time efficiently. Completing the degree also gave me a more holistic view of both academic and practical challenges, helping me to seek solutions that addressed root causes, not just symptoms. The biggest lesson? "Don't quit," even when faced with hurdles or the temptation to take a break. Progress may slow down, but persistence is key.

Dr. Wilkinson's journey to earn a terminal degree was a transformative experience, underscoring the power of resilience and a steadfast commitment to learning. He faced numerous challenges, from managing his time effectively to navigating complex research topics, but he emerged with a profound appreciation for perseverance and the importance of a strong support system. As he reflects, "The most significant lesson I learned was that success is not about achieving perfection but about embracing the journey, learning from mistakes, and growing through each challenge." This journey taught him that even in the face of adversity, with the right mindset and the support of loved ones, achieving goals is possible.

Lasting Words of Advice

Throughout our journeys, we have each found motivation in our unique ways, drawing on personal experiences and mantras that have kept us grounded and focused. Dr. Steele emphasizes the importance of balance, both professionally and personally. "I sign all my work emails with the same note: 'I respect the boundaries between our work/career and personal lives. Should you receive emails from me during a time that is not during your designated work hours, please protect your time and respond during your work hours." This focus on respecting boundaries and maintaining a healthy worklife balance was not only advice but a lived principle that kept Steele grounded during the rigorous demands of the degree.

Dr. Wilkinson emphasized the importance of perseverance and a supportive network. He reminds us, "The path to success is rarely easy, filled with challenges and moments of doubt. However, by staying focused, learning from mistakes, and surrounding yourself with a supportive network, you can overcome any obstacle, go beyond your goals, and achieve your dreams."

For Dr. Tyler, the mantra that resonated most deeply was, "I haven't come this far, to just come this far." This reminder encapsulates the importance of perseverance. It means that once you've invested significant effort and hard work into a goal, stopping short simply isn't an option. "My only talent," Aaron adds, "is that I don't quit." This mindset of persistence through adversity has been crucial to navigating the ups and downs of the academic and professional journey.

Lastly, Dr. Simpson offered a simple yet powerful piece of advice: "Do it or don't do it... just commit." That sense of commitment and determination was essential for seeing the process through, reminding us all that success begins with a firm decision to move forward, no matter the challenges.
